CASH-IN-ADVANCE makes it possible for the mail order merchant to make a close price on goods, as buying for cash, he secures a better price.

Any merchant will bear out this statement. And along this line, we respectfully submit the following, entitled "Living on Other People's Money", and taken from an exchange, for the consideration of our readers:

How many people in this community are living on their own money? If the question was put to each person individually he unquestionably would answer that he is living on his own funds.

But are we really living on our own money? Let's dig down under the surface and see what we find.

For the sake of argument, we will assume that you are running an account with the grocery, and the butcher, and possibly other merchants.

You pay, of course, but perhaps you make settlement only every sixty or ninety days. Some even pay their bills only twice a year.

Now was it your money that paid the wholesaler for the goods you are using and for which you have not paid, or was it the merchant's? And if it was the merchant's and you have not paid him, is it your money you are living on until settlement day, or is it his?

We contend that fully one-half the people are living from day to day on other people's money, and by so doing, they are themselves directly contributing to the present high cost of living.

Now control your rising anger for a moment, and we will humbly endeavor to show you why you are keeping prices up.

The average mercantile stock costs several thousands of dollars, and it must be paid for in cash or the merchant must obtain a line of credit from the wholesaler. And when he buys his goods on credit he pays a higher price for them.

In turn you buy your goods from the merchant on credit, and he in self defense, must add still an additional "safety" profit. In other words, he must charge more than a cash price in order to protect himself from the certainty of loss consequent upon slow collections, bad debt and other annoyances.

Thus two "safety" profits are added to the original selling price of the article. Do you see how it works—how the price is boosted? If every customer paid spot cash for his goods the merchant in turn could do the same with the wholesaler, thereby securing from the latter a discount for cash of possibly 8 to 10 per cent.

Doesn't it appear to be to the advantage of everybody in this community to wipe out the baneful credit system and buy and sell for cash? How does it appear to you?

CONCERNING OUR SCHOOLS

Matters of Interest to Pupils, Patrons, Teachers, Taxpayers

Editor's Note—In this department it is the intention of The Herald to present as much as possible, matters concerning the schools of Klamath county, and which concerns not only the teachers and pupils, but the board of directors and all other persons in each district. In order to make it serve this purpose in the best possible manner, the co-operation of each school district is urged, and we will be glad to get before our readers things that the schools are interested in. DIRECTOR CAN BE HELD TO ACCOUNT

SCHOOL BOARD BUSINESS CONDUCTED OUTSIDE OF REGULAR MEETING MAKES INDIVIDUAL MEMBER LIABLE

Probably one of the most common, and at the same time one of the most dangerous practices indulged in by school boards is the matter of signing Teachers contracts, and transacting other business affairs of the district outside of a regular school board meeting.

A contract signed outside of a regular board meeting is not binding upon the district, but does make the board members personally liable.

As a matter of business, as well as a protection to the board members, all business relating to the district should be transacted at regularly called meetings.

TEN SANITARY COMMANDMENTS FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

In every school which may be considered passably sanitary the following conditions shall obtain:

- 1. Heating by at least a properly jacketed stove. (No unjacketed stove to be allowed.)
2. Ventilation by direct outdoor air inlets and by adequate and direct four air outlets.
3. Lighting from left side of room (or from left and rear) through window space at least one-fifth of floor space in area.
4. Cleanliness of school as good as in the home of a careful housekeeper.
5. Furniture sanitary in kind, and easily and frequently cleaned. Seats and desks adjustable and hygienic in type.
6. Drinking water from a pure source provided by a sanitary drinking fountain.
7. Facilities for washing hands, and individual towels.
8. Toilets and privies sanitary in type and in care (with no cesspools unless water tight) and no neglected privy boxes or vaults.
9. Flies and mosquitos excluded by thorough screening of schoolhouse and toilets.
10. Obsecene and defacing marks absolutely absent from schoolhouse and privies.
11. Playground of adequate size for every rural school.—Prepared by Dr. T. D. Wood, Columbia University, Chairman of the National Council of Education.

EDUCATIONAL ACTS PASSED AT SALEM

RESUME OF THE MORE IMPORTANT LEGISLATIVE MATTERS CONCERNING SCHOOLS THAT PASSED THIS SESSION

The following educational bills have passed both Houses of the legislature:

- H. B. No. 144, relating to the qualifications of the county superintendent of schools. Under this statute he must have at least twenty-seven months teaching experience, twelve of which shall have been in Oregon, and in addition he must hold a certificate or diploma, which will entitle him to teach in any of the public, elementary and public high schools of the state.
H. B. No. 158, relating to the power of school districts to levy a tax upon real or personal property within their district. Levies made by school districts to be reviewed by the district boundary board.
H. B. No. 413, and act to provide for a more adequate notice of school district meetings and to provide for the publication of a budget of the estimated revenues required for the ensuing year. It is hereby made the duty of district clerks to publish in a newspaper in the district, or if one is not published to post in conspicuous places, a budget of the estimated amount of revenue required for the ensuing school year for the maintenance of the school district.
H. B. No. 167, relative to counties holding agricultural fairs. This bill makes the county superintendent, ex-officio, a member of the county fair board.
S. B. No. 137, to prevent discrimination in payment of salaries between male and female teachers. For equal work, school boards are required to provide equal pay.
The Senate killed the bill providing that parents be given a right to vote in school elections. At present only taxpayers may vote at school elections.
The House killed the bill providing that eight months be made the minimum school term in Oregon.
