TIME FOR ACTION

THERE was prevalent some years ago a belief that the moon is inhabited, that the people there were anxious to communicate with earth, and that if all the people on this planet would at a given moment let out a prolonged shout, the shout would be of sufficient volume to make it audible to the moon people.

Accordingly, arrangements were made for such a shout. The differences in time were all figured out, until every person in the world knew to the exact second of time to begin shouting. No detail was neglected that would in any way help to make the effort world-wide and spontaneous.

The great day at last arrived. The people began to eat throat tablets that they might yell louder.

The hour approached. People began to cluster in appointed places.

It was a minute until the appointed time; a few seconds; the time; and then—SILENCE in large quantities.

This is a matter that is squarely up to you, and you, and you, as citizens of Klamath county. There are different methods to pursue, but this is no time for procrastination. Something must be done at once, or we might as well tear out our exhibit in the Oregon building.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Unsearchable Riches of Christ"

Eph. 3:8—"Unto me, who am the least of all saints, is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ."

The apostle, after defining his position as revealed by the spirit, intimates that he is highly honored with the privilege of preaching the gospel to the Gentiles. We notice, first, what Paul terms the riches of Christ embraces all the benefits of the gospel. Gospel is defined "good news." Jesus proclaimed, "Repent ye, and believe the gospel." Paul tells us, "the gospel is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth." Salvation is said to be wholly of grace, which is the unmerited favor of God. Salvation cannot be in any degree or way earned. It is the gift of God. To earn anything requires its equivalent in payment. We pay nothing; we believe only.

Second, Paul terms the benefits of the gospel "The unsearchable riches of Christ. Unsearchable, in this sense, means past finding out. We can't know how vile sin appears to a holy God. We can't know how the holy God can desire and purpose to save men who have become enemies on account of sin. We can't know how such a being as God could give his only Son, heir of heaven, and ultimate ruler of all the earth, to purchase man's redemption. We can't comprehend how God's infinite Son would consent to assume a lower order of existence, or being, in order to save man. We can't know why God's Son, rejected and slain by one people, would extend mercy to another who have no birthright. Scripture says: "To Abraham and his seed were the promises given." We can't understand how God, who has been irreparably wronged by us, can even for his Son's sake, look upon us as though we had not sinned. We can't understand how even God can transform aliens,

and enemies into sons. We can't understand how God's spirit can accommodate and assimilate with the person of man in the regeneration. We can't understand how God can justify the unjust, through the atonement of the Just One. We can't understand spiritual creation. We can't solve the mystery of death, in which God separates spirit from flesh, retaining it in a place of rest until the resurrection. We can't understand the resurrection in which God brings together decomposed bodies, and eternal spirits, and forms them into glorious bodies, like unto Christ's glorious body. The gospel of Christ declares all these to be truths, and we are asked to believe them because God inspired them. No wonder Paul termed them the unsearchable riches of Christ. Who can discover them?

Third, the unsearchable riches of Christ gives security through the grace of God. For "He was made sin for us, who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." He prayed the Father that he might be given the glory he had with him before the world was formed. He said, "I go to prepare a place for you." "I will come again and receive you unto myself." He rose from the dead to take his seat at God's right hand, to intercede for us. He positively declared, "All power is given unto me, both in heaven and in earth; go ye, therefore, and preach the gospel to all nations." It is further stated, "That He is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think."—Eph. 3:16-19. The riches of Christ are bestowed upon believers as a free gift. "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Faith in Christ is the key that unlocks the treasure house of God's eternal grace, yielding eternal life to those who believe. We close with this scriptural admonition: "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

Reclamation Service Is Being Reorganized

operation of their respective projects, and will be held strictly responsible for the economical and efficient administration of the project offices.

Divisions

4—Executive and engineering—The director and chief engineer shall be the executive officer of the service, and shall govern and control all employees engaged in investigating, constructing, operating and maintaining projects. He shall issue all instructions required to carry out approved policies and for executing the necessary work, through the executive officer at Denver. The chief of construction shall represent the executive officer in the field, and shall have charge of the Denver office and all employees engaged in the construction, operation and maintenance of the projects and works incident thereto. He shall

report to the director and chief engineer and subject to the latter's general approval, shall adopt the measures necessary to execute the approved plans and policies.

Project managers or engineers will report direct to the chief of construction at Denver, as will all detached officers prior to the proposed consolidation.

5—Legal division—The chief counsel, as the head of the legal division, shall conduct all investigations involving the legal rights and privileges of the service, and will control all employees of his division. He will correspond direct with the district counsel in regard to legal affairs, but shall communicate with the executive department through the chief engineer and regular channels.

6—Fiscal division—The comptroller, as the head of the fiscal division, shall conduct the examination and auditing of all accounts. For this purpose he shall organize and control an ample force of inspectors, auditors and accountants to insure the thorough inspection and audit of the accounts kept in all offices of the service, and to collect and compile the information as to fiscal affairs required by the Secretary of the Interior and the service. The force under his control may be divided between Washington and Denver offices, as may be considered for the best interests of the service. The inspectors shall advise and direct the field offices as to routine methods of complying with approved regulations only, and shall promptly report all irregularities to the comptroller, who will advise the executive officer, and the latter shall rectify the matter through regular channels.

7—Supervisor of Irrigation—The supervisor of irrigation shall maintain an office at Billings, Montana, and shall advise and counsel with water users as to the best practice of irrigation and cultivating irrigated lands, the development of markets and all questions affecting the welfare of settlers and water users. He shall consult and co-operate with the experts of the agricultural department that are assigned to the projects, and advise the executive officer of the reclamation service regarding all irregularities in the operating departments of the respective projects that may come to his notice through inspection or otherwise.



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
