German Liner Labeled

BOSTON, April 1.—Three marine libel suits against the interned German liner Kronprinzessin Cecilie, the celebrated "gold ship" which was forced to turn back from Europe when the war opened, with a gold cargo estimated at \$11,000,000, were on trial today before United States District Judge Hale. The Guaranty Trust company of New York is suing the vessel's owners for failing to deliver \$5,000,000 in gold. Charles W. Rantoul of New York and Maurice Hansen of Belgium are suing, respectively, for \$5,000 and \$200,000 for inability to land in Europe. Hansen's property was destroyed by the German army.

Republican Leaders Are Glancing
Around for 1916 Possibilities

Whitman of New York Will Be Watched as a Likely Candidate. Burton, Borah, Mann and Herrick Also Interesting Many People

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—The question of presidential candidates is now an uppermost topic with leaders of the Republican party, now that the basis of representation in the national convention has been satisfactorily changed by cutting down the number of delegates from the states of the solid South. Who will the candidate be? Will he come from the East, or the West? Will he be a progressive or a conservative? These are questions to the answers to which party leaders will devote much time between now and the end of the year.

The answers will be difficult to find, not because there is a scarcity of good men, but because there is an abundance. The roll call of possibilities has not yet been concluded, and still a dozen well defined candidacies in different parts of the country are already in evidence.

New York Active
New York will cut a prominent figure in anti-convention politics next year, probably presenting Governor Charles S. Whitman for the presidency, but whether in earnest, or merely for trading purposes, it is now too early to know. Much will depend upon the record Whitman is to make this year at Albany. At the least, he can be depended upon to hold the New York delegation in line until it has been decided where it shall go.

Mention of Senator Weeks of Massachusetts in connection with the presidential nomination has interested many Republican leaders, and already it is being predicted that he will control the solid delegation from New England, should he decide to permit the use of his name.

Senator Weeks has added appreciably to his reputation, and become truly a national figure, through his brilliant work in connection with both the tariff and currency legislation of the present Congress. On the latter question he was recognized by all parties as being unusually well posted and it is no secret that his knowledge and wisdom were more than once of service to the President when the currency bill was being whipped into shape.

Turning from New England to the Mississippi valley, several candidates are seen. Ohio offers Senator Burton and former French Ambassador Herrick.

Burton could draw numerous delegates in other parts of the country because of his strength as a national character. He has had a wonderful career in Washington. As a member of the House he took a commanding position on financial questions. So expert was he on questions of fi-

nance, that he was several times offered the secretaryship of the treasury, but declined it.

He made himself perhaps the greatest authority the country ever has had on everything connected with the improvements of rivers and harbors, and has studied that great question for several years in Europe, where he met the most celebrated authorities of all the maritime powers.

The only criticism of Burton is his failure to run again for the Senate. His voluntary retirement is regretted not only by Ohio, but by the country at large.

It is very easy, in the light of what happened last November, to decide now that Burton ought to have been a candidate for reelection, but at the time when he declined to run there was a general approval over the country of his decision.

In Illinois there is the candidacy of James R. Mann, minority leader in the House, and the ablest and most industrious man who has held that position for many years. It is believed that his name will go before the convention, and that he will receive a number of votes, but the politicians are not ready to concede that he will be the nominee.

That he will have much to say about the nomination, however, and be in position to help control it, is not disputed. Of course, under conditions which easily may arise, he might be nominated.

Also in the middle West are Chas. W. Fairbanks of Indiana and Albert Baird Cummins of Iowa, the one a conservative and the other a radical. Both have had presidential aspirations for years, but the prevailing view here is that neither will be successful in 1916, primarily because the party, according to prevailing opinion, must nominate, if it would stand a chance to win at the polls, some man who would be acceptable to all party factions. Fairbanks, it is claimed, would not command the support of the radicals, and Cummins would not command the votes of the conservatives.

