France Opens Its Mills and Shops

Brunet declares France will face when the moment of peace comes will be the rebuilding of the hundreds of cities, towns, villages, hamlets and huts that have been destroyed not only in the invaded districts of France, but of Belgium as well. If that problem is allowed to go until peace has come, Brunet declares that France will not find herself in a position to solve it. With the heavy losses of human lives entailed by the war, she will find herself without the labor necessary for the actual work, and she will find herself without the material.

Brunet's first law project, therefore, provides for the immediate reopening of all factories and industries engaged in the production of material for the building trades. Not a brickyard, he declares, in all France can afford to be allowed to remain closed at the present moment. Every lumber mill, he insists, should be working over time, while the wood-working mills, where doors and window frames and casements are made, have before them a task in supplying the material for the rebuilding of the French towns and villages that will tax them far beyond their utmost capacity unless they begin at once.

What applies to these building material industries, Brunet insists, applies with more or less urgent force to practically every other producing industry in France. If, when peace comes, France must wait a year or

two before the material destroyed by the war can be replaced in order to permit of a resumption of her normal industrial and commercial life, the Seine deputy insists she is going to lose a goodly portion of the advantages that would come from her dearly bought victories.

In preparing his proposed laws for government help in the reopening of these industries, Brunet has another object in view. With the outbreak of the war, France at once put into force the most extensive measures of providing charity to the unemployed. Vast sums are everywhere being spent to this end, and especially at Paris and the other larger cities, although a goodly portion of this is now coming from private and other sources, still at least one-third is coming out of the annual budget.

This money, the Seine deputy insists, should go instead to aid the manufacturers to reopen their factories and provide the employment that would render charity unnecessary. France's preparation for reaping all of the advantages of the peace that is to come would thus also be assured.

Brunet's proposed laws, which are to come at once before the chamber of deputies, will propose the issuing of industrial warrants similar to those already issued for the encouragement of agricultural development. These will permit the advances out of the government treasury of sufficient amounts to enable the manufacturers to secure both materials and labor and to carry the stock of finished products on hand until the end of the war creates the market for them that is then certain.

Where this material has been cornered and is being held by speculat-

ors, the government will have the right to requisition it. It is practically at this point that Brunet has injected all the proposal in which the syndicalists of France see hopes of the realization of their dreams. Brunet proposes that these industrial warrants and government loans go not only to establish manufacturers, but to groups of skilled workmen who lack only the capital necessary to begin production on their own account. This would give the latter their chance to begin at last to reap the full profits of their own labors, and as Brunet figures that the end of the war in France must mark a new era of development in the world's progress, at attainment of new ideals along various lines of human endeavor, it should mark also at least the opportunity for the syndicalists to demonstrate the practicability of their own.

Overcome the feeling some people have that flies are not so bad after all. Having done that, convince them that a flyless town is possible.

"Many persons do not really think flies are very nasty. They fish them out of milk and gravy, but they eat the gravy and drink the milk. Convince them that the fly is deadly.

"Remember always the motto: 'Co-operative good will.' You can chase the same fly all summer, but you have to catch it only once. Better, let it catch itself. Begin early; one pair in April may mean millions of flies in July.

"Suggestions for conducting successful campaigns against the fly have just been issued by the University of

Oregon, and may be had free upon application to the extension division. The necessity of organization is first set forth, and a typical efficient organization is described. Publicity ideas and general methods of campaign procedure are outlined. Ideas for educating the citizenry to fly perils are given. The suggestions take up 1,800 words.

"A great campaign against the fly is about to begin in Portland, with local organizations and health officers in charge and the university helping in an advisory way. School children are to make 4,000 fly traps and innumerable fly nets. Several upstate cities have asked for trap models and advice."

The long search ends in the Klondike, but he does not reveal his identity until Axel lies dying at his feet, and Unga, stirred by some faint memory of the past, asks, "Who

are you?" It is a story of extraordinary poetic feeling and sympathy, in spite of the grim strength of its dramatic situations. It is a masterpiece, both in fiction and in film form. A matinee will be given on Friday at 4 o'clock.

DISPATCH FROM CONSTITUTION—ALIENT LEADER SAYS THAT OREGON'S FORCES KILL AND CAPTURE MANY OPPONENTS

United Press Service WASHINGTON, D. C., April 8.—The Carranzista agency here today claimed that Obregon has routed Villa near Calaya. Carranza wired: "I am just in receipt of a communication from Obregon to the effect that the enemy's loss is over 2,000, killed and wounded, and a large number of prisoners, arms and ammunition were captured." The fighting is still in progress.
