GET BEHIND IT

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE
Last night took action towards maintaining a salaried representative at the Klamath booth at the Oregon building in San Francisco, by the appointment of a committee to rustle the necessary finances. There has been much said about the need of a representative but the matter is now squarely up to the people of the county. If they are willing to contribute to the salary fund, the representative will be chosen soon and sent south to tell visitors of Klamath's resources, answer questions preponed by people interested, and in other ways work to divert as much of the fair-visiting delegation to Klamath county for sightseeing, investments, etc., as is possible.

Thirty men paying \$5 a month would create a fund of \$150 monthly. Sixty men paying \$2.50 monthly would raise the same sum. The burden need not be borne by a few, and a little donation of this kind will be one of the best investments that can be made for the upbuilding of Klamath county.

The exposition has but six months more to run. If we are to gain anything from it of a permanent benefit, no time can be lost in getting busy. The committee will start work as soon as possible, but this need not delay you from sending in your exposition fund donation to the Chamber of Commerce right away.

IT MIGHT HELP

IF SOME ingenious statesman could devise and secure the adoption of a scheme by which the salaries of members of the political power would rise and fall from the general business conditions, we should not wait so long for remedial legislation.

If, for instance, the democratic senators and congressmen who helped frame the tariff law found their salaries dwindling at the same rate that the incomes of manufacturers and laborers are decreasing, there would be loud demand for a special session to revise the tariff.

NAILS LAY UP TWO FORT MEN

ONE STEPS ON A NAIL, ANOTHER SWALLOWS ONE, BUT BOTH HAD TO HAVE DOCTOR—OTHER NEWS FROM THE FORT

FORT KLAMATH, May 25.—The Fort Klamath-Bend auto stage service is now in operation. The stages leave the Bend garage and the Wood River Valley garage here Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings, and the route traveled includes stops at Skeen ranch, Lonroth, Crescent, La Pine and Harper. A car is also sent to Chiloquin Monday, Wednesday and Friday to connect with the train from the Falls.

The Fort Klamath school closes on next Friday, after a successful year under the principalship of Miss Leah Parks. An entertainment was given last week to help defray expenses for the new piano.
