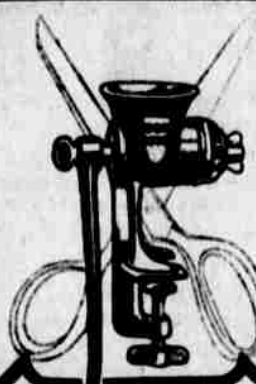

Five Months of Active Work by Local Chamber

Following is a list of some of the
Klamath Chamber of Commerce ac-
tivities for the past five months, as
prepared by Fred Fleet, secretary, and
read at the meeting Friday night:

"Data for descriptive booklets has
been gathered, the booklet written,
50,000 copies ordered, a large
number of which have been issued
and distributed. All inquiries to this
office have been answered with litera-
ture of some sort and with personal
letter.

"Realizing the vast need of dairy
stock by the farmers of this section,
and their inability to pay for grown
animals of this description, the
Chamber undertook the proposition
of shipping in young calves by ex-
press from outside points, at prices
well within reach of the farmers.
This matter after having been put
on a practical basis was turned over
to the Wells Fargo Express company
here who are glad to look after it
from a monetary standpoint. The
plan has been taken advantage of
during all the spring months and a
large number of these mortgage
raisers have been secured in this way.

"One of the important matters that
has occupied the attention of the
Chamber of Commerce during the
past few months has been the Klamath
exhibit at the world's fair in
San Francisco. Though we have had
very little money to spend as com-
pared to most of the counties repre-
sented, we feel that we have a very
creditable display and one that will
attract the visitors as much as some
of the more pretentious and expen-
sive exhibits. After getting the best
display possible with the funds avail-
able the Chamber succeeded after
some effort in raising funds necessary
to maintain a good live representa-
tive at the fair during the months
that a man is most needed. One hun-
dred dollars per month for six months
has been subscribed by the county
court and fifty dollars per month by
private parties. This money will be
collected each month by the Chamber
and forwarded to San Francisco.

"Recently a freight rate reduction
of about one hundred per cent in
box shooks from Klamath Falls to San
Francisco was allowed by the South-
ern Pacific which went into effect the
25th of May. The allowance of this
rate practically made a continuation
of the box industry possible here as
the lumber men declared they could
no longer compete with outside points
under the old tariff. So far as we
are able to learn, every one between
Klamath Falls and San Francisco
has been helped by the reduction.
They have been working for this con-
cession for many years and that the
Chamber 'batted-in' so to speak on
a proposition that was already com-
pleted. Our only excuse for so do-
ing is the fact that we were waited
on by representatives of the box

shook industry here, who declared
that they had exhausted their re-
sources in the matter and solicited
our assistance immediately. While
we are most happy to pass the credit
of this reduction to those who so
richly deserve it, we are constrained
to remark upon ourselves the coin-
cidence of the fact that it followed
immediately a most unearthy howl
raised by this organization and that
a 'great light' was directly shed upon
us from the Southern Pacific head-
quarters in San Francisco.

"Thursday, May 20 was celebrated
Good Roads Day in Klamath county.
This move was initiated by the Cham-
ber of Commerce following a procla-
mation of Governor Wythecombe that
the day be set aside for this purpose.
Good Roads Day proved
the biggest and best supported co-
operative movement in the history of
Klamath county. The town was closed
and its business men worked the
entire day with the outside ranchers
improving the county roads to the
extent of several hundred dollars.
So much enthusiasm was aroused over
this day's success that it has been
suggested by many that another day
be set aside for this purpose some-
time this fall.

"The Klamath Chamber of Com-
merce in connection with the Good
Roads Association of Lookout, Cal-
ifornia, has undertaken the proposi-
tion of a new road between Klamath
Falls and Lookout, which will go
through the historical Lava Bed dis-
trict, past the famous ice caves and
battle grounds of the Modoc war.
This road when completed will be a
big drawing card in bringing tourists
to Klamath Falls and Merrill. The
general route of the new road has
been already determined and a large
part of the funds necessary to build
it have been subscribed to a Chamber
of Commerce committee. Indications
are that this road will be completed
in sixty days.

