NEW YORK, June 16.—The American League is due to get sweet revenge this fall for that walloping handed it last year, when the Braves smothered the Athletics. It is a much mooted question just at present what team in the American League will have the honor of handing out the beating to the representative of the National League in the world's series, but it is pretty generally conceded that nothing short of an earthquake will keep the American League pennant winners from copping the world series.

There hasn't been enough class shown in the National League this year to win a pennant in the sagebrush regions. If any one team had been just partly supplied with that class thing it would be out ahead so far by now that the other seven couldn't hit it with a 42-centimeter. The fact that the tail enders are still within easy shooting distance of the top shows that the National League clubs are all alike this season—all pretty weak.

The "enemy ball" having been given the gate by the league bosses, the "licorice ball" has now come into prominence. Just when this form of cheating was invented is not known, but "Smoky Joe" Wood, Boston's speed marvel, is the first to be accused of using it this year. Wild Bill Donovan hurled the charge at Boston's first citizen in a recent engagement between his Yanks and the Red Sox. He hurled the charge loud and often, but it did him no good—the umpires ignored him and Wood only smiled.

Wood was facing the Yankees in what finally developed into a thirteen inning battle. The day was dark, and as it got late it grew darker. To the grandstand and press box spectators it looked very much like Wood was doing as Donovan said—spitting licorice juice on the ball to discolor it. The pellet that the Smoky one hurled across the plate or thereabouts looked very dark—when you were able to see it at all. The Yankees didn't have much to say individually. Few of them saw the ball, except when they were in the field.

SPRING LAKE NEEDS ROUTE

LACK OF SERVICE SOURCE OF GREAT INCONVENIENCE AND WASTE OF TIME, SAYS REPRESENTATIVE OF DISTRICT

"The people of Spring Lake district are sadly disappointed that their petition for R. F. D. has been turned down, as we honestly think, without reason," says A. Cheyne of that place.

"So much so that some who formerly got mail thereby ceased taking it and prefer going some ten miles to the Klamath Falls postoffice," said Cheyne. "Frequently a patron of the Star route whose home is two or more miles off who has his mail to send off will find the carrier gone on arrival at Mt. Laki or he may have to wait thirty minutes or more till the stage comes along."

"Farmers in the Spring Lake district are at present largely resting from their labors and their spring work promises ample reward in the shape of bumper crops, notwithstanding the somewhat backward nature of the weather. Grain crops look splendid as far as the eye can look and the extensive potato crops begin to be in evidence above ground."

"The rabbit pest, owing to clearing of so much sage brush, is at a minimum, but squirrels are legionary and threaten extensive destruction of growing crops. Some of our boys engage doing in spare time a good work by the use of their shot-guns and while school is out of session. Rear Admiral William F. Fullam, superintendent of the Naval Academy at Annapolis, has brought serious charges against cadets of the academy in connection with the "cribbing" of examination papers there recently. The scandal has grown to such proportions that a military court, of which Captain Robert L. Russell is the president, is making an investigation.

Among the charges of the superintendent was one that an attempt to break into desks of professors had been made. Some one got copies of examination papers for all four classes, which have just taken their

examinations, and passed them around. At this time members of the graduating class who passed are already in the American navy as ensigns. Three students have been dismissed in connection with the charges and seven more were placed under arrest.

Rear Admiral Fullam was graduated from the academy in 1877 at the head of the class and has had twenty years of sea duty, besides serving for some time as an instructor at Annapolis. During the Spanish-American war he was watch officer on board the U. S. S. New Orleans on the occasion of the blockade and bombardment of Santiago.