In Wisconsin there is some talk about Representative Lenroot, but it is regarded as rather premature. Mr. Lenroot is a growing, positive force in the Republican party, but the wise ones do not regard him as of presidential caliber at this time.

There has also been more or less talk about Senator William Alden Smith of Michigan and Senator William E. Borah of Idaho. Neither has yet indicated whether it is to be his purpose to announce himself.

Borah is a man of intellectual power, a great lawyer, a magnificent debater, and liberally progressive in

ideas. It is he who made the chief arguments for Roosevelt before the Republican national committee in 1912, and yet he refused to follow Roosevelt out of the party. He could bring to the convention the delegates of the intermountain states, if so disposed.

Senator Smith is more of a conservative than Borah, and yet not a conservative of the Fairbanks type. He is a man of wealth and position, and one of the strong personalities of western Michigan. He is the owner of a prosperous daily newspaper in Grand Rapids, and for years has been a power in the politics of his state.

The ultimate disposition of the "favorite son" delegates may determine the choice of the convention; but it is somewhat too early to know who are to be "favorite sons" and who candidates with wide followings. Three possible solutions of the nomination problem are being discussed here:

First—That Whitman, making good as Governor in New York, will sweep everything before him and be nominated on the first ballot, or thereabouts.

Second—Whitman failing to impress the convention, that the choice may be Burton, perhaps after a series of ballots.

Third—(This proposed solution being contingent on the failure of other candidates to impress themselves upon the convention and the development of some akin to a block) the nomination of Associate Justice Charles E. Hughes of the Supreme court. A number of careful observers would not be surprised if this were to be the result, and they add that it would be easy campaigning with a man like Hughes at the head of the ticket.

This article has been written, not in an attempt to conjecture what the Republican national convention will do, but rather to reflect the prevailing talk of well informed Republican leaders. It shows, if it shows anything, that nobody has the nomination cornered, but that the field is apparently a free for all, and that the number of candidates will perhaps be larger than at any time for years.

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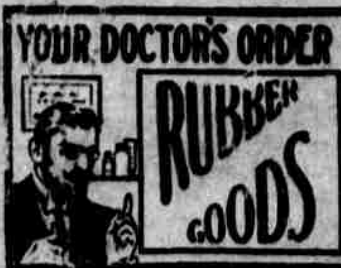
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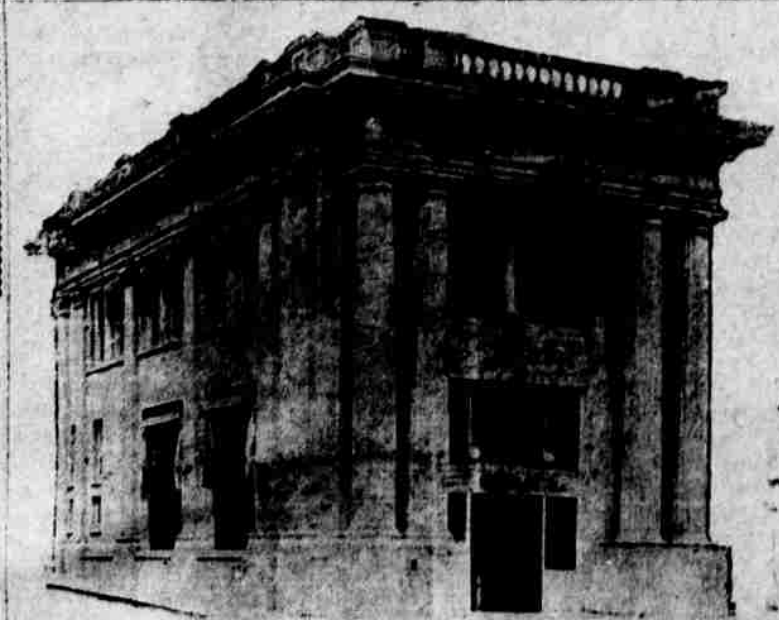
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
