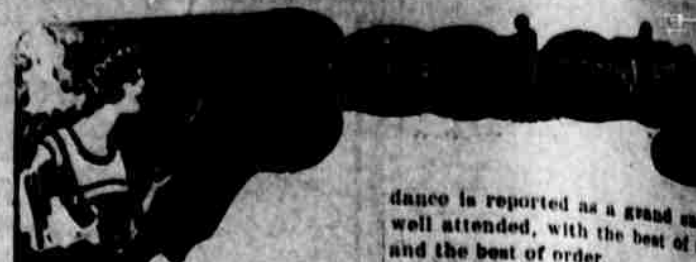
**Lightning Hits Pole.**
