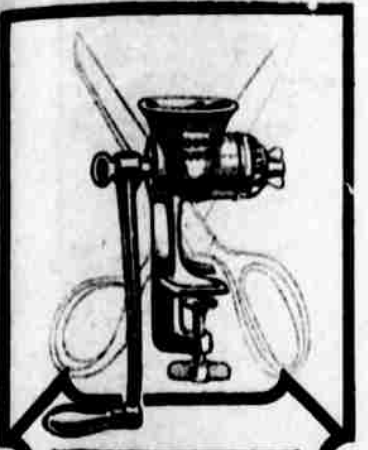

DARDANELLES AS IMPREGNABLE AS PASS AT GIBRALTAR, SAYS TURKEY'S WAR LORD

ENVER PASHA, THE MAN OF THE
HOUR IN THE MOSLEM EMPIRE,
SAYS THE FLEETS AND TROOPS
WILL BE UNABLE TO FORCE
PASSAGE—HE ALSO SEES TUR-
KEY EMERGE FROM THE WAR
MORE FIRMLY ESTABLISHED
THAN EVER BEFORE

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 5.—(Via
Berlin, The Hague and London)—
"The Dardanelles today are impreg-
nable as Gibraltar—more impassable
than at any previous time. Sedd-ul-
Bahr, which was captured by the
allied fleet, consisted merely of out-
date fortresses which answered in no
way to the exigencies of modern war-
fare, and were merely nominal ob-
stacles to the forcing of the straits.

"In the meantime, their places have
been taken by a complete system of
most modern defenses. We had am-
ple time to install these; they have
been constructed along the most ad-
vanced lines for resisting every pos-
sible phase, both of land and of sea
attacks, and of every possible arm of
modern warfare.

"The straits today are defended as
never before. If they can be forced—
which I doubt—it will only be at the
cost of a sacrifice that would only be
justified if their passage constitutes
the one supreme end of the entire
war. Meantime, by the help of God
Almighty, we shall let no one pass
them."

The man who addressed me was
Enver Pasha, Turkish minister of
war, vice generalissimo of the Otto-
man army and navy—33 years of
age. The youngest man who has ever
attained that position. He spoke
with an energy and decision that gave
indication of some of the qualities
which elevated him to his exalted po-
sition.

Enver Pasha today received me at
general headquarters at Stamboul,
where, constantly surrounded by an
immense staff of officers, he works
day and night.

"From the side of the Bosphorus
we are equally defended," the minis-
ter of war declared. "Entirely aside
from the new system of defenses in-
stalled there, since the present at-
tack began, we have at our disposal
an even greater and surer means of
defense in our submarine fleet, whose
efficiency has already been demon-
strated in the sinking of a Russian
flagship.

"A better defense from Black Sea
attacks could not be provided than
the presence of these submarines.
They destroy all hopes by Russia of
ever effectively landing troops on the
coast north of Constantinople. The
transports would be sunk before they
could approach our coast. The sub-
marines are equally efficacious in ren-
dering impossible any naval action by
the Russian fleet against the fortifi-
cations of the Bosphorus.

"We feel our position in Constanti-
nople can be considered absolutely
unapproachable. The city will, there-
fore, continue in the future, as in the
past, the glorious capital of the Otto-
man empire."

Remembering it was the reputation
he won for himself while in charge of
the entire Turkish operations in
Tripoli against the Italian occupation,

