AT LEAST "REPAIR NOW"

IN VARIOUS parts of the country "build now" and other movements have been started to boom business. It is, of course, difficult to persuade people to alter individual plans to help on a general movement. But still there are many cases where people could promote their own interests as well as set money in circulation in this way.

Contractors would build a house today cheaper, in all probabilities, than they would a year from now. Repair jobs would in some cases be cheaper, and in any event vexatious delays could be saved by anticipating one's wants.

Most people let buildings go too long without necessary renovation. Money saved by economizing in house paint may not really be saved by any means. The impression gets abroad that a house is run down, and if one wants to sell, he finds it has acquired a poor reputation. Paint preserves building material.

Farmers in particular are often slack. They let buildings grow weather-beaten, actually increasing future repair bills, besides giving a general impression that they are unprogressive. Store keepers do not realize keenly enough the advantage of an attractive interior. They need to do over walls and ceilings frequently, they give the impression of untidiness that hurts trade. No man can prosper in business without keeping up the appearance of his location.

If every householder, every merchant and every farmer would look over his buildings critically, and spend at once the money that ought to be laid out, and which he could afford, for the good of the property and his business, a big step would be taken toward restoring full prosperity.—Oregon City Enterprise.

AUTOISTS SUFFER IF THESE BILLS PASS

HARRISBURG, Feb. 27.—Practically every automobile owner in Pennsylvania would have to junk his car or migrate and every manufacturer or dealer in motor vehicles would have to readjust his business. If a measure presented by Senator F. P. Croft, of Montgomery county, should be passed. The bill provides:

"That it should be unlawful to sell or offer for sale, or operate on any public motor highway, or permit to be operated on any public highway, any motor vehicle which can be driven at a speed greater than 30 miles per hour, on an ordinary level highway."

Violations are punishable by a \$500 fine or one year in prison.

The bill is designated to prevent reckless and fast driving. About 90,000 owners or cars would come under the provisions of the measure.

Four other bills affecting motor vehicles have appeared in the assembly. One of the most drastic is sponsored by Representative R. J. Baldwin, of Delaware. It is aimed at reckless drivers, asserting that the reason why "there are not more persons maimed or killed each year is a matter of good luck," and declares "it is entirely improper for the state to permit the use of highways for destruction of life or property without making adequate provisions for compensating the losses."

As a remedy Representative Baldwin proposes that the state settle all damages caused by automobiles, the state being reimbursed by bringing the offending party to terms, and defraying costs by raising the license fees for motor vehicles.

All drivers of motor vehicles would be compelled to secure a certificate from a physician that their eyesight is unimpaired and their physical condition such as to qualify them to operate cars, in a bill offered by Senator Washburn, of New York. It is estimated that this would cost the motorists \$1,250,000 annually in examination fees.

Representative Davis of Lackawanna, would forbid the operation of any motor vehicle by a person under 15 years, unless such person is accompanied by a licensed chauffeur. The bill would also prevent the issuance of licenses to persons between 15 and 18 years of age, unless competency to operate a car shall be sworn to by two licensed drivers.

A bill that has brought forth a hasty wall from the motorists is that presented by Representative Mangan, of Pittsburgh. The measure would permit all cities to levy a license tax upon all resident automobile owners, equal to the state tax "for revenue purposes." This would make it possible for the cities to add a million dollars to their bank accounts.

Widows more than 60 years old with children and unable to earn a livelihood will get a pension of \$15 a month for themselves and \$6 for each child under the terms of a mother's pension bill unanimously passed recently by the Arizona legislature.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON**"Pressing Toward the Mark"**

"Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect; but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus. Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Philippians, 3:12-14.

The important word is "mark." It is the end aim or goal upon which Paul has his eye. It is the one thing which Paul is trying to apprehend or attain. It is, in short, perfection of character. To be like Christ was the mark which Paul had set before his soul. In his letter to the Christians at Philippi he confessed that he was not yet reached the mark, but is pressing toward it.

Here is the point: If Paul with his wonderful Christian experience, noble character and deep learning, had to put forth an effort like an athlete running a race to follow in the steps of Jesus, how far along that line can some of us, who are less favored, hope to get when we put forth no effort at all?

In almost every church there are a few people who have a reputation for Christian piety which rests upon a chain of negations. I mean to say that while they have a reputation for being good, no man could tell you what they are good for. They only boast of how gloriously the Lord saved them years ago, and since then they have been satisfied to do nothing.

We should not be surprised to find that in the realm of the soul Paul's hope of attainment rested upon the effort he was putting forth. In every other realm of life success comes out of intelligent, strenuous effort. Even in the vegetable world the tree that grows best is the one that works most energetically. Only a few weeks ago a most eminent scientist wrote a readable piece on how the active, aggressive trees of the forest drive out the less vigorous trees of the forest from the more favored spots of the earth. If a forest tree cannot grow without life and energy enough to put forth an effort, is it not strange that a Christian should expect to grow without effort, when the same God made both the tree and man?

In the animal world, the lowest quadruped lives a life of toil. Every victory it wins costs an effort.

In the long ago man learned that he had to struggle to subdue thorns and thistles. That he had to toil for his raiment. Indeed, so well have we learned this, that we know, whenever we obtain any good thing in the material world we are getting that which somebody has toiled to produce. This same law of attainment through effort holds good in the intellectual world and in the realm of the soul.

I find nothing in the Bible to encourage the sluggard. When Paul the aged looked back over the life he had lived, he said: "I have fought a good fight." Following in the steps of Jesus cost Paul a struggle, neither did he expect success to come from any other quarter.

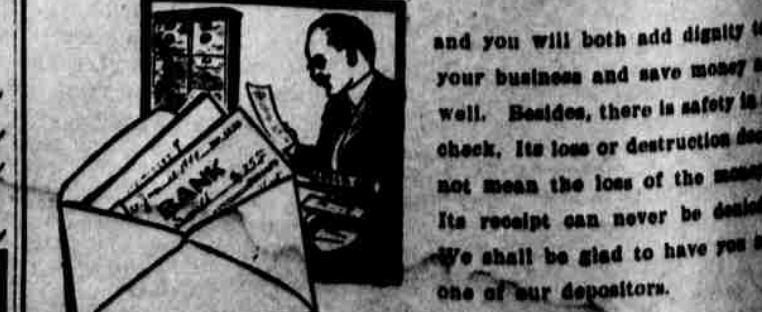
