Kathleen Kaye, a 16-year-old girl, was one of the heroines of the Lusitania. She got into a lifeboat with a large number of women and children. When one of the crew, overcome in the excitement, collapsed, she took an oar and rowed for hours until the boatload was picked up. McCormack, one of the wireless operators, calmly took photographs as the ship was sinking. He went down with the ship, but he was picked up. His films were destroyed by the water. The photographs show them shortly after their arrival at Queens-town.
