## CHILI SAYS BOTH NAVIES VIOLATED HER NEUTRALITY

VALPARAISO, March 17.—The Chilean press asserts that both the British and German naval officers violated the neutrality rights of Chile in Sunday's engagement off Juan Fernandez Island, when the German cruiser *Derfflinger* was destroyed.

LONDON, March 17.—The admiralty announced that the British destroyers *Atalanta* and *Fingal* have been torpedoed, the former off Inish-tuck, the latter off Northumberland.

PETROGRAD, March 17.—Floods in the Ores Valley have forced the Germans to retire two miles, according to Warsaw dispatches. There are now no Germans within seven miles of Prasnysa.

PARIS, March 17.—The bombardment of Ikhisma has been renewed by the German artillery. Two shells have struck the cathedral, wrecking part of the roof and raking the interior.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17.—Senator Hoke Smith and Thomas J. Walsh, after a conference with President Wilson and Commerce Secretary Redfield, estimate that the stopping of German imports means a loss of more than \$100,000 a day in customs duties.

The stoppage of exports also means the reduction of the cotton crop to a week.

## "Clean-Up Kids" Will Be Guests at Matinee

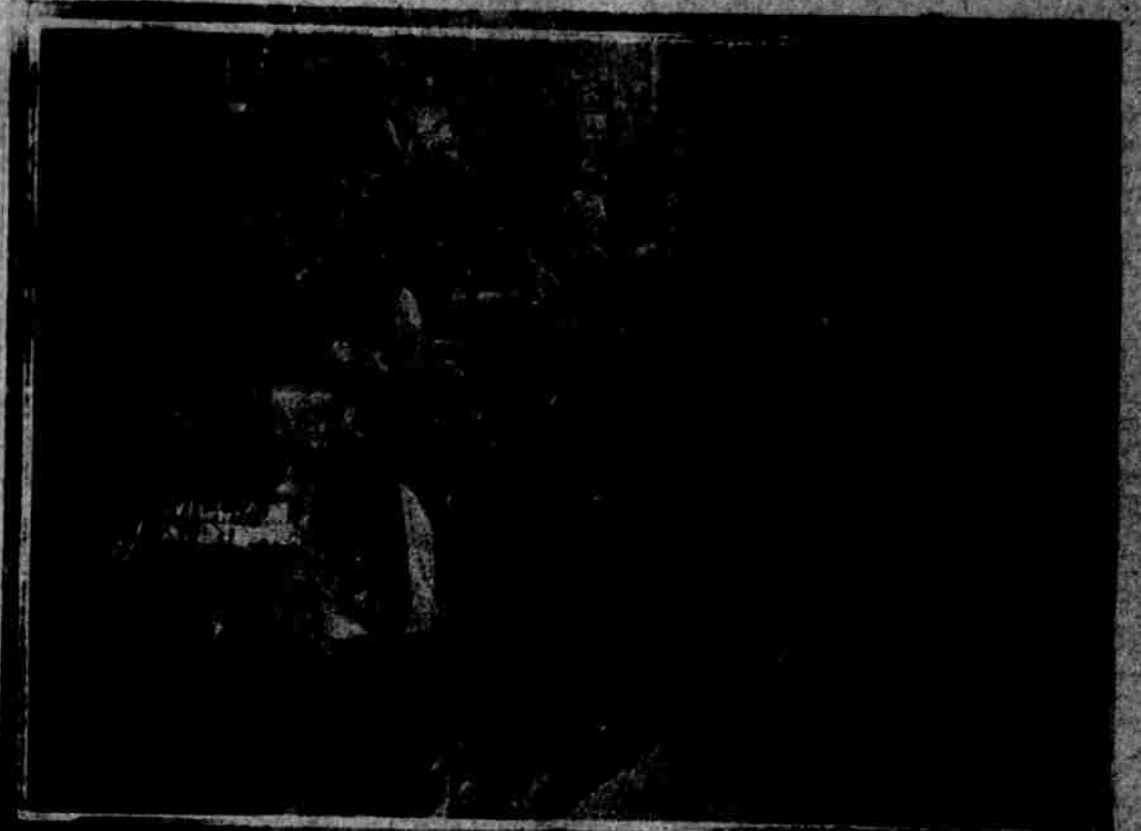
Proprietor of Star Theatre will give special performance for youngsters who take part in the clean-up work—matinee waiting for weather to settle before setting aside days.
