The tests being made this year are of two types, those where the field peas, rye, and red clover and dry land alfalfa are inoculated with pure cultures of bacteria, and those not inoculated.

Rye—J. A. Douglas, Odessa; R. H. Short, Fort Klamath; E. M. Leever, Fort Klamath.

Alfalfa—Tom Watters, Mt. Laki; H. J. Ticknor, Bonanza; F. A. Janssen, Swan Lake; E. Egger, Hildebrand; Loosley & Sons, Fort Klamath.

Red clover—R. A. Janssen, Swan Lake.
