MAINTAINING COMMUNITY VIGOR

THE BONDS that unite every community are of a threefold character—social, political and commercial. From time to time and under varying conditions, any one of these factors may seem to dominate a community, but no community can long survive the neglect of its citizens to perform their social, political and commercial obligations, or any one of them.

For example, every other activity, even existence itself, is dependent upon commerce, upon trade—the production and sale of the necessities and luxuries of life. Hence it is folly to argue that a community can long continue to perform its social and political functions after trade ceases. Trade and trade alone actually produces wealth—the community's life blood—while social and political activities consume them.

But even trade can not perpetuate itself in the absence of society and social intercourse, because man is so constituted that he can not be either contented or happy in solitude. He must have the companionship, the sympathy and the help of his fellows. Moreover, both society and trade need for their protection and perpetuation the safeguards thrown about them by government and law—the embodiments of political action.

A community is therefore an organism, a machine with complicated parts, and a disease or disturbance of one part deranges the whole.

Thoughtless citizens sometimes ignore this basic fact, and neglect or fail to give their communities the necessary support, with the result that disaster overtakes first the community and, ultimately, the citizens themselves. The effects of neglect of this kind are not always immediately apparent, but the injuries inflicted are none the less serious. The strong, vigorous and prosperous community is that in which citizens patronize their home merchants and participate in its political and social activities.

BILLIARD HALLS

DO YOU who play billiards ever wonder how the balls are made? The best material is the tusks of cow elephants. Their tusks are not so curved as those of the male, and the fine "nerve passage" cannot be traced so clearly.

When ivory dries, say those who make the balls, it shrinks. The shrinkage is greater in width than it is in length, in the case of the tusk.

SAYS CAN GET 36 BOTTLES A MONTH

MATHEMATICAL RESIDENT OF LONG DRY COUNTY FIGURES IN SHORT MEASURE AS LIFE SAYER IN DRY TIMES

ALBANY, March 10.—"Twenty-four quarts of beer equals 36 quarts." This was not what the legislature intended when it passed provisions for the enforcement of the prohibition constitutional amendment adopted by the people last fall, but a bibulous Oregonian has demonstrated that he is more efficient in mathematics.

The law provides, among other things, that 24 quarts of beer may be shipped into the state to a single individual or family each month. The legislature decided upon this number of bottles so that the usual kind of cases could be used.

The mathematical chap, however, doped it out that the so-called quart bottles do not contain a full quart, and that on this account each person is entitled to 36 bottles.

HOW TO KEEP A CALF FROM HAVING HORNS

The following is taken from the current issue of the Farm and Fireside:

"Horns were useful to cattle when they had to fight for their existence, but domestic cattle do not need them. Like a man carrying a weapon, the creature with horns is likely to be uppish and contentious. Hence, de-horning should be the universal rule, unless the cattle are intended for show purposes. The time to operate is when the calf is young, and the thing to use is caustic potash. Moistened the end of a stick of the caustic and rub it on the 'button' which has the intention of becoming a horn. Clip off the hair first. Care should be taken not to put on so much of the caustic as to cause it to flow off the button upon the skin. If properly used—and the operation requires no great skill—no horn will develop."

French Premier Says Germany Is Already Hopelessly Beaten

Head of National Council Says that France's Conditions Are Normal. Blames Hohenzollern Militarism for the Martial Maelstrom

(NOTE—The following interview with Premier Viviani of France is the first authoritative announcement by the French government regarding its present position.)

PARIS, March 10.—Premier Rene Viviani pictured Germany to me as a hopelessly beaten nation, in the first interview with the French prime minister ever granted a newspaper man, either French or foreign.

"The German torrent has been checked," he said, decisively. "Germany is military. The implacable blockade is growing tighter and tighter about her. Despite all precautions Germany has taken to conceal the truth, I can assure you that her financial and economic rout has been complete."

Tables are turned.

"Day for day, the present war has now about reached the length of that of 1870," he said. "But what a difference in France's situation! The first three months of the war of 1870 saw our armies at Sedan and Metz prisoners, and another army in Paris, invested—in all, over 400,000 men."

"The world believed France crushed. But ten years after, at the Universal Exposition, she showed the world the spectacle of a reborn country."

Says Germany Wanted War.

"Then came this war, which Germany craftily prepared and unchained. Had Germany really loved peace, she might have had it simply by accepting the four parliaments of London on July 29, or two days later accepting czar's call of The Hague tribunal, or, on July 31, Great Britain's call to suspend military preparations with a view of negotiations in London."

"France and Russia adhered to all of these pacific attempts, but Germany declared war. She had been mobilizing for ten days."

"Germany badly miscalculated. She realizes it now. Without speaking of countries other than my own, Germany expected discords and dissensions. What she ran against was an

immovable block without factions or divergencies. Every son of France took up arms—rich, poor, socialists, conservatives, free thinkers, Catholics, alike. Today France's policy continues to be what it was stated to be on December 22, 'a war without mercy.' We are unanimous on this point. We are unanimous in declaring we will not accept any but a victorious peace for all the allies. The united pact of September 4 has our signature, and for us a treaty isn't a scrap of paper. Our armies are intact. We have checked the Germans. Power is shown."

"Where was Germany's first objective point? Paris. And she failed to win it. Then she tried Dunkirk, and then Calais. She left 600,000 cadavers in the Yser, and didn't pass it. The same thing happened at Nancy and Verdun. Germany was thrown aside. Her military power was hard hit. Economically she is ruined. If her cities which tourists visit retain the appearance of prosperity, it is to the detriment of the country districts which are being famished in order to put up appearances for the outside world."

Fight to the Last.

"France's economic and financial situation is normal, despite the enormous expenses imposed by the war. We lack nothing. The allies will fight to the bitter end. Let there not be a doubt about that. For our children we wish to end, once for all, the peril of war engendered by the military caste, which, in Germany, carried all classes before it."

"We will destroy this breeding place of perpetual discord between peoples. We are battling for the

right. We do not wish to make slaves of anyone."

"We will destroy the dependence of the Belgians. We will reunite the French family separated by the mailed fist forty-four years ago. We wish to be free, and we will be."

Premier Viviani is one of the strongest French leaders of today. By infinite tact he has maintained temperamental France on an even keel to such an extent that people marvel. He works fifteen hours a day, and has adopted the American quick lunch habit, taking only fifteen minutes to eat at times.
