An American Made Dance Frock

Allies' Move Against German Commerce Told by Naval Head

In Copyright Interview With United Press, French Minister of Maritime Explains the Policy the Allies Will Adopt in Starvation Campaign

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PARIS, March 8.—"Germany's doom has been sounded. The allies have answered inhuman warfare with a death-dealing stroke," Victor Augagneur, the French minister of marine, declared in an exclusive interview with the United Press today.

"Not another ship shall reach Germany if we can help it—and we think we can," said the head of France's navy. "We have observed from the start all the rules of civilized warfare. Germany has broken them all, putting herself on the plane of the savage. Well, we'll starve her out," and he smiled a grim smile of confidence, as if there was no doubt whatever of the ability of the French and English navies to meet the task before them.

"But Admiral von Tirpitz says that Germany will starve out England," it was suggested.

"That's just a bluff," said Augagneur. "Germany is utterly unable to make good her threat. People say Germany has secretly built many large submarines. I know better. I know within two or three exactly how many she has, and neither England nor France is the least frightened. She may sink a ship now and then. This is inevitable. But in the end what good will this do her? The outcome of the war will not be changed one iota."

"The threat to starve out England by torpedoing her merchantmen is the same brand as the threats to destroy London and Paris by means of Zeppelins. What if a Zeppelin actually visited Paris and London? It might kill a hundred or two, or possibly three hundred non-combatants. But what is it? It would be merely an achievement—a record of savagery, but the final result would in no way be affected."

"What could the Zeppelins do if they flew over the English and French fleet?"

"I will not even consider that," he said. "They will go to pieces without outside aid if they tear. With the tremendous bulks exposed to our fire, short work would be made of them."

"What is your Mediterranean fleet doing?"

"Waiting for the enemy to pick up enough courage to show himself," was the laughing reply.

I remarked that perhaps the Austrians might leave the Adriatic and give battle to the Anglo-French fleet at the Dardanelles. Augagneur chuckled.

"We wouldn't ask anything better," he said. "That's what we have been trying to bring about since the war started."

"You don't anticipate any interruption of the advance to Constantinople then?"

"We shall not let up until the city

falls. We do not expect to open the Dardanelles without an effort, but we will get through in good time. Just how long that will be I can't say, because it depends on many things. The hardest work will be from the middle of the Dardanelles to the Sea of Marmora. Once our fleet is through comparatively little will remain to be accomplished."

"What effect would the fall of Constantinople have on the war?"

"It would be far-reaching. That is certain," he replied with emphasis. "But it is difficult to foretell the exact results. It certainly would be one of the turning points of the war."

"Do you foresee any trouble between the United States and Germany over the war zone proclamation?"

"I don't believe Germany is stupid enough to fire on American ships," he replied. "I am unable to see what she could possibly gain, for certainly such an act would not be calculated to increase American sympathy for her. But still, as Lord Bessford said to the London correspondent of the United Press, Germany might sink an American ship in order to save her face by bringing the United States

into the war, and then claiming the world was against her."

"What about the Dacia?"

"There will be no trouble over the Dacia," said Augagneur. "The relations between France and America have always been friendly. I do not anticipate the slightest trouble in this instance."

"Are you satisfied with the work of the fleet so far?"

"Amplify. We have done our share, and have sustained comparatively no losses. If we haven't done more it is because the enemy hasn't given us an opportunity."

"You do not fear a German surprise and loss of mastery of the sea, then?" I remarked on leaving.

"We don't fear any surprise Germany has to offer, either in the air, the sea or under the sea," said Mr. Augagneur, with a satisfied smile.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

PHILADELPHIA, March 8.—The well known depths of despair hold Philadelphia's hopes for a pennant this season. Even the most optimistic fans cannot see themselves standing in line for world's series duets next October. Both teams have had the severest shake-ups this winter in their history, and only a miracle can bring either of them to the tape ahead of fourteen other teams.

The disintegration of the Athletics famous machine is the hardest blow. Philadelphia fans had come to look upon a world's series as an annual affair with Philadelphia—one that was theirs by divine right, or something of that sort—and the crash that shot the amorous aggregation into history shook them to their toes.

The justly famous "\$100,000 infield" now looks like thirty cents—some of the more belligerent even assert that the three should be erased. The famous "Barry to Collins to McInnis" that figured daily in the box scores is gone. Quaker fans began to sit up and take notice when Bender and Plank, the two men who have brought pennants to Philadelphia year after year with their sterling performances were gone. Then came the Collins deal. That left their hopes stunned a bit more. Before they had time to recover, Frank Baker, king bee swatter of all world's series, announced he was through. That was the proverbial last straw.

Mack is now back where he was five or six years ago. True, he still has Barry and McInnis, but the pair seems like the skeleton of a once

solid structure. The addition of Larry Lajoie is going to help some, but the veteran is slowing up; he had a bad year last season with the Naps, and he is viewed with some skepticism. Kopf, the little utility infielder, will try to fill Baker's shoes at third, but is woefully weak. He only batted .182 in 34 games last season.

Mack had his old outfield to begin with—Strunk, Oldering and Murphy. He is well fortified behind the plate with Lapp and Schang, but his pitching staff should cause him some worry. Bush, Pennock, Wyckoff, Shawkey and Bressler do not stack up favorably with the Gregg, Wood, Leonard, Collins and Foster combination which Boston boasts of, or the Cleotis, Scott, Benz, Russell, Peber contingent upon which White Sox fans rest their hope.

Another thing which is undoubtedly going to have an effect on the team is the absence of the four old stars. They are going to feel strange feeling the enemy without them—that old confidence and cock-sureness that won them many games isn't going to be there.

The Phillies are about in the same boat with their fellow townsmen. There, too, is the absence of old stars going to be felt. Sherwood, Mays, a mighty son of swat, has gone to Boston, and his old running mate, Honus Lobert, will be seen in a Cincinnati uniform this season. Charley Deal has gone to Cincinnati. The Phils didn't have a whole lot to start the season with last year, thanks to Jim Gilmore's raiding cohorts, but they have less this season.

LOWER TAXES

IN BOTH Oregon and Washington appropriations have been reduced, offices are being abolished and official salaries reduced.

Officials, boards and institutions in both states will not be allowed the freedom of the past in disbursing the public funds.

A good precedent was established by Governor Withycombe of Oregon in promoting County Judge Daly of Lakeview to be circuit judge for keeping down taxes and getting his county out of debt.

Field engineers in the service of the water board are reduced in salary from \$150 to \$125 per month.

The office of state architect was abolished, as he would have drawn a salary of \$4,500 for three years, and the work could be done cheaper on a commission basis.

Governor Withycombe vetoed creation of three new judicial districts, and appointed two democrats to judgehips.
