R. R. President Says People Must Move

PORTLAND, June 18.—Two important development projects are provided for by two Oregon railroads in their plans for the remaining months of the present year—one each by the O-W R. & N. and by the Southern Pacific.

The O-W R. & N. company will build a thirty-mile extension to its line recently completed from Vale to Riverside, and the Southern Pacific will electrify the line between Whitson and Corvallis as an extension of the existing electric unit between Portland and Whitson.

J. D. Farrell, president of the O-W R. & N., together with F. A. Piel, assistant to the president; J. P. O'Brien, vice president and general manager; J. R. Holman, chief engineer, and Frank W. Robinson, assistant traffic manager, have left for Vale, whence they will proceed over the newly completed line through Juntura to Riverside. They will travel from Riverside over the route of the proposed line in automobiles.

It is understood that Mr. Farrell and his party will continue through Central Oregon and return to Portland via either Condon or Bend.

The new line now is being operated from Vale to Riverside, a distance of eighty miles. It connects with the Oregon Short Line at Ontario, but is a part of the O-W R. & N. system. It is intended eventually to extend the line across the state to a connection with the Deschutes line now terminating at Bend. This route then will offer the company a new line between Portland and the East.

Mr. and Mrs. Strahorn have returned from a two months' visit to New York and Washington, D. C., and a month each in Florida and California, where Mr. Strahorn has been assisting in the transfer to the Southern Pacific company of the Portland, Eugene and Eastern and the other Southern Pacific subsidiary lines in Oregon. Besides the Portland, Eugene and Eastern this, about July 1st, will wipe out of existence the Pacific Railway & Navigation company, Corvallis & Eastern Railroad company, Salem, Falls City & Western Railway company, and the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railroad and Navigation company. The positions of all such executive officers as Mr. Strahorn will be abolished.

"With the Portland, Eugene & Eastern," said Mr. Strahorn, "there is a slight difference in one important respect. It was from the start designed for a comprehensive independent electric railway system to serve thoroughly all the Willamette Valley cities, together with some of the connecting valleys, and to be operated independently like the great Pacific electric system of Southern California. As is generally known, we have only about 150 miles electrically operated although our material is largely purchased, paid for and here on the ground ready for the completion of about 350 miles of electric lines.

"While I am in no hurry, I am, of course, too restless to stay out of the railroad game long. I naturally will take up some railroad project after I have had the necessary time to look the field over carefully. We all know that there is need for pioneering lines in several directions, but that existing companies, under present conditions, cannot be expected to supply them. All the lines with which I am familiar have their hands full taking care of their problems of the many regular maintenance and construction items and operation under steadily increasing costs and diminished earnings. It looks as though the pioneering and development of new fields by railroads for a long time to come must begin with the communities themselves, and be promoted and pushed up to a certain stage by independent local organizations, much as it was done thirty years ago all over the country."

The beginning of work on these two railroads in the state marks the opening of railroad activities again, which have been practically closed down for the past three years. The line from Vale is of great importance to Klamath Falls and vicinity, as it is part of the general scheme of railroad building in the state, and the sooner work will have to be done to act as feeders to it.
