

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"JESUS ONLY"

Jesus took Peter, James and John with him to the top of a high mountain. I am sure it was quiet and lonely up there. Jesus seems to have had a liking for lonely places.

On the mountain top Jesus was transfigured. Moses and Elias appeared and talked to him. A cloud overshadowed them and when it was gone the disciples looked and saw "Jesus only." There the men were up above the noise, and strife, and fog of the valley with Jesus only.

While there in the mountain with Jesus only, they were safely away from the crowd that thronged the steps of Jesus, morning, noon and night; some wanting loaves and fishes, others physical healing, others listening to every word He said, for the purpose of entangling Him in His speech; and others were there for the purpose of taking the places of honor, if Jesus should at that time set up His kingdom.

I am not at all surprised that Peter wanted to stay there on the mountain top, far away from the selfishness, sin and temptation of the valley.

But after those three men had spent a little time on the mountain top with Jesus only, He led them back down into the valley where there was work to do.

There are two lessons to learn from this incident, or rather one lesson with both a Godward and manward side to it. It is well for every Christian to spend some time with Jesus only, talking with Jesus only, listening to Jesus only, looking at Jesus only. But from the mountain top of divine fellowship we must

descend to the valley of human toil. It is divine fellowship that transforms the heart and puts the spirit of service into the soul. When John the Baptist saw Jesus on the banks of the Jordan, he said to his disciples, "Behold the Lamb of God," and Andrew and John followed Jesus to his home or lodging place. They spent the rest of the day with Him. That afternoon which those two men spent alone with Jesus seems to have put the spirit of service into their souls. We find Andrew going at once and bringing his brother to Jesus and John never ceased working to bring men, women and children into the fold of Christ.

In this age of spiritual want it would seem impossible for any one to spend much time with Jesus only, and not catch the spirit of service; on the other hand no one can accomplish any real work for man who has not spent some time alone with Jesus.

The person who has never been alone with Jesus knows nothing of the deeper experience of life nor of the higher joys of existence. You may remember the story of the accursed mountain in Italy. It is all ice and snow, no trees, no birds, no life. The legend has it that in ancient times it was a beautiful mountain, covered with trees, and grass and flowers, and called "the Garden of the Lord." One day the Lord of the garden came and the shepherds threw stones at him and drove him away. After that it became a place of ice and rocks and desolation. So it is today with every one who drives away the spirit of the Lord. If we spend no time with "Jesus only," we soon drive Him from the soul.

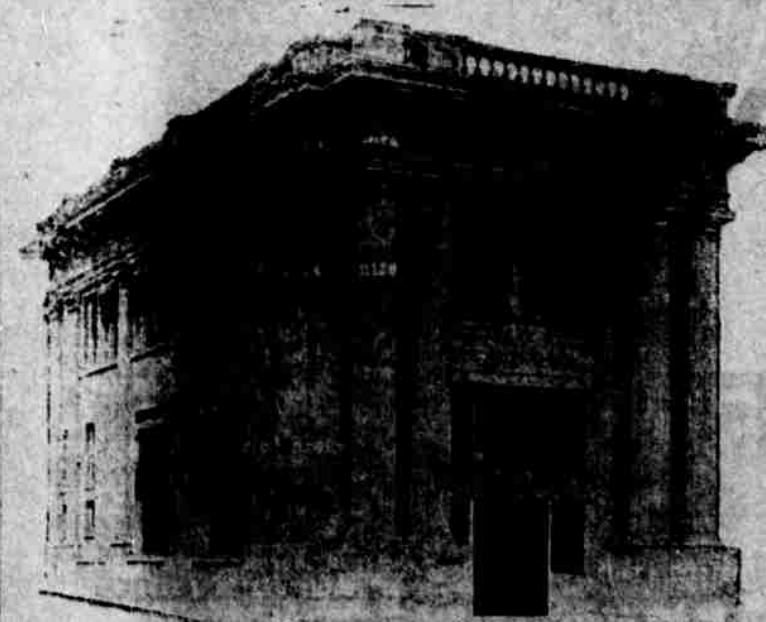

Would Make Insanity a Cause for Divorce

SALEM, Feb. 6.—S. B. 309, introduced by Langguth, of Multnomah, adds a new section to the laws specifying the causes for which divorces may be granted. Permanent insanity is made the additional cause but it is provided that no divorce shall be granted for insanity unless the defendant shall have been regularly adjudged to be of unsound mind by the legally constituted authorities of Oregon or of some other state, at

least five years prior to the beginning of the action and unless it shall appear to the satisfaction of the court by the testimony of competent witnesses that the insanity of the defendant is incurable.

Another new bill originating in the senate is No. 301, by Hawley, which abolishes the unsalaried office of state biologist whose duties now come under the game code. The position has been held by A. R. Sweetser, of Eugene.

NOTABLES TO VISIT SAN DIEGO FAIR

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 6.—Bringing one of the most notable lists of passengers ever carried by an ocean liner on her maiden voyage, the Great Northern Pacific Steamship company's liner, Great Northern, will reach this port February 11, with 600 travelers to see the San Diego exposition.

When the Great Northern sailed from New York January 27, every available stateroom was occupied.

Among those who are making the trip to the Pacific Coast to see the two expositions are: George F. Baker, vice-president of the First National bank of New York; Samuel G. Blythe; Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic National Committee and owner of the Buffalo Times; John Ringling, of circus fame; Irving S. Cobb; George Horace Lorimer, editor of the Saturday Evening Post; Joseph W. Bacon, vice-president of the Chicago and Great Western railroad, and H. H. Tamman, of Denver, who is playing host to a party of eight Colorado travelers.

The liner Northern Pacific, sister ship to the Great Northern, will leave New York for San Diego on March 25.

After leaving this port both ships will proceed to San Francisco, where the passengers will visit the Panama-Pacific exposition in that city.