"The possibility of securing an-
other new road which will greatly
facilitate travel between Klamath
Falls and the Pacific highway has
just been brought to our attention
and active steps have already been
taken to add this to our other high-
ways. This road is an old railroad
right of way between Fall Creek,
California, and Pockegama, Oregon,
and the absence of a highway be-
tween these two points has been a
barrier to a 4 per cent grade to the
Pacific highway at Thrall. We have
been notified that this right of way
will be deeded to Klamath county for
use as a general highway, provided
the road is kept in repair and a few
necessary improvements made in the
road between Klamath Falls and Pockegama. The county court have
agreed to view the road as to its
feasibility at their earliest conveni-
ence. Should this road go through
it means that one could leave this
city at 2 p. m. by auto and reach the
same train that we meet at Weed
when leaving at 10 a. m.

"The Horsey Irrigation Project
is another matter that has been re-
opened largely through the efforts
of the Chamber of Commerce. A
new proposition by the Government
has been made this spring to the
people of this district, but had
been pigeon-holed by the directors
and not presented to the people. By
being in touch with conditions there
the Chamber has been able to take
the matter up with the Water Users
directly with the result that two mass
meetings have been held and a ma-
jority of the land already signed up
for irrigation to the Government.
"To reopen the Savage Bros. mill
in this city and create another addi-
tion to its pay roll has been one of
the things we set out to accomplish
and twice in the past four months
have thought we had succeeded only
to have our hopes shattered. We are
now on a new trail along this line and
think we will soon have better things
to report.
"By strenuous and diligent ham-
mering at the Portland business men
and the Portland Chamber of Com-
merce we have succeeded in awak-
ening the people there to the import-
ance to themselves of having either
the Natron out-off or the Hill exten-
sion railroad completed, giving Port-

land 75 per cent of the trade of this
district instead of 10 per cent, and
placing Klamath Falls on the main
line. To succeed in this matter, it
would of course be the biggest thing
the Chamber could hope to accomplish
and we are leaving no stone unturned
to bring it about. The Hill exten-
sion could be built for from half
to three quarters of a million dollars
and the Portland jobbers, who have
the power to force its construction,
lose that much of our trade to San
Francisco each year. The Chamber
has sent personal invitations to nearly
all the largest wholesale houses to
be present at the time of Governor
Wythecombe's visit here, June 26,
when a big banquet will be held and
some of these statistics presented to
them forcibly at close range.

"The social functions given to date
have, owing to the depleted financial
condition of the body, been very lim-
ited, but the degree of success at-
tained by those we have attempted
has left such pleasant recollections
that we feel encouraged to hold them
with greater frequency when we are
financially able to do so. The free
luncheon and entertainment furnish-
ed the farmers and their wives at-
tending the Farmer's Short Course
here in February went off without a
hitch and aided materially in bring-
ing about the feeling we are striving
to produce between the farmer
and the city business man. The din-
ner party of June 8th at the White
Pelican hotel at which we were so
pleasantly entertained by Col. W. H.
Miller was an example of what can
be done with a little effort and trifling
expense. The Chamber will as-
ist in the entertainment of the Con-
gressional Party June 20, and of the
Governor's party, June 27.

"Although there have been com-
paratively few newcomers to Klamath
county so far this summer we
can honestly say that most of them
and the most desirable portion have
come through correspondence with
this office. Having converted the lat-
ter into a more inviting condition
than formerly, we have made it a
headquarters as far as possible for
those coming in and find that this
meets with surprising appreciation
from those taking advantage of it.
The Chamber in acting as host to the
new comer having him meet the right
people, showing some interest in him
aside from taking his money, fulfills
a long felt want in this community.

"Finally from having an organiza-
tion that was sneered at by the busi-
nessmen as being its bills, living on
wind, hot air, etc., by prorating its
back bills, which ran well into the
hundreds for rent telephone and
other current expenses and with a
tag end of subscription list to work
on, forced our way back into the re-
spect and esteem of the business men
in whose good graces we hope to
stand by strict economy and careful
expenditure of our remaining funds.
This has been proven by numerous
instances of subscribers who repudiated
their subscriptions when visited
last winter and later voluntarily
came forward with a good word and
a few shekels for the cause."
