WHY NOT a beet sugar factory for Klamath county? Why not lots of other enterprises, the kind that will furnish a payroll for the county, or provide a market for the products of the farmers?

There are many manufacturing enterprises casting about for locations such as Klamath county offers. It's up to Klamath county to interest these people here, and produce the statistics, etc., to prove that this is the logical location for their plants.

With Europe at war, the great source of beet sugar, Austria and Germany, are entirely shut off. With the terrible condition brought about by the war, both the farmer and the farm, to the manufacturer and to the entire nation, it is safe to say that it will be at least a decade before these countries will again be in a position to take up as extensively as before, the culture of sugar beets. In the meantime, this demand must be met, and the United States is looking toward the Pacific Coast.

Manufacturers are now investigating in several localities with a view to erecting plants, providing sufficient acreage will be planted to sugar beets to justify the installation of a plant. Some localities look with disfavor, apparently, upon this, but not so in Klamath county. It has been proven by Uncle Sam that this is one of the best sugar beet countries in the country. Not only to the beets with a minimum amount of care reach a maximum size here, but they contain twice the average sugar percentage that other places boast of. As these companies propose to purchase their beets from the farmers instead of growing them themselves, this furnishes another source of profit for the farmers—and anything that furthers the interests of the farmers of Klamath county is heartily endorsed by all.

While other towns are procrastinating it is time for us to get busy. Some effort should be made at once to bring the beet manufacturers here to show them what wonderful results can be attained.

LIFE TERM URGED FOR SECOND DEGREE MURDER

SALEM, Feb. 6.—Senator Langguth's bill giving the penalty for second degree murder at from 20 to 30 years' imprisonment, was sent back to the committee by the senate, when Senator Dimick insisted that the penalty should remain as it is—life imprisonment. Another of Langguth's bills, providing for life imprisonment for first degree murder, passed the senate.

SALEM, Feb. 6.—Under the provisions of S. R. 19, which was adopted by the senate, the superintendent of public instruction is authorized to compile the school laws of the state and have them printed. Eighteen copies are to be distributed.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—New models in aeroplanes were expected to be devised as a result of inventions displayed today at the conference of scientific organizations at the Engineering Societies' building.

Inventions to increase the stability and safety of aeroplanes were subjects of the conference.

Mother Jones as She Smiled on John D. Rockefeller Jr.



Mother Jones was present the other day in New York when John D. Rockefeller, Jr., son of the richest man in the world, testified before the Industrial Relations Commission, and when she heard his lofty sentiments about labor and its rights, she patted him on the back. As she went down the New York city hall steps the photographer caught her with the smile she still wore after her conversation with the young man. So charmed was she that she visited his office in the famous building at 26 Broadway, headquarters of the greatest corporation on earth, and had quite a chat with him. Several months before Mother Jones had tried to get into the young man's offices there and had been ejected without much ceremony.

But labor leaders in New York did not like Mother Jones' resolute interviews, following her conversations with the young millionaire. They called on her and, it is said, a stormy session was held. Right away she issued another statement about Mr. Rockefeller and his testimony. She had this to say among other things: "If he did understand, and if he is sincere, he would realize that the new scheme for meeting his men in Colorado is a sham and a fraud. So far Mr. Rockefeller has given only lip service to democracy in industry. His new plan in Colorado masquerades as a basis for collective bargaining. It is the shadow and not the substance."

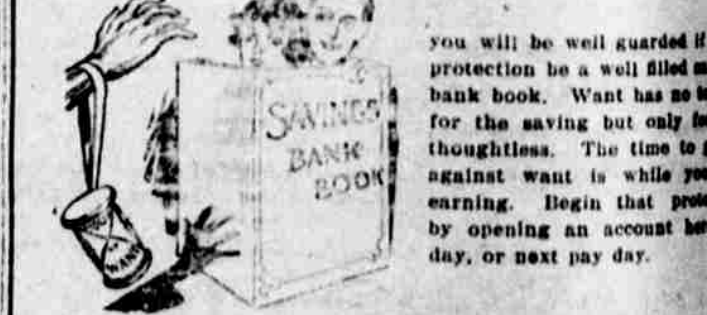