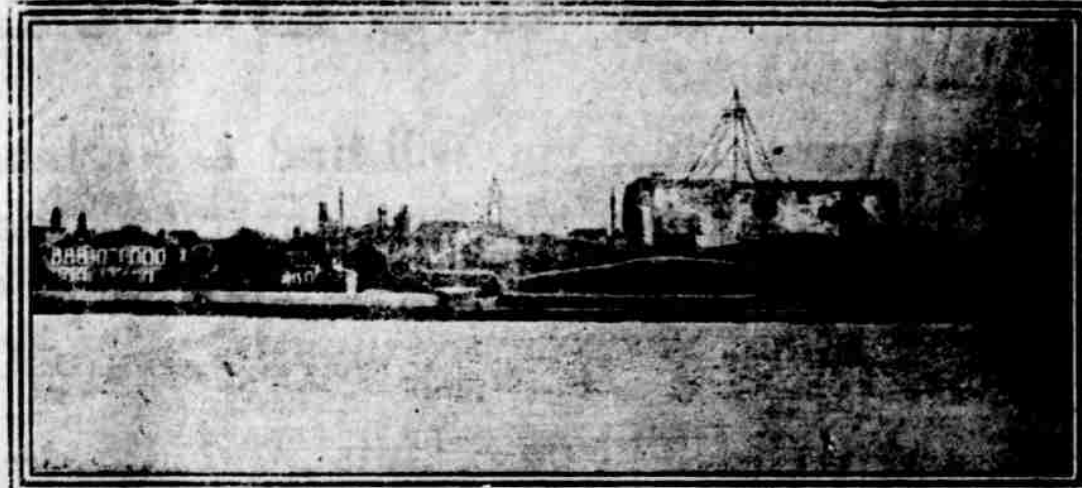

CHANAK, TURK PORT AT ENTRANCE TO DARDANELLES NARROWS

(Editor's Note—Enver Pasha is Turkey's man of destiny. It was he who drew the Ottoman Empire in the swirl of the European war. Brilliant, polished, distinguished in diplomatic service in Berlin, learned in war tactics by his campaign in Tripoli, a nephew by marriage of the sultan, and all-powerful among the Young Turks, he is the outstanding figure in the Turkey of today, notwithstanding his 33 years. For this reason and the fact that the allies have just announced the beginning of his fight against them at the Dardanelles, particular interest is attached to this interview with Enver Pasha, obtained by Henry Wood, United Press staff correspondent, who is now on duty at Constantinople.)

which led to his present position, I
asked Enver Pasha what effect Italy's
intervention would have on the out-
come of the war.

"Italy's participation cannot be
considered a serious element in the
present situation," his excellency de-
clared. "The Italian army never has
been victorious, even against much
smaller foes. There is no reason to
believe that against the vastly super-
ior military organizations of Germany
and Austria she will experience any
radical change of fortune. Of the
actual valor of the Italian army I
have had ample personal experience to
be able to judge. With only a hand-
ful of Turkish soldiers, who were en-
tirely cut off from all supplies, arms
and ammunition, we were able, with
the help of native Arabs, successfully
to oppose the Italian occupation of
Tripoli and Cyrenaica early this year.
The opposition we were able to main-
tain then was a mere bagatelle to
what Italy must face from her pres-
ent enemies."

"How might Turkey's position in
the present war be defined?" I asked.
The war minister smiled before re-
plying:

"If I may be permitted to borrow
an expression from our enemies, our
position may be defined as being the
same as theirs. The allies insist that
the present war is for the purpose of
re-establishing the countries of Euro-
pe on the basis of nationality of the
peoples, with complete free and inde-
pendent existence for each.

"That is what we are fighting for,
too. When Turkey last September
abolished the capitulations which had
been imposed on her for years in the
past—principally by the very powers
who say they are now fighting to es-
tablish independent government for
each people—we for the first time in
years, were in complete control of the
administration of our own affairs and
our own government.

"It is as much for that independ-
ence as for continued existence that
we are now fighting, and shall con-
tinue to fight to the end.
"We want the Turkish empire for
the Turks, and by the Turks—with-

out foreign interference. That is our
idea of independence."

"Our soldier today," he said, "has
lived up to all the glorious traditions
of the past. He has shown that there
is absolutely no deterioration, moral
or physical, in either our soldier or
our people. Our soldier is willingly
making sacrifice of both his wealth
and life for maintenance of integrity
of his empire. It is this demon-
stration of our inherent equalities as a
race that entitles us, amongst other
races of the world, to an independent
existence—without foreign interfer-
ence.

"Our soldier today is fighting like
a lion, just as he has always fought.

"We feel certain the position of
