MORE PSYCHOLOGY

PRESIDENT WILSON'S Indianapolis speech had a good deal to say about "the team," and about the way "members of the team" should "play the game," and about what would happen to any of the players who break training or otherwise bail-up the game. And yet there is a noticeable and lamentable absence of democratic team work. The president captain has evidently given the signal for a prosperity play all along the line, with a run around the end to goal, if possible; and some of "the team" have tried to execute the maneuver.

The game was to convince the people that prosperity has returned and that a great job, accompanied by high wages, is Sherlock-Holmesing every able-bodied man. But, all at once, the play was broken up by the bureau of labor statistics in the department of labor in a report on unemployment in New York city. The report is based on a census of 104 city blocks selected to include a representative number of families of various nationalities and all classes of industrial workers, combined with a census of all families in 3,703 individual tenement houses and residences, covering a still wider range of distribution.

The enumeration was made in the first half of February, 1915. Information was obtained from 54,849 families having a total membership of 229,428 persons, of which number 95,443 were wage earners. Of these families 11,723 had one or more wage earners out of work, showing an aggregate of 15,417 persons, or 16.2 percent of all wage earners in these families without employment of any kind. The total number of wage earners in New York city in 1915 is approximately 2,455,000. The percentage of unemployment found among the numbers of 54,849 families (16.2 per cent), applied to this number, shows that the total number of unemployed in New York city was about 398,000. That estimate does not include any of the irregular or part-time workers.

A tabulation of the unemployed by periods of unemployment shows that 11.1 per cent had been out of work more than 180 days; 26.4 per cent more than 120 days; 39.3 per cent more than 90 days; 58.8 per cent more than 60 days; 76.4 per cent more than 30 days; 88.4 per cent more than 15 days; and 92.8 per cent were out of work at least one week. The occupations or grades having the largest number of persons unemployed out of the total of 15,417 were: Common laborers; 2,440; building trades, 2,045; and the clothing trade, 1,781. The fact is noted, however, that the figures were obtained at a season of the year when in the building trades and in the clothing trades is normally slack and that the number out of work reported for these trades was affected to a large extent by the slack season.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Tree of Life"

By Rev. E. C. Richards, Pastor Grace M. E. Church

"And the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations."—Rev. 22:2.

1.—The Two Trees.

In Genesis, 2:9, in the description of the Garden of Eden, there is the mention of the two trees, that of the knowledge of good and evil, which came through evil itself in actual sinning, and therefore better known as the tree of life. The tree of death was tasted, and it took all of several thousand years of time and a thousand pages of the written word, and the suffering, death and resurrection of the living word, Jesus, to begin to overcome the results of the tree of death.

The tree of life is mentioned in the beginning of the word, and is never mentioned again except by analogy, until we find it again in the last of the book. The figure from which this is taken is the continuation of the picture of the redeemed city come down out of heaven from God. The picture is taken directly from Ezekiel, 47:7-12, the river starting from the throne in Jerusalem, starting "drop by drop," and becoming a mighty flood, flows into the sea and heals it. In this Revelation picture the river comes from the throne also, and carries healing and life. On the borders of the river in Ezekiel, there grew trees good for food, their properties being attributed to the virtue of the waters. Here in Revelation there also grows trees, but they are not simply fruit trees, but rather are they a medicine for sin. "And the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations."

2.—The River.

The river is not the Styx, by whose plutonian shores the ghosts of the Greeks floated out and down to the unknown sea. It is not the Nile nor the Jordan, nor the Euphrates, nor the Mississippi, nor the Amazon. It is, in simple parlance, the river of life.

The business of the river of life is to give life. It is nothing less than the life giving grace of God flowing out into the world from his throne. It is the organized form of that river, the church. This has always been a power for the redemption of the race, no matter how it may have erred.

The duty of every one to belong to this church in the conflict with sin, is plain.

3.—The Tree of Life.

In John's vision there was the tree of life in great numbers. The singular number denotes that they were

all of one species. We who would be in the garden of life must grow by the river for three reasons: First, to belong to this garden, we must have within us the life giving stream and the likeness of the species. Second, to belong to this garden there must be fruitage. Fruitage is twofold in purpose, to produce its kind and to give food. The trees bore fruitage monthly, that is, continually. Third, there must be the healing leaves. And somehow we are most struck with this thought in the reading. The leaves were a medicine. Balm of Gilead. Balm of the balsam tree by Jordan in Jericho. Balm from the decoction of the buds, hylobalsam; the next better, made by pressing the fruit, carpopalsam; the best, made by an incision into the body from which flowed the life-giving sap, opobalsam.
