OUR WEEKLY SERMON

By REV. A. F. SIMMONS, Pastor Baptist Church.

Luke 9:23. "And He said unto them all: If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me."

Jesus came from Heaven to earth to make known to the world that he had been appointed the Savior of sinners. He declared of his work, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." And again, "for the Son of Man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." We conclude therefore, that man without Christ is lost. And that Christ is the Savior of the lost. To secure salvation calls for a surrender by the individual to Him, who is his Savior. This requires absolute unconditional surrender.

We notice that Jesus requires self-denial on the part of those who come after Him. Some become brave in the wake of a victorious army. Good soldiers are always obedient to their commander. They are governed entirely by their commander. This necessitates self-denial on their part. Jesus as the captain of man's salvation, requires self-denial on the part of those who depend upon Him for protection. The reasonableness of this demand is recognized in this; that without Him we are hopelessly lost. As Savior it is his right to control their course of action hence-

forth. In the midst of poverty, squalor, debauchery, revelings, excess, drunkenness, vice and crime, men are lost. In the midst of plenty, peace, pleasure, intellectual attainment, social prestige, political power, scientific enlightenment and historical research, man is likewise lost. Ignorance and wisdom alike are powerless to save the soul. There is therefore no profit in gaining the whole world and losing the priceless soul.

Jesus comes to save us from sin, asking us to leave off those useless things in the development of Christian character. He gives us unearned eternal life, and asks to show appreciation of His gift by living pure lives. He asks us to renounce those things in which is no profit. The satisfaction of soul produced by salvation should appear the desire for great earthly wealth. The service of God should fill our cup of joy to the brim.

Jesus expects his saved to take up their cross daily. Cross bearing is a special proof of salvation. Cross bearing is a duty required daily, constantly. Cross bearing involves bearing the name of Christ, church membership, public and private worship, and defending his cause. Cross bearing requires self-renunciation. It requires its bearer to ever be known as Christ. The great wooden beam of Christ's cross overcame Him, for there was none to sustain Him, he bore it alone. In our cross bearing we have Him to sustain us, and He assured us that: "All power is given unto me, so ye therefore and preach the gospel to all nations, etc." Hatred, ridicule, betrayal and the stigma of the cross of Christ may be our portion, but He promised to be with us until the end.

If we would know that we are truly following Christ—its proof is in the fact, that for Christ's sake we deny our self and daily bear his cross. If we are not willing to submit ourselves to Him at all times, we are not truly following Him. If we are ashamed of the result of bearing His cross, we are not truly following Him. Our will must submit to His will, our thought and life must be directed by His word and example. We are His light and we must shine for Him.
