

PORTLAND LETTER

(Herald Special Service)
PORTLAND, June 14.—The receipts at the stock yards for the past week were as follows:
Cattle, 584 head; calves, 227 head; pigs, 4,308 head; sheep, 2,685 head.
The cattle market showed steady with light receipts. The quality of steer offerings was good to choice, with sheep stuff selling well. Grass steers brought \$7.50, with the demand fair.
Last Monday saw the largest run of hogs for some time, 3,000 head being registered for the day. The price for top hogs advanced from \$7.85 to \$8.10, with the bulk of sales at \$8.
Sheep receipts were light for this time of the year, and prices were lower on all lines except spring lambs which still bring \$8 for top quality.

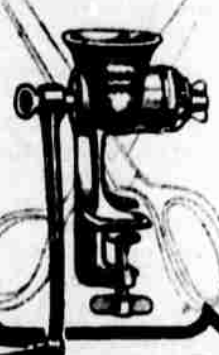

R. A. M. C. Does Great Work in the Trenches

Simple Apparatus Protects the Soldiers From Gases. "Swat the Fly" is a Common Slogan Amongst Men in the Trenches

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HEADQUARTERS OF THE BRITISH ARMY, Northern France, April 29.—(By mail to New York.)—How shall we distribute them to the soldiers, sir? asked an officer who came up during my conversation with the director of medical services.

"It doesn't make so much difference what channel we turn them into, just so the soldiers get them," answered the director.

"We've just found a simple apparatus for our soldiers to wear that will save them from the German gases," said he. "The point is to get them distributed as quickly as possible."

The health of General French's great army in France and Flanders is in the hands of the head of the Royal Army Medical Corps, and it is as much in the duty of the R. A. M. C. to save the soldiers from "German pneumonia" as the gas poison is now being called by the British soldiers, as it is to save them from typhoid fever. Within only a few hours of the time that the first word came that the Germans were using gas, the R. A. M. C. had taken up the task of meeting the new situation. Its doctors were out on the firing line, studying the symptoms of the poisoning; its motor laboratories were experimenting with gases and antidotes.

The R. A. M. C.'s duty is not only to keep the soldiers healthy, but to take care of them when they are sick or wounded. This entails a mass of details, on which such men as the director of medical services have spent a life time of study.

To keep the army healthy was naturally the first step of the R. A. M. C. in this war before there were any wounded men to look after. Every town in the British zone in France was made scientifically sanitary. Under the R. A. M. C., in many towns, street cleaning forces made thorough-

This photograph is the first to arrive in the United States showing a victim of the chlorine gas turned on the French and British trenches April 22 by the Germans near Ypres. This soldier was behind his embankment at Hill No. 60, when he was overcome by the gas. Not knowing the danger he did not run in time. He died in his tracks, and his body was left there after the Germans were driven out.
