FINDS BEET SUGAR GOOD FOR CANNING PURPOSES

(Herald Special Service)
OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 2.—Now that the canning season is again opening up, it is well to call the attention of farmers and to others doing home canning to the fact that beet sugar is identical in chemical composition to cane sugar, and is the equivalent of it for sweetening purposes. A very common prejudice against beet sugar has existed in the past, and is hard to remove, but according to analyses made by Professor Tartar, agricultural chemist of the Oregon station, there is no difference in the value of the two kinds of sugar.

The experience of a home canner shows that fact. "I had always used the best Hawaiian cane sugar, but after reading a bulletin on the beet sugar I tried to get some to experiment with. So great is the prejudice against it that I was unable to get any in nearby towns. I had some sent from a beet sugar factory and made quince and blackberry jelly with it, and some with cane sugar, and had I not labeled the two kinds I nor anyone else could have distinguished a particle of difference between the results. I also made a few jars of blackberry jam and canned some blackberries successfully with the beet sugar."

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New Bug Is Used to Make Plants Grow

LONDON, June 2.—American agriculturists are to be aided by Professor W. B. Bottomley of Kings college, University of London, in introducing across the sea the new bug which he has discovered. This bacteria, which is cultivated in peat, is reported to have given marvelous results on grain and vegetables.

In the past two years Professor Bottomley has conducted experiments at Kew Gardens and elsewhere with his "bacterialized peat," and so wonderful have been the results that he is testing it in large areas of land. The results are termed as "a new method of intensive culture of the nitrogen-fixing bacteria in the soil." Recently Professor Bottomley showed a jar of tomatoes which were grown in sand which had been baked to kill all life in it, before the tomato seeds were planted therein. Then the soil was watered with a very weak solution of the bacterialized peat, and the tomatoes flourished.

"It is a bug that does it all," said the professor. "Our first difficulty was to find him, and then to nurture him. There is no telling where it will all end. It may revolutionize agriculture, who knows? In recent years evidence has been accumulated that the organic matter of the soil with its myriads of bacterial inhabitants, is the most essential factor of soil fertility. The decay of organic matter produces humus. This material furnishes food and energy for numerous soil bacteria, and is gradually converted by them into substances, and they also render the mineral food constituents of the soil available for plants. Thus a new humus theory of soil fertility is gradually evolving as the result of modern research."

Like Albert, Italy's King Is a Fighter

GENEVA, May 31, via Paris.—Dispatches from the Italian front set forth that King Victor Emmanuel, like King Albert of the Belgians, intends to take an active part in the war. During the recent attack of the Italian forces on Montebaldo, his majesty is described as having taken charge of one of the 75-millimeter guns, and even as firing many shots himself. Subsequently for many hours he watched the operations. It was raining hard at the time, and when the king finally returned to his headquarters he was wet through and covered with mud.

The Italians are continuing their advance in the Aidge Valley, and the flight in deep snow for the pass at St. Elvio is still going on. On the Carinthian frontier, the Italians are said to be holding most of the passes and strategic points.

The Italians seem to be going slowly on this portion of their frontier, while they push their heaviest attacks in the direction of Trieste.

Swiss observers are of the opinion that up to the present time the Italian forces have encountered mostly Austrian reserves. They will meet more determined resistance when the seasoned troops from Russia come into action. It is reported in Geneva that the Russians are already feeling less pressure in Galicia. The suddenness of the Italian offensive surprised the Austrian and German leaders, and they have had to change their plans.

New Civic Idealism Discussed by Women

PORTLAND, June 2.—The second day's session of the council of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, today was devoted to the civics department. In an interesting address Mrs. James C. Wilson of Wenatchee, Wash., detailed what women's clubs were accomplishing in a civic way.

"The New Civic Idealism" was the subject of an address by Dr. Carter Helm Jones of Seattle. "Money, Morals and Methods of Civil Service Reform" was the interesting subject chosen by Mrs. Frederick H. Cole of Omaha.

She discussed the advisability of placing civil service reform literature in public schools and libraries, advocated the organization of classes in the study of good government both in club and in co-operation with local civil reform committees, and declared for public meetings where men of ability and prominence may explain the nature of civil service laws.
