WHAT CAUSED IT?

"WE LONG ago ceased to be chiefly exporters of food, and became exporters of manufactures," said Secretary Redfield of the Department of Commerce, in Philadelphia, April 30th. True enough, but he did not add that it was the policy of protection which built up our manufacturing industries until we are able to get into the foreign market.

"The group of manufactures in our foreign trade before the war broke out was the largest of all, and in this group the item of fully finished manufactures was the largest and growing factor," continued the secretary. If by "fully finished manufactures" Mr. Redfield meant the "manufactures ready for consumption" group, the figures issued by his bureau will hardly bear him out insofar as the year 1914 is concerned, for they show a decrease in exports of such manufactures from \$463,700,000 in 1913 to \$389,550,000 in 1914, a difference of over \$74,000,000.

Considering the exports of the two classes mentioned by the secretary, food and manufactures for the period October 4, 1913, when a democratic tariff law was enacted, to July 31, 1914, when war was declared, we find a decrease of exports of "food-stuffs partly or wholly manufactured," as listed in the monthly summary, from \$440,029,698 for a similar period under the republican tariff law to \$350,390,774, or an export decrease of \$89,638,924.

On "manufactures for further use in manufacturing" and "manufactures ready for consumption," there was exported under republican law \$989,363,010; under democratic law \$896,563,060, a decrease of \$92,799,950, same periods considered. Therefore, on these two groups alone our exports decreased about \$182,000,000. We were having difficulty to hold the domestic market. The total excess of all exports for the periods named were \$606,639,636 under republican law, and \$345,598,997 under democratic law, or a slump of \$261,040,639. And for this condition of affairs the American producer is blamed because he is either sulky or unscientific in his methods. At least their lack of science in 1916 will not be attributed to their vote.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

NEW YORK, May 28.—Not in the history of baseball has the grand old game got such a series of jolts as it did on the getaway this year. Surprise piled on top of surprise, and the experts and statisticians who settled the races during the winter months shuddered and wept as they saw teams they had picked for one-two-three go bumping along in the rear, winning about one game a week.

Probably the one biggest jolt handed the "dope" was the way the rejuvenated Yankees, under Wild Bill Donovan, fox-trotted out in front of Ban Johnson's loop. "A mere flash in the pan," said many. He that as it may, they admit now that it is "some flash." The Yankees are still tearing along at a mighty formidable clip. They lose lots of games, of course. But they are still winning more than they are losing and, that will keep them up there in the front ranks.

Donovan necessarily draws the bulk of the credit for the improved form of the Yankees. "Wild Bill" has infused his cohorts with the fighting spirit and he lashes them along whenever they show signs of weakening. But there are some other factors that enter into the good showing of this gang.

High and Pipp, the two ex-Tigers lassoed by the new Yankee management, have been playing a bang-up article of the national pastime all spring. Both have been hitting right around a three hundred clip and fielding almost faultlessly. Pipp grabbed the first base job away from young Andy Mullen after the hardest kind of a battle. Since, however, he has proven that he is entitled to the job by whaling the ball in terrific style.

"Lute" Boone at second and Fritz Maisel at third have played championship ball all the way. This pair will come close to crowding any two similar positions in the league for honors. This youngster boasted before the season opened that if he batted .300 he would steal more than a hundred bases this season. Thus far he has made good. He has batted close to three hundred and he has swiped an average of one base a game. As there are 154 games on the schedule, if he maintains anything near his

present clip he'll chalk up his 100 stolen bases and then some.

In the pitching line Donovan has been getting some nifty work. The three Rays—Keating, Caldwell and Fisher—have been winning consistently. Jack Warhop has been twirling class ball, but has lost several hard luck games. Paddy Bauman, an ex-Tiger, is also hurling a good brand of stuff for the Yankee crew.

Comiskey's White Sox form another surprise, though not as great a one as furnished by Donovan's outfit. The Chicago bunch before the season opened, presented a problem. No one knew exactly how to figure them. There was a big "if" in connection with them. In the first place, the manager, Clarence Rowland, was an unknown quantity in the major leagues. He had come out of the bushes with a good record as a manager, but whether his stuff would win games in the big tent was a question. That he is making good is evidenced by the standing of the white hosed athletes in the percentage column.

Jacques Fournier, the big Frenchman who has been with the Sox for several seasons, is hitting like a fiend this year. He collects, among divers other hits, a brace of doubles almost every day. Eddie Collins is adding great strength to the Comiskey clan, and if they continue to get fair pitching they will be battling with the leaders all season.

Hugh Jennings has his Tigers back in the running after years spent back with the trailers. The wily manager set about putting it together again with young blood. Of course, he has some of the old crew left to work with. Cobb and Crawford, for instance, bump the ball with the regularity that they did in the days of old. Bue Jennings has added some valuable young blood to the club, and again has a contender in the field.

Up Boston way the fans are pulling for the Red Sox twirling staff to round into shape. That's about all Carrigan needs to have his club in the going. So far this season the Boston pitchers have been going poorly. "Smoky Joe" Wood is just getting right after an illness. Vean Gregg is still out of it, and the others haven't flashed the brand of twirling they are capable of delivering.
