

BAR EXTENSION BARRED BY COP

TABER'S EXTENSION INTO ADJOINING ROOM IS A MATTER FOR DISCUSSION AT LAST NIGHT'S COUNCIL MEETING

Does a saloon license, entitling the holder thereof to operate a wholesale and retail liquor store give the holder a right to operate two bars?

Or, does a bar, beginning in one room and extending the length of another by means of a "horseshoe" connection constitute one bar or two bars?

This little quandary was last night bequeathed to City Attorney Carnahan by the old council. It comes as the result of a protest from I. P. Taber.

Taber's license gives him two entrances, 111 and 113 Fourth street, to his bar. Some months ago he tore out part of the partition between the two rooms and extended his bar into

the second room. The 113 side has been used mainly for wholesaling, bottled goods, etc., but recently more bar fixtures were installed there, and the place used as the other bar.

A few days ago Chief of Police Smith stopped such use of the room. Last night Attorney F. H. Mills, for Taber, entered a protest against any move by the council to sustain this action.

Mayor Nicholas contended that by such an arrangement Taber was maintaining two bars, and said this was not allowed by the city charter without an additional license to sell liquor at 111 and 113 Fourth street. Councilman Owens moved to leave the matter to the city attorney.

OVERLAND PRICE IS REDUCED NOW

CUT OF \$225 IN SELLING PRICE OF POPULAR CAR IS ANNOUNCED—WHITE PELICAN GARAGE NOW AGENT

The biggest sensation in automobile circles so far this year is the cut of \$225 in the price of the 1918 Overland.

The largest four cylinder Overland produced this year will sell for \$750 at the factory, or \$895 delivered in Klamath Falls. Specifications show that, better in many particulars, it is otherwise practically the same as Model 89, which last season sold for \$1,075 factory. It is lighter in weight, has more power, an improved lighting and starting system, one man top, headlight dimmer and divan upholstery.

The first carload of these 1918 models are being unloaded today by the White Pelican garage, and will soon be on the street. Will T. Lee, who had the agency for the Overlands last year, has retired from the Central garage, and will devote all his time to selling Overlands for the White Pelican garage.

Hot Words Fly at Council Meeting

municipal taxes here are the largest of any town of the size on the Coast. Why burden the people further? Let us cut down somewhat, and put the saving into streets and sidewalks.

"It is a shame for the city to spend money to elect a mayor at big enough salary to permit him time to surround himself with a ring of politicians to perpetuate his term. I want to see the charter amended at the next election to cut down this salary, and have the people put in office a real business man."

Appeal from Ruling.

"These consolidations could save the city \$3,500 a year," said Doty.

Miller then made an appeal from the ruling of the mayor on the Struble motion. Struble seconded this. The mayor stood mute on the appeal, and would make no decision either way, all efforts to pin him down being unavailing.

"Since the mayor has put himself in such a disgraceful position by not putting this motion and appeal, it's up to us to ask our president to put the appeal," said Miller. "If such power is vested in him as our mayor claims, what could any council or legislature do but sit idly by, and take the medicine dished out. The people of Klamath Falls will not stand for such a deal as this, or, at least, I hope not. Let us, therefore, go on record, so that any arrests these present police may make jeopardize their own liberty and funds. Let's put him on record so he has to say something." Miller then dictated the following statement for the minute book.

"It now appearing that the mayor has incapacitated himself through his standing mute and not putting the motion presented to him by the council in proper form, and that when he decided the motion out of order and an appeal was taken from his decision, he would not entertain said appeal to be voted upon by the council and I make a motion that the president of the council put the motion."

Nicholas himself made a statement for the minute book, which was not audible at the press table.

"I am here, and my office is not vacant," said Nicholas.

Miller then from the floor put his appeal in the form of a question as to whether the mayor should be sustained in refusing to entertain Miller's appeal. The unanimous vote was "no."

No City Attorney.

In the squabble, someone suggested sending for the city attorney, and someone stated Carnahan was not yet qualified. Another held that in such a case Rutenic was still city attorney, whereupon Rutenic said he would resign. Laughter and applause followed. Rutenic offered to give his unofficial opinion on this fine piece of parliamentary procedure.

Miller got up to move for the putting of the motion by the president.

"Since the mayor, by his action has put himself in a dishonest light—," he started.

"That dishonest light was not during my term in the clerk's office," interrupted Nicholas. "But I can show you some things at the court house."

"You never told the grand jury that," replied Miller. Further parley on this line was stopped by Matthews moving to a point of order.

The following statement was made by Nicholas for record:

"I am present, am not incapacitated from acting, my office is not vacant and I am not absent from the city. I object to the president of the council taking my duties as mayor with reference to the police force."

More parley ensued, and finally Matthews put Struble's motion for the dismissal of the police force. This
