CENSORS SITTING ON WIRES OUT OF ITALY

LONDON, May 6.—All dispatches from Rome are so heavily censored and deleted that it is difficult to gain any intelligence from them. From this, it is believed that the crisis is still nearer.

Interventionists declare that Italy is about to join the allies.

Austria's latest note reached Rome today. The contents have not been made public.

BELIEVE GERMANY SEEKS TO DESTROY FISH FLEET

LONDON, May 6.—Seven Hull and two Grimsby trawlers are reported submerged and sunk in the North Sea. The crews were taken to Hull.

The admiralty asserts that Germany evidently hopes to destroy the British fishing fleet. It quotes the German announcement of April 17: "The object of our aerial and submarine efforts must be the destruction of the fishing fleet. The time for operation against this fleet is splendidly chosen, as the fishing is running well into the North Sea."

Another trawler was chased by a submarine, but escaped.

LOVE SUBMARINE SENDS MANY SHIPS TO DEPTHS

LONDON, May 6.—The trawlers Hector, Progress, Coquet, Northward, Bob White, Rugby and others unidentified, totalling in all eleven ves-

seils, were also torpedoed by a single German submarine Monday.

The vessel is reported as having a facsimile of the German Iron Cross painted on its conning tower.

When last seen the submarine was headed toward the Aberdeen fishing grounds. It is feared that other trawlers there will be destroyed.

The news was withheld by the admiralty until today, in an effort to locate and destroy the German.

SAV YANKEES WERE NOT WARNED BY SUBMARINE

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 6.—The Gulf Refining company telegraphs the state department that the oil tanker Gulfport was torpedoed without warning. Although it flew an American flag, it was following two British patrol boats at the time.

The message is based upon a statement by the chief officer of the vessel and "Consul Banfield." No such name appears on the consular list.

Neutral diplomats here have reported the attitude of the United States in this matter to their home governments. As a result, it is believed that Holland, Norway and Sweden will follow with similar actions.

It is noticeable that Italian ships are practically immune from attacks by submarines.

Portugal's navy consists of half a dozen small protected cruisers, in connection with a dozen torpedo craft and three submarines.

AMERICA PROTESTS THE SINKING OF THE FRYE

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 6.—The state department today published the note of the United States protesting against the destruction of the American sailing vessel, George Frye, by the German converted cruiser Eitel Friedrich, now interned at Newport News.

The note insists that the sinking of the vessel was a violation of the German-American treaty.

CANADIAN LOSSES ARE MORE THAN 6,000 MEN

LONDON, May 6.—Under Secretary of War Tennant announces that the Canadians, who bore the brunt of the attack by the German advance at Ypres last week, lost 232 officers and 6,024 men.

Princess Patricia's regiment alone lost 20 officers and 308 men. The most of these men were killed by inhaling gas fumes.

BRITISH TROOPS ARE STILL FALLING BACK

BERLIN, May 6.—It is announced that the British troops continue to retreat before the German advance in Belgium. The English have suffered heavy losses.

A number of farms along the British front have been captured by the Germans.

"Second Ty Cobb" Cause of New Fight of Federal League and Organized Baseball

Benny Kauff, crack outfielder of the Brooklyn Federal League club, called off the "Second Ty Cobb," has been the cause of another stir in the baseball world, and his action in joining the New York Giants may lead to another legal fight between the new league and organized baseball.

The baseball commission has ruled that Kauff cannot play in organized baseball, but it is expected that McGraw will fight this ruling.

Kauff, who is one of the greatest baseball players in the country, suddenly appeared at the Polo grounds, New York, April 29, and was signed by John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants. He was sent out into the field for the game with the Boston Braves in place of Jim Thorpe, the Indian, who it was learned at the time had just been sold to the Jersey City International League.

George Stallings, manager of the Boston club, protested, and then called his men off the field. "Kauff," said he, "is the property of the Brooklyn Federal League club, and he has no right to play in the National League."

The umpire ordered the Boston men to play, and on their refusal forfeited the game to the Giants. Later what McGraw called an exhibition game was played without Kauff in the lineup.

Robert B. Ward, chief financial backer of the Federal League and owner of the Brooklyn club, was at a white heat when he learned the Giants had signed Kauff. He declared war in these words:

"Kauff has a contract with the Brookfeds that is absolutely binding for three years. If the Giants believe otherwise we will fight them to the last ditch. If the Giants or any other club in organized ball want war they will get it. If the Kauff matter can be construed as a call to arms, organized baseball will regret that they ever sounded the call. We will get out and take players who have iron-clad contracts with clubs in the National and American leagues, and will fight to the limit to retain them."

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Howard Says Allies' Resent Peace Talk, Hoping to Crush Germany; Latter Nation Far From Being Defeated

by the engineers. Intervals of from six to fifteen miles separate these reserve lines. The net result is that even though successful in smashing the enemy's fighting line and breaking through at any one point only means that the defeated force fell back a few miles to take up a new position in a stronger trench, which is already waiting.

Defeat by Starvation.

"Germany has not yet exhausted her reserves in the matter of men. France has developed so rapidly during the past six months that she will be able to get her efficiency little higher. Russia apparently can contribute nothing more than she has so far, except increased numbers, and von Hindenburg has shown that mere numbers cause him little worry.

"There has been nothing so far to indicate that Germany faces the probability of defeat in the open field. If defeated, it will probably be only by wastage. Meanwhile, the wastage of the allies will be equally heavy. If France and Belgium can contribute nothing more, the additional weight necessary for an allied victory must come from England.

England Near Crisis.

"Up to this time the average Englishman has not sensed the price he will have to pay for a crushed Germany. He has not yet suffered as Germany and France have suffered, because relatively his contribution of

troops has been small. Press censorship, to which the Englishman is wholly unaccustomed, has prevented him from getting the thrill that would come from a full knowledge of the facts. As a result England is rapidly approaching the point where she must make a choice between one of three courses: Abolish the press censorship and give her newspapers an opportunity to double or triple the present volunteer army through stirring British patriotism; resort to conscription, and in that way obtain the needed number, or make up her mind to abandon her ideas of decisively defeating Germany."
