## BONANZA SCHOOL TERM IS ENDED

FOUR YEAR HIGH SCHOOL  
COURSE NOW OFFERED IN  
CLOVER LEAF TOWN—MAN-  
UAL TRAINING TAKEN UP

The 1914-15 term of school closed  
at Bonanza yesterday, after a highly  
successful year. This was the first  
year of the full high school course,  
and the results attained have been so  
pleasing that the board contemplates  
the addition of new equipment, etc.,  
for the extension of the work.

For the first time the school now  
has a course in manual training. Un-  
der Frank Olney, the boys made won-  
derful progress this year in the prac-  
tical use of woodworking tools. Be-  
sides desks, tables, tabernacles, book-  
cases and other useful articles, the  
boys this term demonstrated their  
ability at house building by the con-  
struction of a model house, built to  
scale, and complete, even to stair-  
cases, partitions, etc. This is a re-  
markable model for demonstrating  
the different features of such con-  
struction. Mechanical drawing is  
also a part of this course.

Ray P. Burk is principal of the  
Bonanza school, and he is assisted in  
the high school work by Frank Olney.  
Miss Eta McCormick had the seventh  
and eighth grades, Miss Henrietta  
Lyon the fourth, fifth and sixth, and  
the lower grades were taught by Miss  
Grace Lytle.

## SPRING, NOT AIR, FOR AUTO TIRES

FORMER KLAMATH JEWELER,  
NOW AT DUNSMUIR, HAS NEW  
INVENTION—MADE DIRIGIBLE  
PLANS WHILE HERE

DUNSMUIR, Calif., June 1.—Z.  
Riddle, a jeweler of this city, has in-  
vented and patented a new automo-  
bile wheel composed of springs which  
replace the spokes and act as a cush-  
ion to eliminate the use of pneu-  
matic tires. It is being tested out  
on a big five-passenger car which is  
being run over the mountain roads  
here and will, with one or two minor  
changes, it is alleged by automobile  
men of this county, replace pneu-  
matic tires entirely.

Riddle's invention comprises the  
hub, rim and spokes. The spokes  
are of spring steel, describing a half-  
circle, ten springs to each wheel; the  
shock or jar from a rough place in  
the road causes the springs below the  
hub to close down, at the same time  
causing the ones above to open, thus  
giving a perfect resilience, also acting  
as a partial shock absorber.

Riddle expects to have the wheel  
perfected in a short time and ready  
for the market. With the use of this  
wheel and solid tires automobiles will  
be able to get from 15,000 to 20,000  
miles out of each set of tires. The  
tests of this wheel are proving so per-  
fect that expert tire men are en-  
deavoring to obtain the patent to  
use on a royalty and allege that at  
last an invention has been made that  
will do away with pneumatic tires  
entirely.

## "War Baby" Problem Still a Great Puzzle

LONDON, May 21.—(By mail to  
New York)—Great Britain is still  
struggling with its "war baby" prob-  
lem.

Preliminary to expected parliam-  
entary action in the case of thousands  
of unmarried war mothers carried  
away by sentiment in the vicinity of  
military training camps, hundreds of  
views on the subject have been for-  
warded in the press and at public  
meetings by persons prominent in  
church and society.

Several women's societies have taken  
up the problem with a vigor and are  
investigating reports that at least  
20,000 young women throughout  
Britain now face the problem of bear-  
ing nameless children. Prominent  
among these is a committee of the  
National Union of Women Workers,  
formally delegated by the Archbishop  
of Canterbury and York, Adeline  
Duchess of Bedford, Lady London-  
derry and other notables, to investi-  
gate and report. This report will be  
made to a committee at large com-  
posed of representatives of other or-

ganizations and over which the Arch-  
bishop of York will preside, and a  
general program of relief will then  
be instituted. Over twenty women's  
societies of London have also formed  
a consolidated committee to deal with  
the situation.

The country faces an entirely new  
situation in the opinion of Muriel  
Viscountess Helmsley, one of the  
most prominent workers, who today  
expressed her view on the question.

"It is necessary to set up new so-  
cial machinery. That existing for  
years is not capable of dealing with  
such a problem as this. There should  
be some law to allow the girl to at-  
tach responsibility to the father be-  
fore the child is born."

"The best thing in this emergency  
will be for the father and mother to  
be assisted to form a home when it  
becomes possible. Assistance might  
also be given the girls by a school of  
mothers. My last word would be,  
assist these unfortunate girls, but do  
not glorify them and allow them to  
think they have done a fine thing for  
the nation. Do not taboo them, but  
don't make heroines of them."

## A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP

CHICAGO, June 1.—Johnny Cou-  
lon, the little Logan Square battler  
who so long wore the crown of the  
bantams on his bald head, is going  
to try a comeback. The experience  
of Jim Jefferies and countless other  
gentlemen who have essayed similar  
stunts with disastrous results, has  
no terrors for Johnny. He is as con-  
fident that he will win back the belt  
as he is of anything.

Johnny, however, has not lived  
twenty-eight years for nothing. He  
knows a lot of tricks yet, even he is  
an ex-champ, and he is basing his  
hopes to take the title away from  
Kid Williams, on two things—one is  
that he really believes he packs a  
big enough wallop to put the Bal-  
timore Dane away. The other is a  
well founded belief that Williams  
can no longer scale 116 pounds, the  
legitimate bantam limit—and be in a  
strong condition—all the expostula-  
tions of Sammy Harris to the con-

boxing since he became an "ex." He  
is constantly in training, and spends  
most of his time away from the little  
elgar store that bears his name up

ada and spend all summer in the  
woods. Then he is going to come  
back, take on a few boys to get a  
good line on himself, and then he  
will spring his big coup.

This, of course, is all according to  
Johnny, but the little fighter only  
weighs 118 pounds stripped now and  
looks every inch in condition. And  
there are a lot of Chicago fans, par-

Williams, but that he'll do it.
