Taft Is Strongly Opposed to Administration Shipping Bill

FORMER PRESIDENT SAYS SUCH A PROCEDURE WILL DISCOURAGE PRIVATE CAPITAL FROM WORKING ANY INVESTMENTS IN MARINE ACTIVITIES, AND HE GOES ON RECORD AS UNALTERABLY "FERMINIST" IT

Determined opposition to the administration shipping bill now pending in the senate, was voiced here by former President Taft. In an interview with the United Press he commended the filibuster against the bill led by Senator Burton, of Ohio.

"I am positively opposed to the shipping bill," he said. "Do I think it will pass? That seems to depend on the success of the filibuster."

Mr. Taft passed through New York from New Haven on the way to the University of Virginia, where he will deliver a lecture. He was intensely interested in the measure.

"American capital certainly would not be invested in a business which comes into competition with the government," he said. "That is exactly the situation presented in the shipping bill. I am vigorously opposed to government ownership in any form. We have had some experience with that type of government ownership in the Panama Railroad and the Panama Steamship line, although they were of different character. My views in this matter coincide with those of Senator Root, of New York."

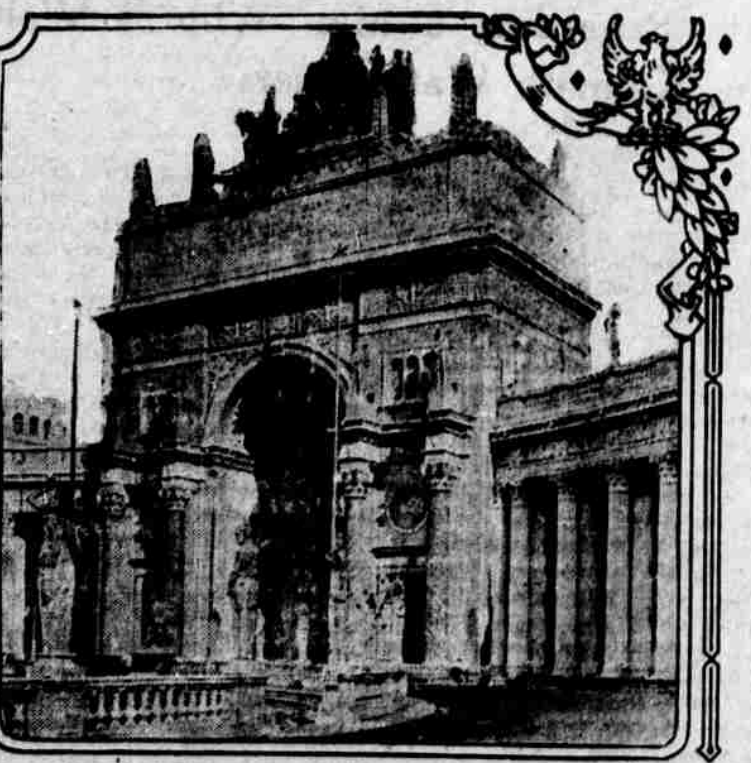
"I do not know how long the republican filibuster in the senate can prevent passage of the bill, but Senator Burton has had considerable



experience as a filibuster. It also depends on the extra session question. I think everyone wants to avoid a session after March 4, which would be held solely for the purpose of passing appropriation measures, scheduled to pass during the short session, but which might be blocked by the filibuster.

"I can see no good in the shipping measure. My opposition to it is unalterable." He refused to be drawn into a discussion of the political situation, however, and declined to comment on the Jackson day speech, delivered by President Wilson in Indianapolis. The shipping bill was the only public measure he would discuss for publication.

Arch of Rising Sun as Crowned by the "Nations of the East"

It was contended that the justices' terms expired October 31, as Governor Fletcher, his political enemies said, could not make permanent appointments to continue after the convening of the new legislature.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Tribulation, Patience and Experience"

"Tribulation worketh patience; and patience experience and experience hope."—Rom. 5, 3-4.

Tribulation

In every human life there are two quantities which never can rule together. Always one is defeated and the other rules. Two men meet. They dispute; one loses his temper. The other holds his peace. The angry man goes away defeated. Two men meet business reverses. One is soured and discouraged. The other has hardly met his defeat until he has planned again for success. Sickness enters a home. It enters again and again. But a mother holds by almost superhuman power to the task and looks into a new world of sympathy. Another mother under like conditions, is defeated. Death enters. A loved one is stricken. Life is never the same again. One man loses interest in his work and drifts. Another takes up the next day the same task and, while he never forgets, the world witnesses a silent struggle and victory. We have it in our power to compel tribulation to produce.

Patience

Patience, begotten of tribulation, has wondrous powers. Some selves lose everything worth while. Grain rattles through with the chaff. The impatient man may pass through tribulations manifold, but they are not experiences with him. They are just tribulations. Tribulation looms high in his vision. Success is not seen. But let patience seize life and mould it as a gold beater beats out the gold into things of strength

and beauty. Patience can take death itself and make life out of it. Patience has a microscope that sees hidden things. Patience has a telescope that sees far distant. Nothing is opaque to patience. It is possessed of the X-ray. Patience always carries a pocket electric light and never loses its way. Patience digs trenches, fixes its position, and waits till the time to strike. Patience heals wounds. It seems to take in hand that which has brought it out, tribulation, and fashion that thing into blessing. Patience, blooming in sunlight and shadow, ripens into the fruitage of

Experience Experience has learned the law of hope. It has learned that life is intended to succeed and that death is abhorrent. Experience knows that the day star always shines. Experience has learned the value of shock. It has learned the value of strain. It knows gold from dross. Hope was long ago laid to the human heart, but the larger hope that finally conquers is founded on experience gleaned from patience, begotten of tribulation. Strange, is it not? But we all know it to be so. Life has the power to take bitterness and make it sweet; to take weakness and make it strong; to take death and make it alive. Experience produces hope. Not the hope of childhood that has never been tested, but the hope of manhood that knows its ground. In tribulation, patience, experience, hope, the ascending scale of life to triumph.
