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MEXICANS AGAIN TROUBLING THE ADMINISTRATION

MEXICANS MARCHING TOWARDS CAPITOL
Brownsville People Clamor for Protection From the Villa-Carranza Troops—Zapatistas Are Held to Be the Guilty With Pillage and Rape Operations to Resist Any Attacks Made Upon Them.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 30.—With the residents of Brownsville, Texas, clamoring for protection from the Villa and Carranza troops about to fight just over the border at Matamoros, England demanding that the British oil interests at Tampico be safeguarded against depredations of Carranza's forces, and General Obregon marching with a force to attack Vera Cruz, the Mexican situation is again a complex puzzle for the administration.

At Mexico City seem to be a frightful muddle. Despite reports, it is known that there are two columns of Carranza troops moving toward the capital. Mexico City is still in the hands of Carranza and his outlaws. The Españoles, say dispatches, are too busy looting and pillaging the city to make any resistance against the advance of the Carranza forces. Sworn charges of robbery and extortion, compiled by the Mexico City International Relief Committee, have been forwarded to Secretary of State Bryan. They show a frightful condition of affairs.

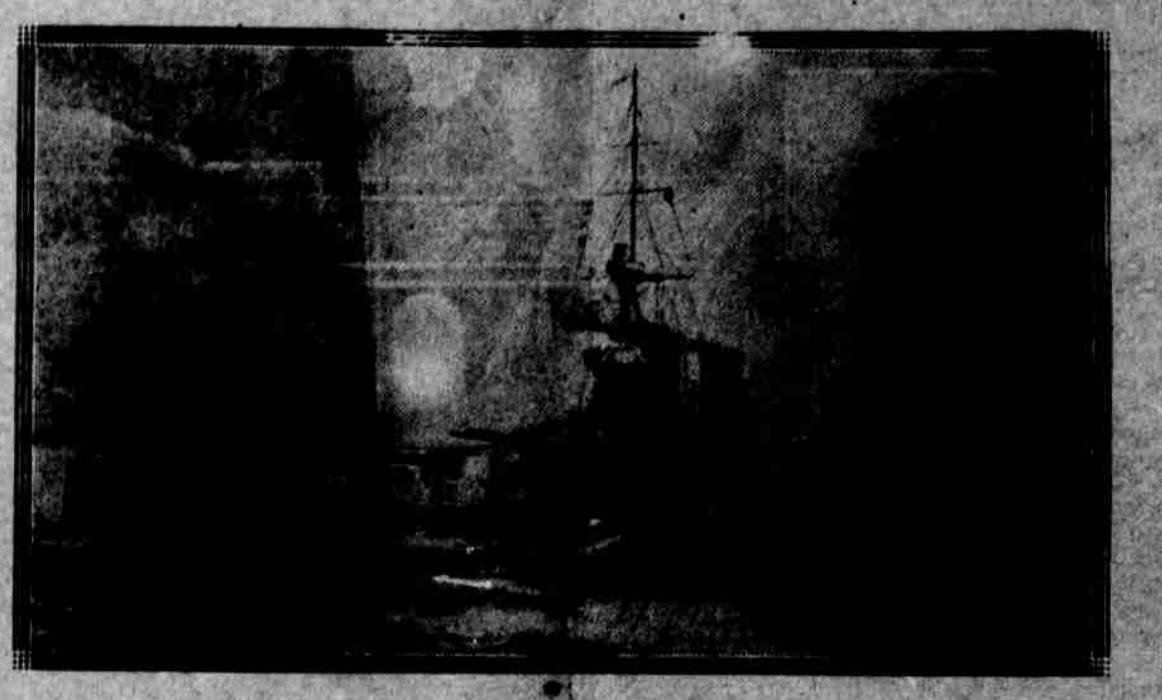

First Photograph of Britain's Battleship Queen Elizabeth



Here is the first picture of the greatest battleship in the world—unless the Pennsylvania, which was recently launched at Newport News, is to be considered her equal. The Queen Elizabeth carries 15-inch guns, and with these she has battered the forts of the Dardanelles. All during the war vessels of the allies have hovered about the entrance to the Dardanelles. Their guns were not of sufficient range to reach the forts without being in danger. They were waiting for the completion of the Queen Elizabeth, under construction in the British naval yards, with four others of her class. No word was heard from her until she opened fire in the Dardanelles. The British public did not even know she had been launched till the news came that five forts at the entrance of the Dardanelles had fallen. With her guns that shoot more than twelve miles, she was able to stand off out of range of the guns of the forts and batter them to pieces at her leisure.

LONDON, March 9.—Being wounded in our trenches was gruesome business. If a wounded man dropped back to safety he was extra lucky, for everything that was done for him during the first few hours only tested his waning strength and was likely to make his condition worse. Often a man who was wounded for some time, one day came limping up the trench, one day complaining that he had been shot in the leg. He could hardly put his right foot in the ground. We slipped open his trousers leg and found no bullet mark. Then we discovered that he had been shot through the forearm and that the wound was hours old. He was hit back here to be punished. Many soldiers have told me. When men sank in our trenches the fol-

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STEEL GATES FOR ENLARGED DITCH

CONCRETE HEADWORKS BEING BUILT AT INTAKE OF GRIFFITH LATERAL—DESIGNED TO PREVENT OVRFLOW
Work has been commenced by the reclamation service on concrete headworks at the intake of the Griffith lateral, which is being enlarged by a big flow of men and teams. The intake is at the Lost River dam. Preceded steel gates are to be installed at the intake before the beginning of the irrigation season May 1st. These gates are to be installed so as to allow the taking of the desired quantity of water without the necessity of raising the level of the reservoir water, thus saving the flooding of adjacent lands.

ENGLAND MAY PLAN OBSERVANCE ON WATER WAGON FOR REST OF WAR

Either Severe Restriction or Total Prohibition Expected—American Commission is Going to Visit the Prison Camps of Different Nations, Making Thorough Investigation of Each Case.

BERLIN, March 30.—Germany has agreed to three open sea convoys to transport the American consular commission en route today by United States Ambassador Gerard. England is understood to have made the most liberal statement of inspection will begin soon after arrival of the commission. The American commission is expected to be in London in the next few days. Under the terms of the agreement the commission is permitted to make a thorough investigation of the camps in England and Germany. The commissioners are expected to examine prisoners out of number of the camps. The findings of the commission will be forwarded to each government. It will embody in its recommendations for the strengthening powers to adopt an stringent uniform prison policy.

FRENCH CHARGE GERMAN SURGEONS AMPUTATE TOO FREELY THE LIMBS OF WOUNDED ALLIES THEY ATTEND

PARIS, March 16.—(By mail to New York)—Open charges are now being made in Paris that the German military surgeons have made a more frequent use of the knife at the expense of legs and arms of French soldiers.
