LONDON, March 18.—Home dispatches say that Austria is making great military preparations on the Trentino district, near the Italian frontier. They state that Russian prisoners there are clearing the mountain roads and digging trenches.

TEHRAN, March 18.—The Persian cabinet has resigned. This is said to be due to controversy as to the policy to pursue in reference to invasion of Persia by British, Turkish and Russian troops.

BERLIN, March 18.—It is officially announced that the Russian govern-

ment buildings at Suwalki and other provincial capitals in German hands are to be burned in retaliation for the Russians' ruthless destruction in Prussia.

French aviators bombed the unprotected town of Schlietstadtin, Alsace, it is reported.

It is admitted that the Russians have assumed the offensive along a sixty mile front between Lomax and Przemysl.

## Constantinople and Commanders Who Are Fighting to Defend It

This photograph shows a section of the ancient city of Constantinople, on the Bosphorus, which for hundreds of years has withstood the efforts of Europeans to get it from the possession of the Turks, but which is about to fall. In the background at the right is seen the great Mosque of Sophia, the most important church edifice of the Mohammedan world.

General D'Amade, in command of an army made up of Australians, French, Belgians and others, has landed on the peninsula of Gallipoli, and as the allied fleets bombard the forts along the Dardanelles he is advancing on the city. At the same time Esad Pasha, a famous Turkish commander (not Esad Pasha who rebelled in Albania), is marching through Asia Minor with an army which was meant to invade Egypt. That plan having been given up, his soldiers are on their way to defend the city from General D'Amade. However, a dispatch has come from Europe in which the statement is made that the Turks on the approach of the fleet will not defend the city, but will quit for Asia, in order that Christian guns will not batter down ancient mosques.

The company has made arrangements with the Klamath Transfer company of this city for bus and freight service to and from the Upper Lake landing, and they look for a busy season.

The ice at the upper end of the lake is rapidly breaking up, and it will be but a short time before service to Harriman Lodge and Rocky Point will be possible. Today the Spray made its first trip to Odessa for the year. When the boats are not in operation, the mail service to Odessa is rather an uncertain quantity.

## FEDERAL APPEALS COURT UPHOLDS LOWER TRIBUNAL THAT SENTENCED DIGGS AND CAMINETTI TO PRISON

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—The federal circuit court of appeals today sustained the decision of the federal district court in the sentencing of Maurey L. Diggs and Drew Caminetti to serve time at the federal prison at McNeil's Island for violating the Mann white slave law.

Diggs was sentenced to serve two years. The sentence of Caminetti is eighteen months.

Members of respectable families, and both married to prominent young society women, Diggs and Caminetti, stole their positions with the Mann white slave law. ## U.S. ORDERS SOME NEW SUBMARINES

### SECRETARY DANIELS SIGNS CONTRACT FOR FOUR, WITH SPEED OF TWENTY KNOTS AN HOUR WHEN ON SURFACE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17.—Secretary Daniels today signed contracts for four submarines, the most important one to be called *Bolshoi*.

These vessels will be the first sea-going submarines built for the American navy and the first of the world built with a view to accompanying the fleet. The speed of the boats will be twenty knots while on the surface and from ten to twelve when submerged.
