PREPARE FOR PEACE

ON ALL SIDES there is evidence that when snow again flies the warring European countries will be either at peace or seeking a cessation of hostilities. The slaughter of men is something appalling, and cannot go on forever.

Furthermore, some of the belligerents are already feeling famine, and hunger will soon bring a fighting people to their senses. Starving men cannot fight, nor men make good soldiers when they know that their loved ones at home are without food of any kind.

Assuming that peace is to be considered, what will follow? Eliminate all consideration of the terms which will eventually be agreed upon and give some thought to what will be conditions in this country.

Prospects are that immigration from Europe will be limited for several years. People leave their home countries only when they are victims of persecution or when they find they are unable to earn a living wage.

When the war shall have stopped there will be devastation on all sides. The wreckage must be removed and new buildings must be erected. The fields which have been converted into ditches and stables must be rehabilitated before crops can be grown.

The money which was in the world before the war started is still here, somewhere, and it will be forthcoming for the establishing of industries of every character. This means good wages for the workers, and they will not be inclined to migrate. In the United States the factory wheels will be whirling and labor will be employed.

The European countries will want enormous quantities of American lumber and other building materials. This will also contribute to an unparalleled prosperity and greatly enhance the value of all realty in the United States.

Instead of engaging in war, the American people should prepare for peace and be in position to take advantage of the situation. "In time of war, prepare for peace."

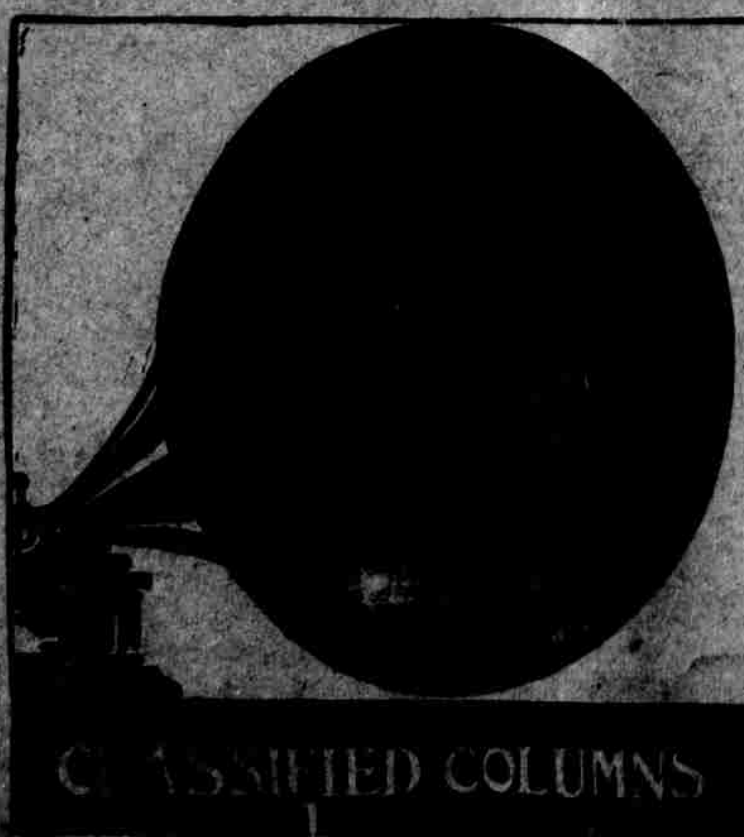

"Hundred and Fifty"

This Is Name for Belgium's Daredevil Do-It-Alls

is now between Belgians and the Germans.

The two fronts pass along the course of the Year in a general way, the battle line occupying the roads and islands. The only means of advance in the ordinary way is along the roads, practically an impossibility, since one machine gun can hold off a regiment. To take the islands, the troops must wade from knee to neck deep in the ice cold sea water or cross on rafts or scows, an equally impossible feat during daylight hours. Stealth must be the keynote of every advance along this part of the line, and black nights are the only screens available for troops here. It is the work of the "Hundred and Fifty" to prepare these surprises, or, as frequently happens, since attacks by large numbers of infantry have become impossible on account of the water, to make the dash themselves.

Here is an illustration: It was learned that the Germans had established themselves on one of the many islands jutting out of the inundation, and were using it for various effective operations. An observer posted in the massive tower of a mediaeval church there was giving most deadly instructions by telephone to the German batteries of eight-inch guns situated so far back that the much lighter Belgian guns were ineffective against them. Something had to be done to put this outpost out of commission.

The first night twenty men went out to capture the island, it being believed that it was occupied by only eight or ten men. None of the twenty came back.

The next night one of the "Hundred and Fifty" left the Belgian lines alone, swimming. When he returned shortly before daylight he astonished everybody by reporting the tiny island held by two lone sentinels. A large island, however, some 200 yards further back, held some 250 men, and between this island and the tower ran a causeway made of brush tied in bundles. The sentries threw up illuminating bombs at regular intervals, and upon discovering the approach of the enemy, they gave the alarm whereupon reinforcements ran over the causeway, took positions upon a tiny fort built around the tower, and by the aid of machine guns stood their ground.

The following night fifty men started for the island in scows which swimmers and waders pulled silently through the flood. They halted just outside the range of the illuminating bombs and the scout of the night before went forward alone. Two bombs

in succession would be the signal for the party to land quickly. Fifteen minutes of absolute silence followed, and then two balls of fire rose and floated in the black night. The fifty men shot forward.

They landed without opposition. The body of a dead German lay on the ground. It was Sentry No. 1. His helmet was missing, as was his coat. On the breastworks about the tower a few feet away stood what appeared to be a German, beckoning to the Belgians. Inside the trench beside a machine gun lay Sentry No. 2. The Belgian had slain both without a sound with his thin sword, the first by surprise, the second by impersonating the first.

While destroying the brush causeway the Germans on the little island nearby found out what was going on, and attacked. They were repulsed, and the twenty Belgians of the night before were more than avenged. Today the Belgians occupy the island and its tower, though daily battered by German artillery, serves as an observation post. In their turn, beside keeping a permanent defense force on the island, the Belgians have connected it to their first line of trenches.

The men of the "Hundred and Fifty" are anonymous. It is said that many of them are nobles. The man who, single-handed, captured the tower without making a sound, so the correspondent was told, was a Brussels lawyer of national reputation, who, when he volunteered for the service, presented himself in a frock coat and a silk hat.

WILSON BRIDGE HELD "UNSAFE"

COUNTY COURT WILL POST NOTICES TO THIS EFFECT—NEW CROSSING WILL BE BUILT IN NEAR FUTURE

Signs stating that the bridge is unsafe that those crossing it do so at their own risk have been prepared, and will be posted on the Wilson bridge across Lost River, near the diversion dam, by order of the county court.

It is the intention of the court to replace this bridge with another structure, most probably of steel, before long. The details for the new bridge have yet to be worked out.

BREWERY TO BE MADE CREAMERY

LITTLE OLD PLANT WILL REMAIN RIGHT ALONG, BUT PRODUCT WILL BE CHANGED THE FIRST OF NEXT YEAR

A cold storage plant will also be run in connection with the creamery.
