NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—A heliotrope colored limousine with heliotrope curtains behind, which rolls on heliotrope cushions,

a lady in heliotrope motor coat, a heliotrope motor bonnet and accompanied by a Perkins with a heliotrope sweater, is one of the smart sights of Fifth avenue, and the park these bright imitations of a spring afternoon. The unknown purple lady is the exponent of the new fashionable fad to match up your apparel and even your pets to the coloring of your newest motor car.

With violet shades at the latest coloring in Paris, it is only natural there should be a great run on purple veils, purple coats and caps and sweaters.

A stunning new model motor coat of drendnought gray, made of lightweight velours cloth hangs loose and rippling from the shoulders and is defined at the waistline in front with a quaint belt formed with two straps of the material which cross over each other and button with a cloth covered button on opposite sides. A high choker collar of white buttons on the left side with a single cloth covered button well under the ear. Wide cuffs of the white cloth finish the plain long sleeves and a close fitting little hat with a cuff of the white, turned up all around the face completes a perfect outfit with which to step into one of those lovely dark gray cars with gray cloth upholstery.

Another striking coat of buff ripple cloth is gathered on a narrow yoke, both front and back, has an odd collar, which turns into a short scarf that buttons over with two short ends in front. A brown suede turban with a single yellow rose in front fits close around the head. Naturally the motor that waits for this buff beauty is even buff in tone.

Suede is being used to a great extent for the smartest new motor headgear and, as it comes in all the most approved colorings and is soft and adaptable, it is an ideal material for such use. It is also very effective as

a trimming on the motor coat and wrap de lux and is used to face the cuffs and collars with artistic effect. Although not so serviceable, it is prettier and softer than the regulation leather buttons and bandings that have been used for several seasons.

Naturally, the wonderful silk sweaters grow more beautiful and nearer perfection from season to season, are bound to be the favorite motor attire of the warm spring weather. The sets of cap and sweater to match are rarely striking and have the advantage of being light weight yet warm and serviceable and vastly becoming, all at the very same time. There are two forms of caps which are knitted into a close fitting shape like a bathing cap, and those which are simply knitted silk scarfs that you must yourself twist about your head and fasten with a hook concealed with a button or silk pompom ornament on the right side.

One of the smartest types of the silk sweater comes in plaid effect with a collar and vest-like strip down the front of a plain color. The plaid cap has a band of the plain silk around the face.

The very newest material for extra warm sweaters is a silk wool which is fuzzy and light as thistle-down.

It is no longer considered good form to have flower filled holders in your car, but all the other comforts of home, including a rack which holds a vanity case, card case, pads, pencils, and a clock, another rack for hats and parcels, electric cigar lighters with rests and ashtray holders for books and magazines, a rack for your umbrella with a drain which goes through the bottom of the car and allows your wet umbrella to drip with impunity, an electric foot warmer and even electric attached gloves, if you yourself take a fancy to sit at your own wheel on a winter's day, are a few of the improvements. A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Can he do it? Can Jack Coombs, famed as an "iron man" wherever baseball is known, succeed where Jim Jeffries and innumerable other sporting celebrities have failed? Can he come back?

That is the question which sport critics and lovers are pondering over. Can the man who once mowed down batsmen in world's series battles the same as in exhibition games put over the same brand of stuff, the same weird assortment of flickering flashes, that once earned him the sobriquet of "iron man"?

Wilbert Robertson and Charley Ebbets would like to know. They have taken the chance and signed the veteran for 1935, and before many months have rolled by they will be able to answer all interrogators as to whether Jack Coombs can come back.

From 1906 to 1912 Coombs' name was perhaps the most feared of any

pitcher. Jumping into the big league from a scintillating path of victories at Colby college, Coombs startled the baseball world after he had been in the league but a few weeks by pitching and winning a twenty-four inning game against the Boston Red Sox. The score was 4 to 1. It is the longest major league game on record.

Coombs' real fame came in 1910, when he shattered several records. His record at the close of that season showed him with thirty-one victories and but nine defeats. Not satisfied with that, he broke another American league record by shutting out the opponents thirteen times and wound up the season in a blaze of glory by pitching fifty-three consecutive scoreless innings.

Coombs continued his path of glory until the 1911 world's series when he was severely injured. In 1912 he recovered enough to win 21 out of 31 games, but since that time he has pitched but two full games, winning one and losing one.

MELBOURNE, Jan. 30.—Two recent arrivals from Witby, England, who were working inland, upon hearing of the German naval bombardment of that town, immediately threw up their jobs and booked by the first steamer for England to enlist.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 30.—The much advertised German war loan apparently is not looked upon as a negotiable security by the German government. According to the Frankfurter Zeitung, a Berlin judge in the landed estate court, refused to accept bail offered in five per cent bonds of the war loan, on the ground that the Prussian high court has decided that such war loan bonds were not permissible as bail, as these securities were not included in the stock exchange quotations.

JOHANNESBURG, Jan. 30.—The Leader issued an appeal for 2,000

scillings in order to present a charger to General Botha. Subscriptions received within a few hours exceeded the amount required. They were restricted to a shilling each and confined to residents in the Rand.
