COMMUNITY CO-OPERATION

THAT community is exceptional in which today merchants, farmers and other citizens are not organized and working together for the upbuilding and general improvement. The community conscience—the spirit of co-operation—is aroused throughout the land, and citizens of all vocations are exerting themselves in behalf of the public welfare.

Merely to list the activities of enterprising communities would be to catalog all the civic virtues. Education in its broadest sense, is receiving large consideration, and the work of public schools especially is being conducted along lines calculated to develop boys and girls into citizens better fitted to labor in rural vocations and to lead in community affairs. The problems of every class are being studied and earnest efforts are being made to solve them in a manner that shall promote both public and private welfare. Permanent roads, scientific agriculture, good markets, pure bred livestock and diversified farming are being striven for by merchants and farmers working hand in hand; and the same organized instrumentality that is used to help the farmer is devoting a large part of its efforts to the improvement of retail merchandising methods in the local stores.

This all but universal movement is especially significant to rural communities; for it means to those engaged in its progress, prosperity and general enlightenment; and to those that remain unorganized and inactive it means ultimate elimination. Citizens everywhere have long been familiar with the law of compensation as it operates between individual merchants, and they have often seen the fact demonstrated that weakness and incompetence in merchandising must inevitably give way before enterprise and efficiency; but they have not so generally realized that the same law operates in precisely the same way in competition between communities.

Unquestionably many rural communities in all sections are suffering losses in population and a narrowing of their spheres of influence because in their unorganized condition they cannot withstand the competition of more enterprising communities that are strongly organized and vigorously aggressive in enlarging their fields of operation.

Such changes of community boundaries are taking place daily in all parts of the country; gains being made by vigorous organized communities at the expense of weak unorganized groups. It is for the citizens of this community to determine for themselves into which class it shall be placed—whether the next decade shall see it moving forward in the front ranks of the army of progress or taking its place at the rear among the incompetent and the unfit.

WOULD NAME PEAK FOR DISCOVERER

WILL G. STEEL WRITES INTERIOR DEPARTMENT SUGGESTING THE HONORING OF WHITE MAN WHO FIRST SAW CRATER LAKE

Superintendent Steel of the Crater Lake Park, says the Medford Sun, has sent the following communication to Secretary Lane, suggesting that the discoverer of Crater Lake be commemorated by renaming Glacier peak in his honor as Hillman peak:

"The Secretary of the Interior, Washington, D. C.

Sir—"It is with sincere regret that I have to inform you of the death at Hope Villa, La., on March 12, 1915, of Mr. John W. Hillman, who on June 12, 1853, discovered Crater Lake. He was the leader of a party of twenty-two prospectors, of whom he was the first to see it.

"Now, therefore, I recommend that the name Glacier peak, applied to one of the highest points on the western rim of the lake, be changed to Hillman peak, and in justification thereof will say, one of the most important mountains in the state of Washington is known as Glacier peak, as also in the state of California, thus leading to unnecessary confusion, and at least one of them should be changed. Such a change would also be a deserved and appropriate recognition of the first white man who ever saw Crater Lake, and for whom some prominent point should be named."

SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING. EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

PARIS, March 23.—(By mail to New York)—German and Austrian owned hotels, villas and private residences of all kinds on the famous French Riviera are to be used as hospitals for the French soldiers whom the former are wounding if Deputy Georges Dousset can have his way.

He has written to the Minister of the Interior demanding that all such properties be taken over by the government and equipped at once as military hospitals. The delightful winter climate of the Riviera, it is pointed out, would be a most important factor in the convalescence of the wounded.

As a goodly portion of the hotel industry on the Riviera is in the hands of German concerns, it is estimated that the seizure could possibly be needed.

France has just begun its first steps towards the rebuilding on the most modern lines of the hundreds of French towns and villages destroyed in the present war. As many of these were centuries old, even their historic interest and importance could not always offset the disadvantage of unsanitary location and construction resulting from the more or less primitive times in which they were built.

A commission composed of M. Briand, director of public hygiene, Doctors Julien Rensu, Pottier and Labbe, technical sanitary experts; M. Martel, the great geologist, and M. Pellander, one of the greatest modern authorities on agricultural improvement has just been appointed to inspect the provinces invaded by the

Germans for the purpose of preparing sites and plans for the reconstruction of the towns and villages under modern sanitary requirements.

Similar commissions of experts for passing upon other essential elements in the rebuilding of the towns will be appointed later as the work is carried on step by step.

PETROGRAD—A wounded officer arriving from the front tells how Russian totalitarianism affected a fish pond in a captured German village, and incidentally supplied the Russian soldiers with several days provisions. Eight hundred casks of spirits found in the village were dumped into the pond. The fish became intoxicated and floated on the surface. Russian soldiers gathered the fish by tons, and enjoyed the delicacy for several days.

LONDON—Another case of positions reversed through the war is mentioned by an officer of the London Scottish, London's crack volunteer corps, as follows:

"One of our fellows, who has recently been promoted lance corporal, before he came out got his chauffeur a job in the army service corps. 'The chauffeur is now captain. I wonder which calls the other 'sir.'"

BASSINGSTOKE, England.—With 5,000 of Kitchener's men encamped here, Basingstoke is today an armed camp for the first time since 270 years ago, when Cromwell's 7,000 men assaulted Basing House, held by the Marquis of Winchester against the parliamentary forces. The room in Basing House, in which Cromwell slept is today the orderly room of the Royal Scots Fusiliers.
