## WAR HORRORS

A PERSON, hearing an abattoir is warned of its proximity by the odors arising from it. In the same way the news from Europe during the past four months has filled the souls of men with the odors that have been rising from the shambles there. These have, during the past ten days, been accentuated by the cataclysm that came when the earthquake mobilized its forces and took up its march across Italy.

"On horror's head horrors accumulate," until we are "sup'd full of horrors."

They are having their effect upon the world; unconsciously men are yielding to the sinister influence. Had there been no war the news from Italy would here this have started relief ships on the way to Italy and the Red Cross would have been urgent in its sphere of help, even as followed the Messina catastrophe.

When men are dying their secretions cease and while friends around them are weeping, they shed no tears. Are the finer instincts of men breaking down under accumulating evidences that mercy has deserted the earth and the old brutal methods of primitive man have assumed full sway? It looks that way.

When a people rise up to break unbearable fetters that tyranny has riveted upon them their war is a holy one and the world's sympathies wrap them 'round and the world grows better and tenderer watching them. But when a mighty war is launched upon the world for no purpose except to minister to the lust of conquest, to extend power and commerce and gratify unholly ambitions, then it becomes only a mighty juggernaut, and while its red wheels are crushing out human lives, making a barren fallow of fertile fields, grinding into ruins noble cities with their glories of art and architecture, the ruin does not stop with the destruction. The shadow of it, falling on the souls of men, benumbs them—their higher attributes cease to act, like dying men they have lost the power to weep.

The disaster of the present war in Europe extends far beyond its local boundaries. It makes men distrustful of their fellow men; its tendency is to make men question the motives of their fellow men; to doubt the divinity of charity and love—almost to doubt the mercy of God.

As yet there are no signs that any one of the nations engaged has any desire to end the struggle except on its own terms and so the juggernaut continues to roll on; the burden of the news each day is but the story of new battles and the odor from the mighty abattoirs continue to taint the world's atmosphere. For us there is nothing to do except to plant a larger area than was ever before harvested, and try to keep our charities warm and to prepare our people so far as possible against any such catastrophe as is now threatening to wreck civilization itself in the old world.—Goodwin's Weekly.

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned until Monday, the 8th day of March, 1916, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., of said day, at the city hall, in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, (and at such time and place all proposals received will be opened), for the purchase of \$19,040.76 city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, coupon improvement bonds, payable ten years from date of issue, bearing a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the office of the city treasurer or at the Fiscal Agency of the state of Oregon, in New York, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of America. Said bonds will be issued in denominations not exceeding \$500.00 each, and numbered from 1 to —, inclusive. Said bonds are authorized by Ordinance No. 349, of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for the purpose of providing funds to pay the cost of improving Third street, from Main street to California avenue, including intersections.
