ANKENY CANAL CONTRACT

It was not our intention to attempt to advise the voters of Klamath Falls on the proposed amendment to the charter which will be voted upon Monday, giving authority to the city council to enter into a contract with the government for the taking over of the Ankeny canal.

We believe it is the duty of the city officials to enlighten the voters of the city on this matter and the news columns of the Herald have always been open for this purpose, but there still appears to be doubt in the minds of the people of the city as to how to vote on this question.

The Herald is heartily in accord with the movement to close the Ankeny canal, and thus rid the city of this nuisance and menace to health, but after a careful reading and consideration of the proposed contract with the government, we are convinced that this charter amendment will not solve the problem, but will only be shifting the responsibility from the government and placing a greater burden upon the city. We feel that should this amendment carry, and should the council proceed to carry out the apparent wish of the people as expressed by their votes, there is grave danger to the people of Klamath Falls becoming entangled in endless litigation and trouble.

We cannot find any excuse for the city officials for neglecting their duty and permitting the maintenance of this public nuisance, as they have done for years, neither is there any excuse for the government to continue imposing on the leniency and good nature of the citizens. No more reason can be advanced why the United States government should be permitted to maintain a nuisance and jeopardize the health and lives of the people of Klamath Falls than should a private corporation or individual.

Congressman Sinnott will visit Klamath Falls July 4th, and a delegation of congressmen will be here to investigate conditions on the Klamath project. Governor Withy-combo may also be here some time this summer. If our city and local government officials do not see fit to get busy and abate this nuisance, perhaps congress may be induced to take a hand. There are many ways to get rid of the Ankeny canal, but the trouble is none have been tried.

What an American Sees on the Firing Line in Northern France

Staff Correspondent, With Sir John French's Army, Writes Unusual Series Regarding Conditions in the Field of the Latest Fighting

(Following is the second of the stories in the Shepherd series, the first of which appeared yesterday. William G. Shepherd, United Press staff correspondent, is the only American representing an individual American press organization now at the British front under official credentials. A third story by Shepherd will appear tomorrow.)

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN NORTHERN FRANCE, April 16.—(By mail to New York)—The road to Neuve Chapelle, England's newest possession, is sunk; its the road of the trenches.

As soon as you enter the trench-dome of the British army before Neuve Chapelle, you don't leave the shelter of the trenches until you're in the town. And when you're in the town you don't leave it, either.

Neuve Chapelle is blown to pieces. Its earth and streets, even its graveyard has been burned by shells. Somewhere there is a German gun trained on the wreck of almost every building in town. Each gun seems to be set on its particular mark; the German gunners have only to put in a shell and fire it. It will hit some mark in Neuve Chapelle.

From a zig zag trench you get your first view of it; it is desolation itself. The mystery is that men will fight for such a place, but the battle of Neuve Chapelle is already finding its place in history as a tremendous achievement of an English general, and this group of debris piles that you see a third of a mile distant is the rent that Neuve Chapelle, the quiet little French village that has never before been noticed by the world, pays for its niche in the annals of human affairs.

You are plugging along the trench. "Digby McDonald," calls the guide who is guiding you, as he stops before a cloth that seems to be hung like wallpaper on the trench wall. The cloth moves; a man's head appears from behind it, tanned and smiling.

"I was just reading a bit," said the head. Out from the straw-lined hole in the side of the trench wall, which had been curtained by the cloth, emerges six feet and more of man and a moment later you are being introduced to an English colonel. A glimpse of the hold he has left showed a pile of books, a blanket stretched over straw.

Digby McDonald helped to make these trenches. He came here first with his men during the days when the Germans were sweeping Callasward and when he had to order his

men into a ditch beside the La Basse road. Here's the La Basse road, and here's Digby McDonald and his men in the same old spot. The months passed since last October and this little bunch of men held on, across the road the Germans held on, too. Night and day, night and day, for thirty days, for a hundred days they were deadlocked like this, in the trenches they had made.

"Look over the trench. There's Neuve Chapelle," said Digby McDonald.

"You hesitate about raising your head."

"It's all right," he says. "The German trench is right over there between us and the village. But it's clear of Germans now and the German trenches are 400 yards beyond the town."

This is your first clear glimpse of Neuve Chapelle. You are really in the outskirts. The main town is on the other side of the meadow from you, an eighth of a mile away. And across the meadow you see a man strolling toward you, dressed in khaki. You're standing on an elevated roadway now, behind a shelter of sandbags, and the meadow lies below you.

"It was from these trenches beside the roadway that our men rushed over the road into the meadow and against the German trench in the battle, explains one of the officers. "Behind them were the reserves. They came piling over this road by thousands."

While he was talking the khaki person in the meadow stops at a post, shakes it to test its strength, climbs it, does something to a wire
