OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Mother"

Prov. 31:27. "She looketh well to the ways of her household."

Lord's Day May 9th, records the seventh birthday of what has become known as Mother's Day. Miss Anna Jarvis, the founder of the day, suggests that everyone wear a flower in honor of Mother. And if Mother is living make her a visit or write her a letter. Over 2,500 years ago Solomon paid a high tribute to a good woman, and on Mother's Day it would be very appropriate to read the account found in Prov. 31:10-31.

Herold Bell Wright, in his book, "The Winning of Barbara Worth," says that at the place where the body of the woman was found to whom it was supposed little Barbara belonged, the old banker placed on a headstone the only name possible, "Mother."

Mother—it is a word to conjure with; to call up scenes and incidents that have made the deepest and loveliest impressions upon our hearts. Associated with the impressionable age of childhood, there are few incidents in the early past in which mother is not the central figure, the presiding genius; and with many she continues to hold this enviable position throughout life. As the autumn of life comes on, Mother is more sensitive to kindness and attentions, also to the lack of these manifestations of our love. Now she has more time for thinking, and as the hours seem longer she is more given to introspection, her hands are forgetting their cunning, and she is gradually resigning her

labors and cares. It is now that unless she is given the best of care and attention she may begin to feel she is useless, and only in the way.

"The sweetest face in all the world to me
Sets in a frame of shining silver hair,
With eyes whose language is fidelity;
This is my Mother. Is she not most fair?"

'Tis counted something great to be a queen,
And bend a kingdom to a woman's will.
To be a Mother such as mine, I ween,
Is something better and more noble still."

The greatest need of the American people is for more homes where Christ is honored, where God is loved and where the children are taught to pray. Every child has a right to expect a certain heritage from its mother, and, of course, from its father, as well, and that heritage lies in three things:

First, what the child receives through birth. Every child has a right to good parents, but every child does not get its rights. W. W. Holmes said: "A child's education begins 100 years before he is born." When Sampson, the physical giant, was in the mind of God he said to the mother, "be careful of your meat and drink and your daily conduct."

Second, training in godly character. Abraham Lincoln's mother perhaps knew little about germs and modern diseases, but she gave the world a great man. To feed and clothe a child is the smallest part of the work.

The mind and soul are of more value than the world.

Third, the example of a consistent Christian life. Train a child up in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it. One who was known as a bad boy in school after being dismissed from school and asked to inform his mother, said, "I haven't seen mother for two weeks, and then she was going out. When I start to school she is asleep, and they won't let me wake her, and in the evening she is out to tea and when she comes home at night I am in bed asleep."

Who is really bad, the boy or his mother?
