American in French Foreign Legion, Describes the Awful Indifference One Looks Upon Death After a Stay in the Trenches

Not.—Following is the second article of the series by Phil Rader, former United Press correspondent who has been serving with the foreign legion of the French army.

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LONDON, March 2.—At least one American has died in the trenches.

My comrades and I, in the French foreign legion, went to war under its flag and we were under its flag when we were killed.

My arrangements for entering the flying corps had gone glimmering and here I was, only an ordinary private, ten hours a day, for forty minutes at a stretch, with five minute rests.

We had made these remarks hundreds of times during our long march. An orderly came up to the position where we were standing and said, "We are to go directly to the trenches."

Then a terrific shattering broke out among us. Every man was trying to prove how ready he was. Men always do that in a pinch. I found jokes were made in unnatural tones.

in the periods of danger and I've learned that fear always comes. The brave man is the man who has no fear. He is the man who has it and conquers it or who fears the jibes of his mates more than the bullets of the enemy.

We marched a few miles more that afternoon and at last found ourselves in a deserted little town. Our path had been strewn with relics, French caps, French knapsacks, broken rifles, and French graves. I found myself wondering why we saw no German relics. I began to understand that evil things could happen to us as well as to the Germans.

We are going to kill the Germans, but, in the meantime, what were they going to do to us? I was an averaged man, and straight from the sidewalks of San Francisco, and what was happening to my mind could have happened to the mind of any man I know.

We could hear shooting now; distant rumbling. Our nerves were strung tense. "We are to cross the canal on the little bridge and go to the farmhouse," said an orderly. "But you

must cross the bridge one at a time or you won't draw the German fire." There were thirty-two of us in my party. I was the third to cross. As I ran I could hardly believe that I, from orderly San Francisco, was running from being killed; that I was this man who was entering war.

PORTLAND LETTER.

In the cattle division at the beginning of last week the offerings were mostly of the fat light weight class and consequently the offerings were eagerly picked up by the various buyers.

The market is considered steady in all lines. Best steers are bringing 7.75; cows 6.25.

There is a scarcity of hogs coming to market and as a result the prices took a sudden jump of 25 cents Monday, and has remained at that price since. Prime light weights are commanding 7.50.

Like the swine market, sheep also advanced with a sensational jump. Yearlings advanced from 7.50 to 7.75; ewes 6.50 to 6.75; lambs 5.50 to 5.75.

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In the farmyard we found a grave marked by a wooden cross. It was next to the dung heap, but on the cross had been marked the name "Joseph Heilmann" and other lettering bore the names of French officers for the bravery of the German lieutenant, who rested there.

As we stood there we heard a terrible whistling in the air; a huge shell hit the earth behind us.

Suddenly all fortitude departed. On the march not one of us would have admitted to another that he
