THE RIGHT MAN

J. KELLER as mayor would be the right man in the right place. As a business man Mr. Keller has made a success. As a heavy property owner and tax payer, he is interested in the success and prosperity of Klamath Falls.

By applying the same natural business ability to the management of city affairs that has brought success to his private business, Klamath Falls could be assured of growing and prospering the coming year as never before.

The business of a corporation representing millions of dollars, like the city of Klamath Falls, needs a head. The idea that public business can run itself is a mistaken one. No matter how capable the members of the council may be, they need a competent head to carry out the plans which their combined judgment should deem best for the city.

Councilmen are simply servants of the people, and are elected to carry out the wishes of the citizens. The people have provided by their votes in adopting the present charter for a mayor as head of the city government. It is not a question whether the members of the council think the city can get along just as well without a mayor or not. The duty of the council is plain. They should lose no time in calling a special election and permit the people to say whom they want as head of the city government.

ANOTHER RAILROAD

IN THE Commercial Club in Portland there is a large relief map of the state. On it you can see, in miniature, Oregon's topography reproduced. And for a Bend man it is worth studying.

Southwestern Oregon is one range of hills and valleys. Mountains zigzag here and there, north and south, east and west. Across the southern boundary lies the great wall of the Siskiyou mountains. From the standpoint of railroad builders and railroad operators, that portion of the map is depressing.

Then look at the map just east of the Cascade mountains. From Bend southward instead of many hills, there extends a smooth, unbroken plateau to California. All the way to Klamath Falls is an easy way, and to Klamath Falls comes a railroad of easy grades from California. From the standpoint of railroad building and railroad operation this section of the map is in delightful contrast to the southwestern area of steep hills and deep valleys.

This spring the papers have contained many items about delayed trains on the Southern Pacific route from California. During the winter it is fair to say that trains are normally late on the Siskiyou route. The cost of upkeep is enormous; wash-outs, snow slides and other disasters inherent to steep grades and high altitudes constantly occur. Two and three engines are required for every train; in other words, the operating cost is extremely high.

In a nutshell, then, the present railroad route from Oregon to California over the Siskiyou is unsatisfactory. Of necessity the service cannot be the best. The operating cost is heavy. Repairs are constant. And the topography is alone to blame.

Some day—and soon—there will be another line connecting Portland with San Francisco. Naturally it will follow easy grades. Look at the map again. Where are those easy grades? Where is the ready gateway to the southward? Any amateur can see the beckoning pathway extending south from Bend.

Up the Deschutes is a water grade, and splendid railroads already built. From Bend to Klamath is a route without serious obstacle. From Klamath to San Francisco is the excellent

portion of the Southern Pacific Santa system.

The new road from Bend to San Francisco will compete on vastly favorable terms with the present route over the Siskiyou. There is, indeed, no comparison between the two, so far superior is the Central Oregon way. And now that the Oregon-Washington system is legally and economically divorced from the Southern Pacific, the time is coming when the new road will be built. It is inevitable.

And then a great through railroad will have Bend for its midway division point, and most of the north and south through travel of the Pacific Coast will pass through this point. Let us do all we can to hasten this. The Lord has been good to Bend in locating us as we are. With intelligent perseverance there are few things which we cannot achieve.—E. B. Bulletin.

ROAD SPECIALIST FOR THIS STATE

O. A. C. HAS MAN WHO WILL ADVISE ON THE BEST METHODS FOR BUILDING ROADS AND KEEPING THEM IN REPAIR

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 17.—Road supervisors and other officers interested in building and maintaining public highways of Oregon, may now secure the services of a specialist in road construction and maintenance in solving their problems of best types of roads for their district and the best methods of construction.

The Agricultural College Extension department has arranged to have Professor G. V. Skelton, highway engineer, consult with those who wish to secure advice and assistance in solving their problems in the best interests of their constituency.

Professor Skelton's work is strictly advisory and is limited to questions of grades, types of road for given district, best means of construction and similar matters and is without charge to the people of Oregon. Those wishing to take advantage of this service should write the extension division, R. D. Hetzel, director, so that arrangements may be made when he is scheduled for work in their part of the state. In case assistance is desired before September 1st the request should come in at the earliest possible date.
