SUMMER SCHOOL WILL BE FINE

EXPERIENCED MAN CHOSEN TO TAKE PART IN WORK HERE, AND COMPREHENSIVE COURSE IS OUTLINED

P. J. Kuntz of Salem has been engaged for work in the Klamath county summer school. Mr. Kuntz has had a great deal of experience in conducting summer schools in Minnesota, where he taught for a number of years. His work will be along the line of methods for the upper grades, as well as general school administration.

An outline follows:
ARITHMETIC—What to do in each grade; essentials to be emphasized; how to teach each part; teacher's and pupils point of view; teacher's use of present texts; place of tests in Arithmetic.
HISTORY—General outline of history work; meaning of history; how to teach outline and map; history in life; how to use text books, library, etc.; present sample outline and call for at least two outlines each week; what should pupils know of history when they begin the study of the text; what should 8th grade pupils be able to do in history; students prepare lists of questions in history; give test of work done.
GEOGRAPHY—How to use book in work; what other material needed; map of work, with characteristic

lines; full treatment of zones; motions of earth fully explained; results of earth motions; how to outline country for its study; what ought pupils be able to learn; place of map drawing in geography; general review.

LANGUAGE AND GRAMMAR—Knowledge at end of four years; what to do with text books; outline work by years—definitely; get something definite from study; place of analysis in grammar and amount; place of parsing in grammar, etc; what does it all mean? extent of composition work, and how to proceed; everyday English; criticism of work in English.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE—Its place in school and life; what do you know of yourself; practical work in brief; sketch of results of study; classification of school use.

DRILLS—Music; drawing; gymnastics and physical culture; agriculture.

General School Administration
 Preparation for work; first day at school; the daily program; the problem of discipline; the country school and a country boy; teaching pupils to think; direct impression from class; knowledge most useful; the formation of habits; the recitation; books for every teacher; what next.
