NEW YORK, April 20.—"It's great to be young and a Giant." There, we've gone and done it, not because it is great to be, etc., but because every one else has quoted Jimmie Hooper's classic baseball line and we simply were compelled to get it off our mind.

As a matter of fact, the young part has nothing to do with it this year. What young aggregation could have pulled itself together so nicely, after it had managed to get itself defeated by every bush team along the spring training route. Beginning by lamming the overbearing ambitions out of Uncle Wilbert Robinson's Dodgers, the McGrawites have continued right along at a championship gait just as if they never had taken any disastrous jant. It was typical of a team composed of veterans. The croakers simply forgot that such is the case in the McGraw camp this season. Just now, the Giants look better than at the same time in 1914 and it is safe to say that they will not be overwhelmed by the opposition in the early months of the long campaign, as was predicted in some quarters.

It is well for New York that the nine rounded to form when the opening gong clanged, because no first division possibility can afford this year to lose early games. Not only must the world's championship Boston miracle men be considered, but the Cubs and the hitherto despised Phillies.

NEW YORK, April 20.—Free drinking water at all baseball parks! How does that strike you fans?

"Three rousing cheers!" It's a fact, a reality, already at one big league park—that the fans don't have to sit through a game thirsty, and with throats too parched to yell, with their only reliance the seductive but unsatisfactory pop bottle—or personally conducted hip pocket supply.

I am told that O. B. magnates are to have a heart and supply free drinking water, at least wet, if not food, at many baseball parks. The success of the experiment of giving the fans access to barrels of drinking water, free of charge, at the Washington American League grounds, is said to be the cause of considering a general "free drinking water" policy in other parks.

free drinking water innovation this season at Washington's Florida avenue park is a howling success, according to all reports reaching here. Even the pop and soda water concessionaires, who at first viewed the innovation with alarm for their sales, are said to be satisfied that it does not cut into their profits seriously.

The Washington club, however, was forced to install the free drinking water tanks. An act of congress, passed last winter, was the cause. Representative Howard of Georgia, a thirsty fan, fathered the bill which compelled the club to have water on tap free of charge. And now the club owners are said to be considering similar consideration for fans in other cities.

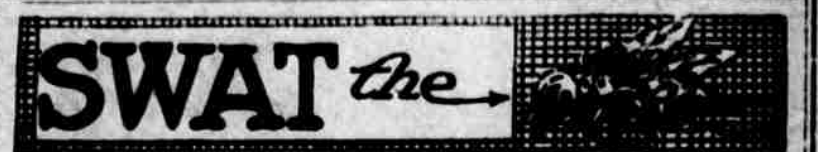
Cloth Hall glistens in the sunlight above the sea of smoke that fills the city. The smoke from six burning Belgian villages is easily discernable on the horizon, while above all British aeroplanes can be picked out, reconnoitering the enemy's positions, watching as the "eyes of the army" for new massing of troops that forecasts another attempted advance.

The quantity of poisonous gases which the Germans have showered upon the allied lines is so great that the ground over a wide area has turned a deep yellow. Viewed from a great distance it seems as though

the ground is covered with powder. Although the allied soldiers were affected for half a mile behind the trenches by these gases, the Germans rushed into the fumes unharmed.

This was explained when wads of cotton were found on prisoners which were taken, and they said they had received instructions to plug their nostrils with cotton when charging after the gas guns had been fired.

From General French down, the British believe the present drive is the supreme attempt of the German general staff to hack a path to Calais, and every precaution is being taken to meet the movement.
