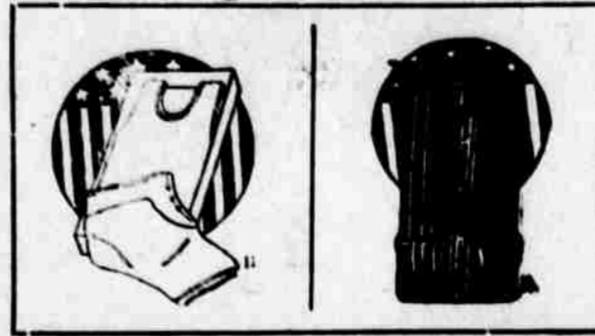

## 'MEDIATION,' SAYS BRYAN IS REMEDY

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—Former Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan, in the third and concluding article in his statement on "The Causeless War," issued today, suggests mediation "as the way out." As a preventive of war Bryan proposes universal use of his investigation committee peace treaty plan.

"Mediation," the former secretary says, "is the means provided by international agreement through which the belligerent nations can be brought into conference; time for the investigation of all disputes is the means by which the future wars can be averted. The cultivation of international friendship is the means by which the desire for war can be rooted out."

In elaborating his plan for restoration of peace Bryan urges:

"The neutral nations in advocating, crystallize sentiment in favor of peace into a coercive force, and offer mediation jointly or severally; that the warring nations join in a treaty to provide for the investigation by a permanent international committee of every dispute that may arise, no matter what its character in nature; and that a world-wide educational movement to cultivate a spirit of brotherhood among the nations be undertaken as the final task of the advocates of peace."

"Great nations cannot be exterminated," says Bryan. "Predictions made at the beginning of the war have not been fulfilled. The British did not destroy the German fleet in a month; Germany did not take Paris in two months, and the Russian army did not eat Christmas dinner in Berlin. But even if extermination were possible it would be a crime against civilization which no nation or group of nations could afford to commit."

"When can peace be restored? Any time now, if the participants are really weary of this war, and ready for it to end. If any nation is not ready, let its ruler state in clear and definite terms the conditions upon which it is willing to agree to peace; then if an agreement is not reached, blame for continuance of the war will be on those who make unreasonable demands."

In proposing mediation, the former secretary points out that The Hague conference expressly declares an offer of mediation shall not be considered an unfriendly act, and adds:

"The duty of offering mediation may seem to rest primarily upon the United States, the largest of the neutral nations, and the one most intimately bound by ties of blood to all the belligerents. The United States did make an offer immediately after the war began, and why not do so again, until our offer or some other offer is not accepted? But our action or failure to act did not deter any other neutral nation from acting. This is not a time to stand on ceremony. If any other country, for any reason, no matter what the reason may be, is in a better position than we are to tender its good offices, it should not delay a moment."

### PORTLAND LETTER

PORTLAND, June 21.—The receipts for the past week were: Cattle, 1,564 head; calves, 36 head; hogs, 4,916 head; sheep, 4,142 head. Prices on cattle were a shade lower than the week previous. Nearly all consignments are grass cattle, with the quality not above the average. Bulk of steers sold around \$7.00 to \$7.25; cows sold as high as \$6.75.

Hogs were steady throughout the week at \$8.00. Not many loads of well finished stags came forward, and considering the quality, prices held up well.

A fair run of sheep was received during the week, with prices lower and the market inactive. Small consignments only of spring lambs were received. Choice lambs sold at \$7.50; ewes sold at \$5.00 and wethers at \$5.50.

### To the Public:

Will further state that if lake ice taken from the east side of Upper Klamath Lake, where there is more or less decayed fish and vegetable matter in evidence, not mentioning the subject of seepage from Shippington, which has no sewer system, it is about time that the city of Klamath Falls looks into the purity of their water supply, as we manufacture our artificial ice from city water after it has been thoroughly filtered through charcoal filters established by one of the best artificial ice machinery manufacturing companies on the coast.
