OUR DUTY NOW

THE PRESIDENT'S note to Germany, summed up, says that the United States is tired of the loss of American life and property brought about by the submarine warfare that is being waged, classifies such methods as violations of international and humanity's laws, and warns Germany that the United States will act as well as speak in the protection of American rights and privileges. These are strong words, truly, but they come only after an "innocent bystander" the United States has been subjected to so many indignities that forbearance has ceased to be a virtue.

This is the work that the president and his cabinet have taken up to secure better treatment for America and Americans. They do so after a thorough investigation, after the receipt of much information, perhaps, that is withheld from the public. It is a big undertaking, and a most serious one, too, and its success to a big extent depends upon the attitude of the American people right now.

In the European countries at war, the monarchs do not have to consult their subjects regarding hostilities; it is the duty of the loyal subjects to march to slaughter at a word from the ruler. In this country, it is different, and the president, speaking to Germany, speaks not for himself alone, nor for the democratic party, but for every man, woman and child.

This is a peace loving nation, and war, if possible, will be averted. If war will be averted or not depends a great deal upon the actions of the American people at this critical moment. The atmosphere is, of course, surcharged with war excitement and partisanship, and a little criticism of one side or the other, might be sufficient to start trouble which, though trivial of itself, might lead to something more serious after reaching more influential points through distorting and magnifying channels. A little care in this respect, leaving the settlement in the hands of the cabinet, will work wonders toward an amicable settlement.

RADIUM GAINS AS CANCER CURE

OF 746 cases of cancer treated in the Radium Institute of London last year there were 69 apparent cures, while 328 were reported improved. Many of the cases came to the attention of the institute in too advanced a stage to be remedied. The comparatively new curative known as radium is especially useful in dealing with superficial cancers of the skin and with cases that are not easily operable. Conveniently handled, it gets at growths which can not be reached by means of the X-rays. Because the patient can take radium in the mouth, cancer of the mouth or palate, for instance, can be readily dealt with by radium.

Those birthmarks commonly known as "port wine stains" seem to be effectively treated with radium. A porter suffering from this disfigurement had repeatedly been refused employment. He went to the institute, and after a time the mark was entirely eradicated.

New Power in the United States Navy



Captain William S. Benson

The appointment of Captain William S. Benson, commandant of the Philadelphia navy yard, as the first chief of the bureau of operations in the navy, was announced by Secretary Daniels. The selection of Captain Benson for the new post, which will be equal in importance to that of commander in chief of the Atlantic fleet, was a surprise. The important fact in the regulations prescribed for the chief of operations is that he assumes both the responsibility and the authority for the most important functions in the navy. The aid for operations, his predecessor, was hampered by the fact that congress never gave legal sanction to the post created by Mr. Myer and that he was only to "advise" and "recommend." The new official will direct where the aid for operations has been able only to suggest. He will control practically everything pertaining to the maintenance of war efficiency except in regard to the material, and it is predicted that eventually the bureau of operations will perform functions now in the hands of the aid for material. This is said to be the only thing lacking besides the name to constitute the new bureau a naval general staff.
