HOW WILL YOU RECEIVE THEM?

A COMMITTEE from the Chamber of Commerce will call on you some day this week, and if not this week, next week. They are sent out for the purpose of stimulating interest in a new body, which is to be known as a Commercial Club. This is not a new body, but will be a combination and organization into one unit, so far as is possible and practical, of all the civic bodies in the city.

This does not mean that this one body and its officers are going to control all the interests. It means that it is to be the parent body, as it were. A single headquarters is to be established for all the bodies. The new quarters that will be provided will have ample room for a number of things, and will be provided with rooms where the separate organizations can hold their meetings and transact their business as they see fit.

Then, when it is desired to start a movement or organize the people on some question, it will be a simple matter for the officers or special committees from these various organizations to get together and work together. It simply means organization, instead of disorganization.

One of the best examples of such a system is to be found at Eugene, Oregon. The Commercial Club there started a membership campaign this spring, and took in over 150 members, beating Portland out on percentage in a recent campaign which was held there. In the club at Eugene are to be found a parlor for the women, and there they hold many of their meetings. They secure lecturers on women's problems, take them there and listen to them. The various parents, teachers associations and women's civic clubs, including the Commercial Club's auxiliary, have their main headquarters there, and when they have a plan that interests the city in general, a joint meeting of the club and other civic organizations is called, and they work together. A meeting place is provided for the merchants association's meetings, and they work in a similar manner. And so it is, on through the civic organizations of the city.

Eugene is noted throughout the state for its up-to-dateness, its substantial backing, cleanliness and general status as a city. The women of Eugene are exerting a powerful influence, and as a result Eugene stands well and above most of the towns in the state.

NEW "ARIZONA" SLIPS INTO WATER

NEW YORK, June 22.—The newest of the sea fighters of the United States, the super-dreadnought Arizona, slipped into the water from the ways of the New York navy yard Saturday. Built at an expense of over \$7,000,000, the battleship will have cost the government \$16,000,000 by the time she is fitted with her guns and armor plate.

Miss Esther Ross, "the prettiest girl in Arizona," selected as sponsor for the vessel by Governor Hunt of Arizona, smashed a bottle of water over the bow. The water was not ordinary hydrant water, but some of the first water that poured over the Roosevelt dam.

The Arizona is the thirty-ninth battleship built for the American navy since 1893. The first fighting boat was the Indiana. Compared with the Arizona the Indiana would appear as a rowboat beside a steam yacht.

The Arizona will be nearly twice as long as the Indiana, half again as wide, and of three times as great displacement. There is also a noted difference in the armament of the two warships. While the Indiana had four 13-inch and eight 8-inch guns, the Arizona is to have twelve 14-inch and twenty-two 5-inch guns. The guns are also greater in caliber, those of the Indiana being thirty-five as compared with forty-five which will be mounted on the Arizona.

The Arizona is the fourth battleship to be built by the government in its own navy yard at New York. It will be the largest of the four.

Following the launching of the Arizona the keel will be laid for the electrically driven super-dreadnought California. The California will be an entirely new experiment in naval construction.

Brother of General Villa and "Keno King" Under Arrest

Hipolito Villa, brother of the general, who has been the terror of Mexico for nearly two years, and Carlos Jauregui, "Keno King of Jaures," were arrested in El Paso for the common crime of kidnapping.

The brother of the Mexican general has been in the neighborhood of Jaures and El Paso for some time. When the Johnson-Willard fight was scheduled for Jaures he was one of the prominent figures in it. He guaranteed Mexican protection in the name of his brother, who controlled that part of the country.

Jauregui is only a boy, but once on a time he saved the life of General Villa. To Villa's credit, he did not forget the act. He gave Jauregui the

keno concession in Jaures. That is, Jauregui was the only person to be permitted to run a keno game in the city. The result is that Jauregui, because a careful and businesslike young man, has made a fortune.

The two were taken on the charge of conspiring, in connection with the kidnapping of J. Guaderrama, an American citizen from El Paso to Jaures. The kidnapping of Guaderrama, a merchant in El Paso, was one of many similar occurrences, American authorities state. It is claimed that Mexican officials with a grudge against American citizens or Mexicans in American territory, have not hesitated to seize their victims in El Paso, and rush them to Jaures for execution.

Lincoln Highway Route Finished; Plans Surprise

After nearly two years of activity in eleven states, the Lincoln highway shows amazing development. At no point in the 3,384 miles of its length is there a political situation that threatens to interfere with its local improvement or the normal progress of the entire program.

The last announcement of a proposed coast-to-coast highway brought forth an inundation of letters, telegrams, resolutions, petitions, maps, sketches, reports from supposedly disinterested sources, and finally delegations, traveling long distances, and presenting a solid and determined front. From the beginning, the directors of the Lincoln Highway Association felt a keen sense of responsibility in the selection of a route.

Having decided upon the two terminals of this great road, New York city on the Atlantic seaboard and San Francisco on the Pacific coast, it remained for them to connect these two points in the most direct manner possible, with due regard to the topography of the country, population to be served, and the ease and facility with which existing highways could be interconnected.

The sum total of these various factors, it was thought, would present a road which could be constructed at the least possible cost, whether its construction were undertaken by the government, the state, the counties, or by the citizens of the nation. The various points between New York and San Francisco which seemed to warrant consideration were carefully plotted on large maps, the mileage computed and information secured as to the character of connecting roads.

A study of the first map so prepared made it immediately apparent that a large number of the suggestions so far as they related to the main route,

must be disregarded. After some three or four months of careful research, more exact and detailed information was compiled, based on trips by experts over territory which might be considered debatable or worthy of more serious, careful and comparative consideration, and upon information gathered by transcontinental road scouts during ten years past.

The men who finally announced the route of the Lincoln highway found that, in their desire to present for consideration a route that must appeal because it embodied all the factors necessary to success, they had chosen a route which did not pass through a single one of their "home cities." This result was striking, and made a deep impression upon the minds of the people of the country. In addition, the plan of the highway as announced did not pass through a city that was considered an automobile production center, although the automobile industry had been most active in the movement.

The pre-vision of the directors of the Lincoln highway in the selection of the route of this great 3,400 mile road, without a ferry from Hudson River to San Francisco Bay, is now apparent. Arguments, debates, surveys, maps, etc., prepared by local communities, served their purpose and loaned important aid. The route of the Lincoln highway was selected and announced by proclamation, accompanied by a ringing patriotic appeal to the citizens of the country at large.

Never for a single moment have the directors of the Lincoln highway swerved from their fixed purpose of putting through the most direct route in the shortest possible time. They have been broad enough to see the thing in its true perspective, and

strong enough to resist every local influence which was out of step with the national movement in every case where local pride beckoned to the by-paths, the decision has been in favor of the straightest road. The success of the undertaking attests the wisdom of its founders, and gives to their square-toed policy the strongest possible endorsement.
