T. R. REITERATES CHARGE AGAINST THE PRESIDENT

WILSON WORKED FOR THE INTERESTS

Holds That the Object of the Ship Purchase Bill Was to Buy Up the Vessels of Certain Warring Nations That Are Interested in this Country. Makes This as a Rejoinder to Lobby Probe Rumors.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 27.—Colonel Roosevelt's rejoinder to the requests of shipping lobby investigators that he testify regarding his magazine charges that President Wilson worked in behalf of the interests of certain foreign ship owners, is as follows:

"My statement is literally and exactly correct.

"The sources of my information have been for months open to every intelligent man.

"Every man must have known that the object of the shipping bill was the purchase of interned ships. If it was not, the proposed law would have contained a provision exempting this.

"Such an act was necessarily in the interests of foreign and native corporations interested in these ships, and thus in the indirect interest to Germany."

FARMS FOR SALE IN EVERY PART OF THE STATE ARE LISTED IN BOOKLET TO BE SENT OUT BY THE STATE

Including five Klamath county farms, ranging in area from 149

acres to 3,000 acres, the state immigration commission's new booklet, "Farm Lands in Oregon," in which are listed farms for sale all over the state, is just off the press, for distribution.

The work of listing farm lands was begun by the commission, and since the abolishing of that organization is being continued by the Oregon Development League. Nearly 300 farms are now listed, representing every county in the state.

All listings are appraised by competent and reliable appraisers, the purpose being to advertise only such lands as are correctly and accurately described, and which are offered at fair prices.

It is planned to issue subsequent editions of "Farm Lands in Oregon," including all satisfactory listings received up to the time of publication.

While every county is represented in this booklet, it is hoped that the next publication will find every district in every county represented. These books, together with a personal letter, are being sent out in response to the many inquiries regarding farm lands, and through this medium many desirable settlers should be attracted to our state.

To make this book more representative, it is only necessary to get more listings from more people and more districts of the state to make it so.

RAISING OBJECT BELIEVED "SUB"

GIANT DREDGER FROM PEARL HARBOR ENGAGED IN RAISING WHAT MAY BE MISSING SUBMARINE FROM DEPTHS

HONOLULU, March 27.—While it is believed that the U. S. submarine F-4, which failed to raise after a descent Thursday morning, has been located, this will not be known until the object grappled with is raised further from the water.

FIX INDEMNITY IN M'NAMUS CASE

WIDOW OF MAN MURDERED IN MEXICAN CAPITAL WILL RECEIVE RECOGNITION FOR LEFT OF HER HUSBAND

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 27.—Word has reached the state department that a contract is on in Mexico, headed by Mexican Minister Poincaré, to be the beneficiary in the case of James M'Namus, who was murdered in that city when he was in the service of the U. S. government.

Whatever sum is agreed upon will be turned over to the widow, and the government will have the incident closed.

It is reported that nothing is still in progress at the moment, which shows Villa intends to continue his operations against Tampico.

Mysterious Woman in the Osborne Case

This is a photograph of Rae Tanser, the mysterious woman in the strange case of James W. Osborne, the well-known New York lawyer, as she looked when locked up on a charge of using the mails to defraud. Mr. Osborne years ago made a reputation as a prosecutor when as assistant district attorney he handled big murder cases there, which were read all over the world.

Miss Tanser, aged 22, a forewoman in a hat factory, began suit against him for \$10,000 for breach of promise. He declared he knew all about the case, and denied he had ever seen the woman. He told of letters he had received addressed to Oliver Osborne. Several days after the split was filed Oliver Osborne appeared at James W. Osborne's home, saying he was a Boston man, and that he knew Miss Tanser, and had taken her out.

The charge of mailing the mails grew out of the sending of these Oliver Osborne letters. It may be tried before the breach of promise case, and the result of that will depend on the verdict of the jury in the criminal case.

HOWARD ACCEPTS PRINCIPALSHIP

At a meeting of the County High School board held late yesterday, the resignations of Miss Beulah Appleton, E. V. Hawley, Miss Lottie Milam, J. C. Smelser and Miss Emma Cole were accepted. The five instructors were named before the board, but they adhered to their notice of resignation because of the removal of W. B. Faught.

The resignations leave vacant all departments save the mathematics department, and the position of Vernon Motschenbacher. Members of the High School board state that they have received a number of applications for positions in the last few days.

ROBBERS DO A THOROUGH JOB

AFTER JIMMYING WAY INTO OFFICE, THEY BEAT UP WATCHMAN AND BLOW UP FIVE DIP-FRUST BOTTLES

CHICAGO, March 27.—Eight masked men entered the office of Hanson Brothers, mail order merchants, this morning, and after beating the watchman to a pulp, they calmly pulled off one of the most daring robberies in the city's history.

Five safes, one on each floor of the establishment, were blown open. There were at least ten explosions, and the robbers escaped with about \$10,000.

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No Perch for the Dove

Wilson's Peace Emissary Finds Efforts a Failure

BURLIN, March 27.—(The News)—President Wilson's newest effort to bring peace in Europe has met with failure. Colonel E. M. House, Wilson's personal emissary, went to Switzerland tomorrow, convinced that peace is possible in out of the question.

Despite details from Washington, Colonel House came to Europe on a mission of peace. I have learned authoritatively that he was sent by Wilson to sound the warring governments and learn through informal interviews whether there was any possibility of a truce and peace conference before the spring campaign.

Colonel House has conferred with Mr. Edward Goss, the British Minister of Foreign Affairs. He also conferred with President Rene Viviani of the French council, and finally with General von Seeck, secretary of foreign affairs in Germany.

With all possible courtesy, and with many expressions of appreciation of Wilson's kindly interest, Colonel House has been told that to consider a peace conference now is an impossibility.

Germany is now bent on winning the war. The second war loan raised over two billion dollars. The day of placing the subscription has been extended to April 10, to enable the soldiers in the field to subscribe to it with.
