STARTING THEM RIGHT

THE "PIG CLUB" idea, which is now sweeping the state, is one of the most practical encouragements offered to the agricultural training of the youngsters of the state that has been made since the "back to the farm" idea became so pronounced. In this, the boys who are found to be energetic are furnished with a well-bred brood sow, bred to a standard boar, in order to give them a proper start in the hog raising industry.

But the animals are not given free of charge. A promissory note, bearing a standard rate of interest, and allowing quite a stretch of time for payment, executed by the boy, with his parent or guardian as surety, is tendered as payment for the pig. In this way, from the increase, the embryo stock raiser is in a position to pay for the pig himself.

How well he succeeds in this, and how much money he has after paying for the pig, are, of course, matters that are up to the boy. If he applies himself seriously to hog raising, his returns are, of course, that much better, and this is the prime factor of the movement, to get the youngsters properly started in hog raising, learning for themselves early the secrets of successful marketing. The business side of farming has been too long neglected, and the aim of the present "pig club" is to give practical training in this to those who in after years will conduct the state's agriculture.

This is a movement that parents should encourage their children in. That it is a movement highly commendable is shown by the attitude of the two local banks, who have gladly agreed to finance the plan in Klamath county by taking in the notes for hogs by the youngsters.

THE SEX OF THE INSANE

OF APPROXIMATELY every five hundred persons in the United States in 1910, there was one inmate of an insane asylum.

The exact figures expressed in a recent report of the census bureau, state that in a typical community of 200,000 persons, equally divided as to sex, 208 of the males and 200 of the females would be found in the insane asylums. In the course of a year, seventy-two males and sixty females would be admitted to the asylums.

In 1880 the total number of inmates in insane asylums in the United States included 20,635 males and 20,307 females. Thirty years later the number of male inmates had increased to 98,695, and the number of female inmates to 80,096. The excess of men among admissions in 1910 indicated a still further increase in the proportion, namely, 128 males to 100 females.

An analysis of these admissions as to the specific forms of insanity involved brings to light the interesting fact that if alcoholic psychosis and general paralysis are deducted, the proportion of the sexes is practically the same. The diseases mentioned, says the Journal of the American Medical Association, would seem to be those which, generally, are the result of disipation.

LEGAL DECISION
ON SCHOOL WORK

IT IS DECIDED THAT IN CASE SCHOOL IS CLOSED WITHOUT CONSENT OF TEACHER, SHE IS ENTITLED TO PAY

If school is closed by the board without consent of the teachers, they are entitled to their salaries for any holiday that may occur during such vacation, but if teachers consent to a vacation for one week, and a holiday occurred during such week, and there was no agreement regarding salaries for the time school was closed, then teachers are not entitled to pay for such holiday.

Since announcement regarding the "pig club" plan for Klamath county was made in this column, with reference to financial aid being given by the First State & Savings bank and the First National bank, there has been much attention given the matter. Already the question is receiving serious consideration at a number of schools, some of which are Merrill, Bonanza, Fairview, Worden and Summers district.

Teachers have been making inquiry at the county superintendent's office, and there have also been a number of pupils at Mr. Peterson's office asking regarding the plan and securing application blanks.

There is a possibility that in addition to pigs, the boys and girls of the county will be given a chance to secure sheep under the same conditions. Mr. Peterson is at work on this plan now.
