# MAY NOT ALLOW WOMEN TO FISH

CONFLICTING LAWS PASSED BY LEGISLATURE-ONLY MEN CAN GET LICENSE, AND ONLY THE LICENSED CAN FISH

BALEM, April 22.-Women may be depled the right to fish and hunt in the state, according to the interpretation put here on two conflicting bills passed by the last legislature.

Under the act passed and filed with the secretary of state February 10th. it is provided that it shall be unlawful for any male person to hunt and fish without a license, the intent of the measure evidently being to allow women the right to hunt and fish without a license. This section is reenacted in the bill recognizing the fish and game commission, and filed February 24th, but the word "male" is eliminated, and it is provided that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish or hunt without a license.

In the section providing for the issuance of a license their issuance is restricted to males, and this latter act as a whole is construed as prohibiting all persons from fishing or hunting without license, and as barring women from obtaining a license. 




