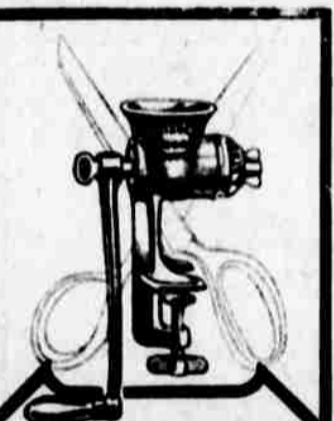

United States Handles Foreign Nations' Affairs

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—The diplomatic and consular machinery of the United States government is caring for the affairs of more countries and nationalities than any one nation has in the history of the world.

An appropriation of \$2,000,000 in the last congress provides for extra clerical help and interpreters. Caring for the diplomatic and consular interests of a friendly nation is a courtesy the expense of which is borne by the neutral country.

The extraordinary demands of this work not only have necessitated increases in the staffs abroad, but have resulted in the employment of a large special force at the state department. As a rule important communications pass through Washington, but in many cases much of the routine business is accomplished by direct telegraph and cable between the governments concerned and the American embassies and legations.

Countries U. S. Represents
The United States now represents Austria, Germany, Turkey, Belgium, Serbia, Great Britain, France, Italy, Russia and Japan, all belligerents in various quarters of the globe.

Some neutral nations also have asked the United States to look out for their interests. Switzerland, which has no representation in China, has also asked the state department to instruct the American legation to care for Swiss affairs there.

Since the outbreak of the war the American government also has by request taken charge of the diplomatic or consular interests of Switzerland, Denmark, Greece, Panama, Brazil, Nicaragua and Guatemala in some

countries and cities where they had no representatives. Some of the belligerents are represented in various places by Spain and Switzerland.

Up-to-date the United States through its embassies, legations or consulates represents the interests of foreign governments as follows:

Diplomats:
In Serbia—German and Austrian; in Austria—French, British, Japanese and Italian; in Germany—French, British, Japanese, Serbian and Italian; in France—Austrian, German, Turkish, Guatemalan and Nicaraguan; in Belgium—Austrian, German, British, Serbian, Japanese, Danish and Turkish; in Great Britain—Austrian, German and Turkish; in Japan—Austrian and German; in Egypt—German, Brazilian and Swiss; in Turkey—French, Serbian, British, Belgian, Swiss and Russian.

Consular:
In Austria—Canadian, Russian, Serbian, Japanese, British and Italian; in Germany—French, British, Canadian, Panamanian and Italian; in France and possessions—Turkish, Austrian and German; in Belgium—Turkish, British and Japanese; in Russia—Austrian, Serbian and German; in Japan—Austrian and German at Yokohama, and German and Swiss at Kobe and Nagasaki; in China—German at Harbin and Dalian, Manchuria and Kwantung provinces; in Turkey—British at Smyrna, Beirut, Alexandretta, Aleppo, Damascus, and British and Greek in Tripoli; in Portugal—German and Austrian at Lourenco Marques; in Persia—German at Tabriz; in United Kingdom and possessions—Turkish, German, Austrian; Swiss at Bombay, Singapore and Johannesburg.

89 GRADUATE FROM UNIVERSITY

COMMENCEMENT WEEK IS OVER.

FIVE MASTER DEGREES WERE GIVEN—BISHOP SUMNER GAVE BACCALAUREATE SERMON

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 21.—After a program lasting through four days, 89 students received degrees from the University of Oregon this week. Of this number seven obtain degrees in electrical engineering. These seven comprise the last of the engineering students, the department having been abolished by the board of higher curricula.

Five master's degrees were awarded. They go to Clyde B. Aitchinson of Salem, H. E. Barnhardt of Falls City, George A. Bhiscoe of Ashland, Karl Outhank of Tillamook and Jas. L. Whitman of Pendleton.

The commencement program began with a baccalaureate sermon on Sunday by Rev. Charles Sumner, Bishop of Oregon.

The near-graduates were taken into the state alumni association at its annual meeting today. A box luncheon was served under the campus trees. The afternoon was given over to the president's reception and in the evening the annual fern and flower procession was staged, the young women of each graduating class forming in line and filing over the campus lawn carrying their class flowers.
