In five years 62,000 new laws and 65,000 high court decisions were enacted and rendered.

Speaking of market conditions, Mr. Holliday says they have not changed materially from what they were sixty days ago, when the basis of the market was 25 cents. He declares there are no indications of the prices going lower, the market having a very firm tone.

With 25 cents as the basis of the market, wool growers say there is no question about the clip bringing fair prices to the sheep owners.

PORTLAND LETTER
(Herald Special Service)

PORTLAND, April 19.—Notwithstanding comparatively heavy runs of cattle the last few weeks, the market has been slightly lower to steady.

Choice steers are selling \$7.50 to \$7.75, with other grades at the usual differential.

The demand for hogs seems to over run the light supply of only a fair grade of offerings. A few very good loads touched the \$7.65 spot last Monday. The outlook is steady.

Shorn sheep are beginning to come to market, and although not strictly fat, are commanding very good prices. Special spring lambs are lower, while other choice lambs are steady at \$8.75 to \$9.25, for full wools.

Shearings are \$1.25 less. Other sheep steady.

WOOL BUYERS PLAN A BIG HELP TO GROWERS

PORTLAND, April 19.—Announcement has been made to the officers of the National Woolgrowers' Association that from 15 to 30 cents a pound will be advanced in cash to wool growers on their spring clip. This is the statement of John D. Holliday, president of the National Wool Warehouse and Storage company of Chicago. In addition he predicts a stiffish wool market, with prices firm around 25 cents and upwards.
