A CHANCE TO MAKE GOOD

THE OREGON agricultural college is to be "carried" to the farmers of Klamath county next week. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, sessions will be held in the Klamath county high school, and Thursday, Friday and Saturday the same lectures, etc., will be given at Merrill. The extent of the benefits of such a course depends upon the attendance, and Klamath Falls people should make it a point to see that every farmer, dairyman and stockraiser is interested in the course.

The methods to be talked of by the six lecturers are practical methods, that are advised only after exhaustive tests which have proved their merits. There is no man so perfect in his calling, no matter how long he has followed it, but what he can always glean a few more valuable pointers, and it is folly to say that any man or woman could attend the courses and not be benefited thereby. The open forums, conducted after each lecture, when the problems of the individual farmer will be discussed, are alone well worth the trouble of coming to town.

The growth of Klamath county depends largely upon the development of Klamath county agriculture, and anything that will tend to help the farmer along should, therefore, receive the enthusiastic support of all our people. Let us, therefore, boost the short course next week to every man and woman we see.

It is agreed by all residents of Klamath Falls that they have the interests of the Klamath county farmer at heart. A good time to demonstrate this is next week, when the short course sessions are on. The Klamath Chamber of Commerce and the Women's Civic League have started a most meritorious movement toward the entertainment of the visitors in preparing for the big luncheon and motion picture show Tuesday. But it must not stop here. The Klamath farmer has many problems to contend with. Not the least of these is marketing. A good time to discuss these matters with him will be Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, when he is here with leisure time. A little inquiry among the farmers will outline some of the institutions that will benefit the rural communities, and after learning of these, the members of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, the Business Men's association and the other citizens of Klamath Falls will have an opportunity to prove that their interest in the farmer is unselfishly sincere by taking action to bring about measures that will advance the interests of the farmer.

Curling, a Popular Winter Sport



The old Scotch sport of curling, played by a few in the United States for nearly 100 years, has become very popular this winter, particularly as a winter amusement for members of golf clubs. In Canada it is played from the Atlantic to the Pacific and about Manitoba numbers its devotees by the thousands.

Nelson's Encyclopedia gives the following description of curling:

"For three centuries the home of curling has been in Scotland, where clubs are numbered by the hundred. But it is popular also in some parts of Canada, the United States and a few other countries. Research has thrown little light upon the place of its birth, though everything points to a Flemish origin. It is believed to have been introduced into Scotland in the sixteenth century.

"A rink of smooth, keen ice having been chosen, the curler makes a tee at one end and a tee at the other end, forty yards apart, the tees being connected by a straight line drawn on the ice. From each tee, as center, a circle of seven feet radius is then drawn, as well as a touch line, at right angles to the center line on the far side of each circle. Six inches from the point where the two lines meet, and to the left of the center line (looking toward the other tee) a circle of three inches radius is described at each end of the rink. On this tiny circle every right-handed player must place his left foot (whether he stands on the ice or a mat) when in the act of delivering the stone; and a similar circle must be drawn, if need be, on the right of the center line for the convenience of left-handed players. At a distance from each tee, usually reckoned as one-sixth of the length of the rink, a wavy line is drawn, which bears the name of the 'hog score'; and precisely at the center of the rink a straight line is drawn, called the 'middle line.' It is necessary to repeat everything

(save the middle line) in duplicate, for the reason that the game is played from each end alternately. Every stone that does not cross the 'hog score' is treated as 'dead' and removed from the ice.

"The rink having been prepared, the skip, or captain makes up his team (four a side in matches), and play begins. Each player has a broom and two curling stones which shall not be more than thirty-six inches in circumference or be more than one-eighth the circumference in height. There are eight ways in which scoring is made, and the highest possible score is seventy-two. The first player on a side stands back of the tee, and sends the stone along the ice to the other tee, and the other players follow in turn. Every stone within the seven foot circle is counted, and the highest score wins. The brooms are used to sweep clear the path of the stone, according to the captain's orders or the rules of the game."
