STAND BY THE PRESIDENT

IN AN address delivered at the Union League Club in Philadelphia last week, former President William Howard Taft urged patience and calmness in the present international situation, and expressed entire approval of the stand of President Wilson. Mr. Taft said:

"There are things worse than war, but delay due to calm deliberation cannot change the situation nor minimize the effect of what we finally conclude to do.

"We must bear in mind that if we have a war it is the people who must pay with their lives and money the cost of it, and therefore they should not be hurried into the sacrifice until it is clear that they wish it and know what they are doing when they wish it. A demand for war that cannot survive the passion of the first days of public indignation and will not endure the test of delay and deliberation by all the people is not one that should be yielded to.

"The task of the president is a heavy one. He is acting for the whole country. He is anxious to find a way out of the present difficulty without war. Before party, before ourselves, we are for our country. That is what he is working for. Shall we not stand by him in it? He will not surrender our country's rights. It may be necessary that for a hundred lives and the method of their taking we should lose thousands and hundreds of thousands of lives. The national honor and interests may ultimately demand it, but time for serious thought and clearly weighing the consequences will not prejudice the justice of our cause nor the opportunity to vindicate it, and this the president may be counted on to secure.

"It is the people's cause, not his alone, and he does well when quick action is of no critical importance, to ally excitement, and to await the regular and studied action of the people's representatives."

Reservation Fishing Is Still Unsettled

The following from William B. Freer, superintendent of the Klamath reservation, outlines the present situation in regard to white people fishing on the reservation:

"Confirming to my promise, this is to inform you with regard to the matter of permitting white persons to fish on the reservation, as considered by the Tribal Council.

The sentiment of the council was against granting the fishing privilege to persons from outside the reservation. There are several reasons for this.

"First—Many transient visitors to the reservation are inconsiderate of the privilege which they have enjoyed, disregarding both the rights and feelings of the Indians, destroying or injuring growing crops, fences, and the like. The presence of this class of people on the reservation the council considers detrimental.

"Second—The parts of the reservation which are frequented by white fishermen and tourists have become a sort of a Sunday pleasure ground, which is distasteful to the better class of the reservation people.

"Third (and the consideration which carried most weight)—Was the uncertainty whether the council has a legal right to determine, or whether it would be the part of wisdom to recommend, that restrictions imposed by federal law and by treaty should be removed or considered of no effect.

"The council will meet again soon, when the matter of fishing by outsiders will no doubt again be taken up for further discussion. The members appreciate the friendship of the white people, and wish to do everything in their power to retain it. They also appreciate the work of the state fish commission, as it benefits the reservation streams.
