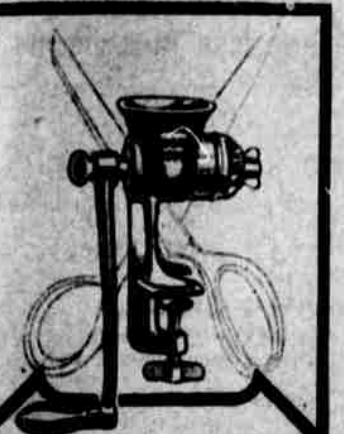

SOLDIER OUTWITS GERMAN CENSOR

INFORMS MOTHER OF DIRE NEED
THROUGH INGENIOUS METHOD.
BULLETS PERFORM QUEER AN-
TIC—ONE MAN HAS IT

LONDON, June 17.—An ingenious
method of informing his mother that
he was in dire need of more food was
employed by a British prisoner in
Germany, who fortunately had re-
membered Barrie's skill, "Little
Mary" (a man's stomach). When he
wrote the following post card it was
promptly passed by the unsuspicious
German censor:

"My darling Little Mary—I have
recently heard from my mother, and
I gather from her card she is rather
anxious about you. Poor darling,
you are undoubtedly going through
hard times now, but am glad my
mother and others have at last begun
to realize your need of outside help.

"Your allowance is quite insuffi-
cient for your needs; of all the sloppy
things the state has done for depend-
ants, your allowance is the sloppiest
—just enough to exist on.

"Am quite well."

Some queer stunts performed by
bullets are described in the current
number of Gazette Medicale de Paris.
One wounded man in the Cambria
hospital has eleven bullets in his
body. He is not only progressing sat-
isfactorily, but has never even been
placed on the dangerous list by the
doctors.

Another was hit by a bullet that
pierced his jaws, destroying all his
teeth, but his tongue was not even
touched, and the net result of his
wound was a swollen face.

Still another had his body trans-
versed by a bullet that passed just
a little below the heart without touch-
ing any vital organ. He walked
three miles to the nearest field hos-
pital; there an anesthetic bandage
was applied to his wound, and the
next day he returned to the battle-
field.

SWINE ON DAIRY FARMS

(Herald Special Service)

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-
LEGE, Corvallis, June 17.—"Swine
are particularly adapted to dairy
farms, where the skim milk can be
made to fill in the gap between the
weaning and fattening period," says
G. R. Samson, swine specialist at the
Oregon Agricultural College.

"With the exception of high-grade
dairy helper calves, pigs will pay a
better price for skim milk than any
other class of stock, and pigs do not
come very largely into competition
with dairy cows for the products of
the farm. Pigs can use but very little
of the rougher forage on the farm,
which form the basis of the ration of
the dairy cow, and the fattening pig
is a large consumer of concentrates.

In fact, under most intelligent sys-
tems of farming, pigs and dairy cows
on the same farm will pay better than
that will either the one or the other
of these kinds of stock raised exclu-
sively on the same farm. The excep-
tion to this rule is found in localities
where milk condensaries have been
developed so that there are a few by-
products of the dairy business which
can be utilized in pig feeding."

Dante's "Inferno" Is Outdone, Says Soldier

LONDON, May 26.—(By mail to
New York)—That old expression
"The Din of Battle" is dead.

"It's a blatter and a crash, a spit
and a screech, and 'Hell Let Loose'
does not half describe the noise of
combined rifle, machine gun shell
fire and bombs in this day and age,"
said a soldier back from the
battlefield of Northern France today.

"If anyone could properly describe
a modern battle Dante's picture of In-
ferno would represent peace in con-
trast," he added, explaining the
sounds that the modern soldier's ear
has come recognize.

"German fire sounds different from
the British and there are a thousand
different individual sounds to break
the stillness. Distant individual fire
represents the pattering of clay with a
spade; distant rapid fire reminds me
of the purring of a powerful motor
car. The German bullet cracks and
the British sounds like the bursting
of a soft paper bag. Sometimes a
German bullet ricocheting in the
sand 'bizzos'; sometimes it's light-
ning flight sounds like a man half
whistling, half hissing through his
teeth. Glimpsing off metal 'pings'

then 'screeches' until it stops. Pass-
ing close by a bullet gives a crack and
it may deafen the nearest ear for
days. Like their terrific rifle shots
the German machine gun sound less
muffled than the British. They
sound like the infinitely swift rapping
of a door knocker. Ours might be
likened to a carpet being beaten by
very dexterous and energetic spring
cleansers armed with canes.

"Night sounds in the trenches are
many and varied. A sentry's strain-
ed ears may catch the sound of shov-
eling with spades and the tap of a
mallet on wooden stakes. This
comes when the enemy's trench is
near and denotes that he is driving
a sap, digging an advanced trench, or
constructing wire entanglements.
Sometimes comes the whirr of a dy-
namo. It is a sure sign that the en-
emy is working an electrical trench
digger. If the trenches are close one
may hear the movements of the en-
emy reliefs or reinforcements behind
their lines. It is generally possible
to hear sounds of guns or transport
being moved. On a quiet night this
sound is audible for miles. It's the
same with the human voice. The
sentry is sometimes greeted with
good English from German trenches
or with a song. The strange sacred
cries of flying lapwings, the howling
of homeless cats and the whining of
dogs are but few of the weird sounds
that greet the lonely sentry at night.
The noise has often been rudely
scared by the morning song of a
soldier—pat at peace with the whole
world, the Germans included.
